State W. C. T. U. Convention Scheduled Here Next Week

The Women's Christian Temperance Union will hold its state convention in the First M. E. church here, opening on Tuesday, October 23, and continuing through Friday, October 26. As this will be the first time since 1911 that the state convention has been held in Medford, friends of the union are looking forward to the occasion. An outstanding program has been planned, with Miss Helen Louise Byrnes as guest speaker. She is national W. C. T. U. field secretary and also secretary of the Young People's Branch. Miss Byrnes has just returned from the World's W. C. T. U. convention in Stockholm, Sweden, and will bring an interesting message from that gathering. Mrs. Ada Jolley, state president, will preside at all meetings. Tuesday evening, a banquet is to be given, to which all interested persons are invited. Miss Byrnes will speak at the dinner, also H. C. Seymour, member of the board of trustees of the children's farm home at Corvallis. Musical selections by some of the most talented artists of the city, will be given at the dinner, and throughout the convention.

On Wednesday afternoon, Mrs. Jolley will give her annual address, and there will be an address by Mrs. W. S. Nicholson, state president of the Federation of Women's Clubs. That evening, the session will be especially for the young people, with Miss Byrnes as guest speaker. Music will be by the Methodist choir. Addresses will be given Thursday evening by Miss Maude Aldrich, nationally known for her work in connection with motion pictures, and by Reverend Fred M. Weatherford, pastor of the Medford Nazarene church. The convention closes Friday afternoon, the delegates being entertained with a sight-seeing trip planned by the Chamber of Commerce. It is estimated that well over one hundred delegates will attend the convention, arriving Monday evening and Tuesday morning. The state officers will be entertained at the Holland hotel. Breakfast is being served at the church for delegates. All sessions of the convention are open and interested persons are invited to attend.
