After answering the roll call with current events on Russia, Mrs. Geo. Kabele read a paper on "Russian Women" which was historical and dealt with three women prominent in Russian history—Anne, Duchess of Courland; Elizabeth, daughter of Peter the Great; and Catherine II, or Catherine the Great. Their ascension to the throne was made possible by the ukase, a rule made by Peter the Great, permitting the ruler to name his successor.

Hindus is a Russian who makes annual visits to the country of his birth. He avers that life in Russia is a violent experience in its attempt to build a new civilization by uprooting ancient customs, and re-fashioning the ways of men.

It is to consist of society without religion, its women economically independent and participating in all national pursuits on a basis of equality with men.
