

Cox and Kruse Will Grapple Tonight on Double Card at Armory

ROUGH NIGHT FOR WRISTLOCK KING IS EXPECTATION

Lodi Bone Crusher Adept At Mean Tactics—Frisbie And McGee In Opening Match of Lillard's Card.

Bob Kruse, Oswego broccolo king, will tussle with a behemoth grip and grimace man when he faces King Kong Cox, Lodi grappler, in one of the double main event matches at the armory tonight. Although a veteran ringman himself, Kruse is facing a foe who should give him more than a little trouble in tonight's encounter.

Promoter Mack Lillard signed the two with the purpose of providing Medford fans with another popular type of bout between two of the colorful brand of grapplers. Kruse specializes in wristlocks, slapping them on in rapid fashion and oftentimes making an opponent's arm useless, which enables him to use a more deadly offensive tactic to win the bout. He also lets a mean rabbit punch and frequently takes the measure of a ringmate, no matter how big and burly, by unorthodox tactics. In no case does Kruse fail to hand out his share of the fireworks.

Cox Counts on Welgja

Ponderous King Kong counts on weight to carry him through a match, but also supplies an offensive shot that invariably gives him an edge in unorthodox work. Cox is clever as well as sizeable, and has had his quota of experience in the game. He possesses, on a large scale, the ideal physique for a wrestler, with a few dozen pounds added to his superframe for good measure. When he tangles with the Oswego farmer tonight it will be a battle of brawn matched against a slight advantage in technique.

But the Cox-Kruse match is not centering all of this week's fight interest. Wagers are also being set on the first of the two main event bouts in which Ray Frisbie, local fireman-grappler, will angle for an hour, or two out of three falls, with Pat McGee, speedy slap and scrap artist from Los Angeles. With both experience and power, the Californian should make things lively in the initial half of tonight's show with young Frisbie.

Comeback for Frisbie
It will be the first time in many months the local boy has appeared before fight fans in any more active role than referee. With many old followers at the ringside and the other portion of the armory's weekly attendance interested in seeing him in action, his bout with McGee is pointed toward center position in the limelight. Frisbie has a local reputation as being one of the speediest and cleverest youngsters of the ring, with a good physique and a knowledge of wrestling lore.

McGee promises to make the bout an active one for the fire laddie; however, with his punishing and favorite hold, the full nelson. Besides knowing other equally effective tricks, the southerner applies this hold with a regularity that gives any victim a headache.

There has been no raise in admission rates, according to Promoter Lillard, and with a steady flow of tickets and another good crowd should be on hand tonight for the double-decked card.

MIGRATORY BIRD SEASON TO OPEN FRIDAY MORNING

Ducks Reported Numerous In Klamath Area—Federal Stamp Needed By Hunters—Obtain At P. O.

Tomorrow morning with the opening of hunting season on migratory waterfowl, guns will be turned on nearly every type of game in southern Oregon, among which ducks stand out as providing the favorite targets for sportsmen. Despite unfavorable weather conditions and a shortage of water in Klamath and other eastern hunting regions, several hunters who have made preliminary trips report that birds are numerous.

The season, which allows shooting of ducks, geese, brant, rails, coots, stilts, snipe or jacksnipe, will extend from Friday, October 19 to December 31, inclusive, in three day periods with four day intermissions. Shooting days are as follows: October 19, 20, 21, 26, 27, 28, November 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, 15, 17, 18, 23, 24, 25, 30, December 1, 2, 7, 8, 9, 14, 15, 16, 21, 22, and 23.

The bag limit for all migratory waterfowl, with the exception of geese and brant is 12 in any one day and not to exceed 12 in any three consecutive shooting days. Should further, that the bag limit shall not be more than five each or in the aggregate of elder ducks, Canvasbacks, Redheads, Greater Scaups, Lesser Scaups, Ringnecks, Blue-wing Teals, Green-wing Teals, Cinnamon Teals, Shorelarks and Gadwall. All such ducks shall be counted with and included in the daily limit of 12 birds. There is no open season on Wood, Ruddy or Bufflehead ducks. The bag limit for geese and brant is four in any one day and not to exceed four in any three consecutive shooting days. The possession limit for geese and brant is not to exceed four at any one time.

Hunters in 1934 will be restricted by the duck stamp act, which provides that all persons over the age of 16 years must have in their possession at the time they take any migratory waterfowl, an unexpired federal migratory bird hunting stamp. The stamps may be purchased for \$1 at the postoffice, and should be affixed to the state hunting license or a certificate issued at the postoffice.

Further restrictions this year provide that it is unlawful to use more than 10 live goose decoys, or more than 25 live duck decoys, either loose or confined, at any one stand.

Although several Medford hunters are already preparing to start out early tomorrow for lakes and ponds, the majority seem to favor waiting until the week-end before making their start for the 1934 season.

CIRCUIT COURT OPENS MONDAY

The October term of the circuit court will start Monday, October 22, when a new grand jury will be drawn and the petit jury report. Cases have been docketed for trial up to the week of December 3. They are chiefly civil actions.

Most of the criminal cases remain to be set. Two are scheduled for early hearing—Milton Merthwe, 40, of the Evans Valley district, charged with a statutory offense involving a young girl, and T. J. Knight, attorney, charged with driving an auto while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

Criminal cases to be set for trial include criminal syndicalism charges against Kyle Pugh and James E. Stockman; J. Noel Colby of Grants Pass, charged with a statutory offense, and Drury F. Pierce, charged with the theft of \$4000 from his central point district employer.

COCHRAN VOTED MOST VALUABLE AMERICAN LOOP

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Mickey Cochrane, the "Iron Mike" who led Detroit out to second division to the pennant in his first season as ringmaster of the Tigers, today was named the most valuable player in the American league, for the second time since 1928.

The 31-year-old Detroit manager won the honor award, voted annually by an eight-man committee representing the Baseball Writers' Association of America, after an unusually spirited duel of ballots with his star second baseman, Charley Gehringer. Cochrane polled 67 out of a possible maximum of 80 votes, to 65 for Gehringer. Vernon (Lefty) Gomez, star Yankee southpaw, polled 60 votes; Schoolboy Rowe, ace Tiger pitcher, received 59, and Lou Gehrig, Yankee first baseman, was given 54.
