

TRIO NABBED FOR STILL OPERATION ON BUTTE CREEK

Charged with possession of mash and operation of a distillery, Lee Roy Wallace, 39, George Joe Muth, 28, both of the Abbott ranch on the Butte creek road, and Evans Edward Jones, 25, of Sama Valley are in the county jail awaiting court action, having been arrested on the location of the still they were allegedly operating, Friday night by a state police officer and Deputy Sheriff Phil H. Stansberry and George Inlow.

Wallace waived a preliminary hearing Saturday and was bound over to the grand jury, with bail set at \$1000. Muth and Jones demanded a preliminary hearing, and are also being held with bail set at \$1000, pending an arraignment Monday at 2 p. m. The 50-gallon still was confiscated by officers who made the arrest, having been led to the location, which is on the old Hawks homestead about 28 miles from Medford, by an informant who acted as guide. Officers stated that Wallace and Muth were seen operating the still, and allegedly have been partners in moonshining for the past two years. Jones' connection with the still, if any, is not known. Wallace claimed he was running the still alone, police said, and that the other two men were visitors.

Two and one-half gallons of moonshine whiskey was found, and is in the possession of state police. Thirty gallons of "first run" liquor was dumped, together with 100 gallons of mash. Five fifty-gallon barrels and a small shack nearby were also destroyed.

AIR SERVICE TO KLAMATH REGION OPENS TOMORROW

The Ryan plane will stop at the Medford municipal airport, and tickets will be on sale there. The schedule, as announced by Mr. Randall, follows: Leave Klamath Falls 8:45, arriving at Lakeview 9:30 a. m. Leave Lakeview 10:30 a. m., arriving at Klamath Falls at 11:15 a. m. Leaving Klamath Falls at 12:45 p. m., arriving at Medford at 1:25 p. m. Leave Medford at 3 p. m., arriving at Klamath Falls at 3:40 p. m.

V. E. CONSER DIES ON 63RD BIRTHDAY

Van Elder Conser, well known resident of Medford where he made his home until a few years ago when he went to Crescent City, Calif., passed away at the home of his son, Elder Conser, of 139 Portland avenue, Medford, Friday evening.

Mr. Conser came to Medford Thursday to visit his son and daughter here and was stricken with a heart attack and died in a few minutes.

He was born at Bellevue, Ohio, Oct. 12, 1871 and died on his 63rd birthday. He was married in Kansas to Annie Mickey 39 years ago, and from there, the family moved to California's San Joaquin valley. Mr. Conser's son came to Medford in 1908. Shortly after his arrival in Medford, he engaged in the mercantile business and established what is now known as the Home Grocery on East Main street. He was in business here practically all the time of his residence here, and went to Crescent City for his health where he was also in the grocery business. Mr. Conser was a member of the Methodist church. He leaves besides his wife, two children, Elder Conser, Jr., and Katherine E. Gilson of Medford.

Also two sisters, one in the east and one in California. Funeral services will be conducted by Rev. William J. Howell at the Conger chapel at 2:00 p. m., Monday with interment in the Oaklawn memorial park.
