As a large gathering of friends who came to bid farewell to Rev. and Mrs. W. J. Howell, who leave next week for Cashmere, Wash., where Reverend Howell has accepted a charge, a delightful evening was spent with the following committee in charge: Mrs. John White, Mrs. C. T. Sweeney and Mrs. W. H. Wait.

Mrs. White called upon the following friends: Rev. Joseph Knotta, pastor of the First M. E. Church, who opened the meeting with prayer; O. E. (Pop) Gates, who gave a very interesting talk and urged that the church do all in its power to create a new industry for Medford in the shape of a "dairy" that would daily distribute among its people the "milk of human kindness." Then Dr. C. T. Sweeney addressed the meeting, saying that to him this was not a farewell because he intended to keep in touch with Reverend Howell as long as he lived.
