BELCASTRO WINS HECTIC GRAPPLE WITH FEET, FISTS

Starting with a lightning drop-kick to take the first fall in 15 seconds, and keeping up a barrage of flying fists and legs throughout the match, Pete Belcastro, Italian wideman of the ring, won two out of three falls in the main event of the Army mat card last night from Bonny Mulr, brawny Australian grappler. Belcastro took the deciding fall with a body press in six minutes, ending one of the wild mix-ups of drop-kicks and Sonnenbergs which featured the colorful mele.

The big Australian heavyweight champion was taken completely by surprise in the brief first fall by the Italian's sudden rush and nimble leg thrusts, but uncorked some unorthodox tactics himself in the second period, to flatten Belcastro in 13 minutes with a Sonnenberg and a press. Mulr punished the lighter Italian in powerful grips and retained for rough stuff with slugging, winning the favor of the large crowd. The two furnished some of the goriest

grappling yet seen in the Army ring, ranging from an exchange of the neck-breaking "nargmat" hold to a free-for-all in the laps of ring-side customers. Pete failed to connect with many of his drop-kicks after the first successful attempt, but kept his 200-pound opponent busy dodging feet and fists. Bonny took the measure of the Italian on several occasions with beautifully executed flying marets, and broke out of a rolling scissor with a bone-crunching back ward dive. Belcastro, who weighed in at 192, was unable to make headway with the big Australian by pure wrestling.

In another exhibition of the unorthodox, Cliff Thiede, 212-pound life-guard from Long Beach, Cal., won the 45-minute semi-final from curly Harry Demetral, Chicago Greek, when Harry's right jab landed on Thiede's forehead. Thiede was unable to stand up under Demetral's unorthodox beating. The bout very nearly went into a fourth fall, when the Greek disputed the referee's decision and threatened to take him on. Thiede weighed 212, while Demetral weighed 205 pounds.

Bob Kenaston, 202, chunky marine from Gold Hill, made good again in the 30-minute preliminary, with Armenian Burk, of Tacoma, when he reversed a body press for the only fall, in 10 minutes. Burk, 188, proved a good partner for the local boy, and the match ran fast and loose, as both grapplers executed some clever flying marets, with Kenaston showing an edge on cleverness.
