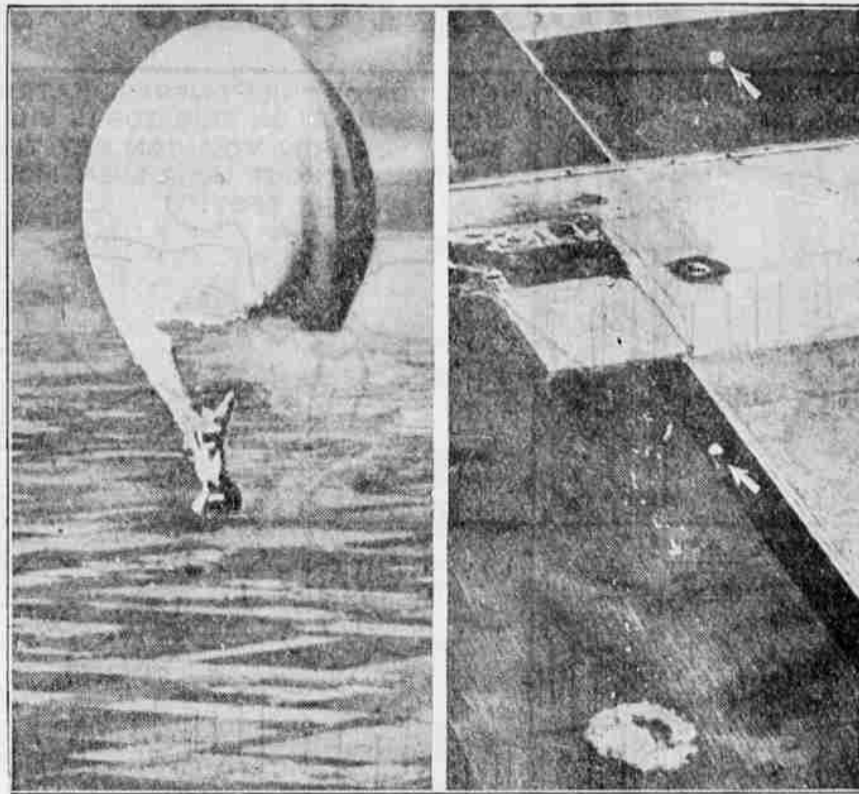

THE DISASTROUS END OF A STRATOSPHERE FLIGHT

FROM KEYBOARDS TO OUTBOARD



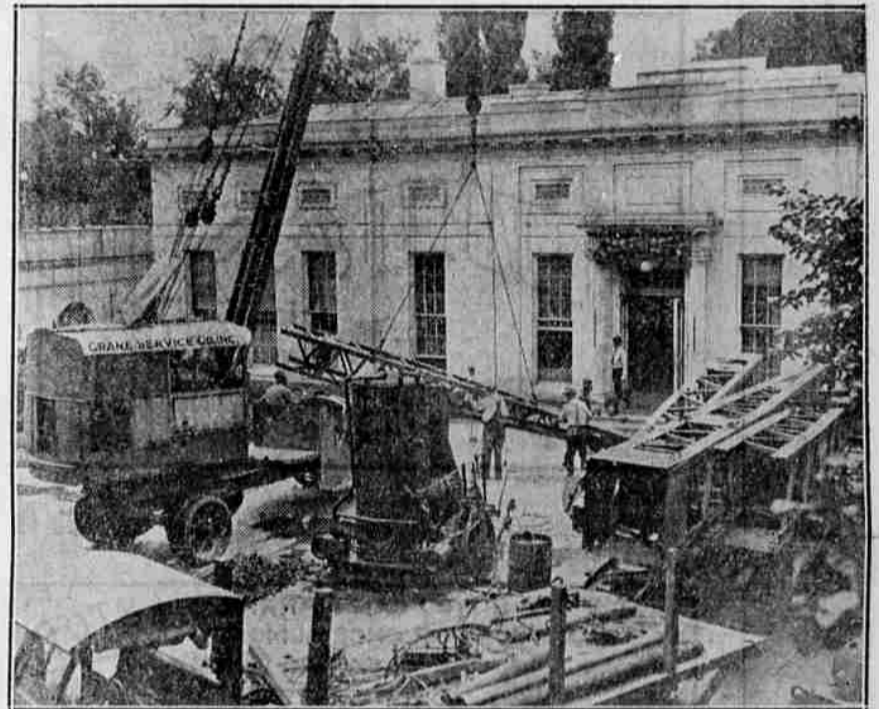

LILY PONS PLANS TO WED IN 1935



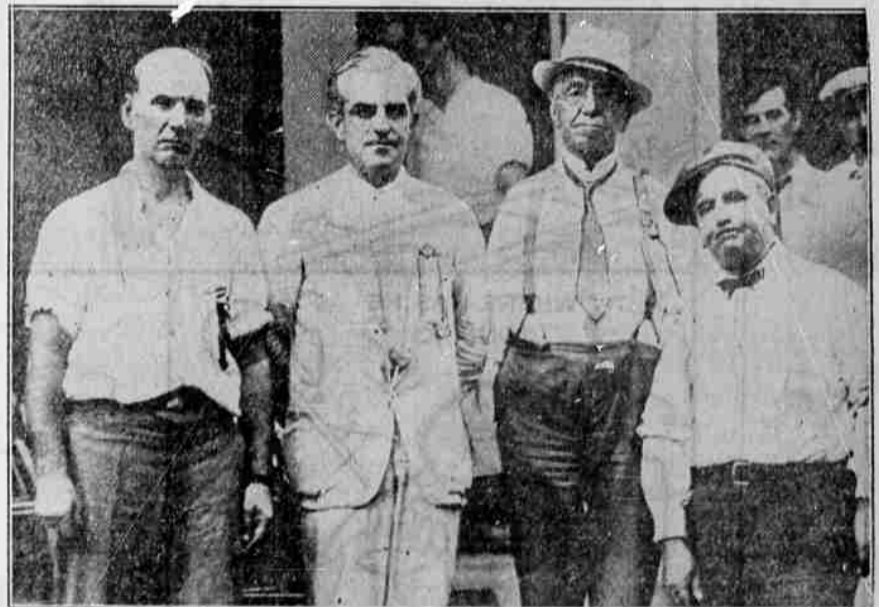
