FORGERIES PAD CARSON RECALL

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 12—(AP)—Stanley MacDonald, handwriting expert of the sheriff's office, has expressed the opinion one person wrote all 20 signatures on one of the Mayor Joseph Carson recall petitions.

Ray Watkins, deputy city auditor, said the girl who checked the petitions found that none of the 20 persons listed on the sheet is a registered voter.

The entire sheet was thrown out and called to the attention of District Attorney Lotus Langley.

Watkins announced that 30,369 names have been filed. They were running 80 per cent good up until the last 3,000 which dropped to 65 per cent good, he said.

Bona fide signatures of 27,097 are required to put the recall on the ballot. Filing must be completed by Saturday night.

FEED GRAIN SHORT IN COMING WINTER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12—(P)—A deficit of 3,000,000 tons of feed grains in the total necessary to maintain basic livestock numbers in the United States through the winter was reported today from the bureau of agricultural economics.

The combined number of livestock and poultry was estimated at 115,449,000, with a net supply of grain for feeding purposes of 60,600,000 tons. Approximately 93,067,000 tons of hay will be required in addition, but only 91,497,001 tons are available.

SHEEP WREAK HAVOC ON LETTUCE RANCH

THE DALLES, Ore., Oct. 12—(AP)—Sheriff Sexton temporarily became a sheepherder today when 2000 sheep broke through a fence four miles south of The Dalles and invaded the lettuce field of the L. O. Tenold and Milo Cushing truck farms.

The woolies were being moved from summer range when they spied what looked like green pastures, and the herder called the sheriff's office for help.

Approximately 100 crates of lettuce were destroyed before the sheep were controlled.

MAHONEY THREATENS USE OF INITIATIVES

PORTLAND, Oct. 12—(P)—Willis R. Mahoney, although defeated for the Democratic nomination for governor, today stood ready to back initiative measures to enact his legislative program if the next state administration fails to do so.

That policy and the declaration he is "not a write-in candidate for governor," were enunciated in an address last night by Mahoney, the Klamath Falls mayor. He further asserted he would "not accept any appointive political office."

'MUSTARD PLASTERS' MAY HALT EROSION

MISSOULA, Mont. (UP)—"Mustard plaster" may be applied to fire-swept areas of Montana forest lands to prevent flood erosion.

The practice of planting mustard weed in burned-over areas has proven highly efficient in checking flood erosion in California.

U. S. foresters here may decide to follow the California program to launch a speedy revegetation program, according to advice from Washington.
