

### CHAPLAINS GIVEN CCC ASSIGNMENTS FOR WINTER WORK

The winter religious program in the Medford CCC district will be carried on under the direction of Captain George Woodall, chaplain reserve, who reported this week from the Fort George Wright district. Captain Woodall will be assisted by three other chaplains who have been assigned to "sub districts" to assure close personal contact with the camps.

Lieut. Christopher J. McDonnell, who also reported for duty here from the Fort George Wright district, will headquarter at Coos Head Camp, Ore., and serve the camps on the coast and in the northern part of the district.

Lieut. Harley G. Preston, former district chaplain, will headquarter at Grants Pass and visit the camps in southern Oregon. Lieut. John T. Kilcoyne, who was recently commissioned as a chaplain in the regular army, will headquarter at Yreka and visit the Medford district camps in northern California.

With civilian clergymen of the district offering their full co-operation, regular services are being held in all the camps. At least two services are provided monthly in each camp by civilian clergymen, in addition to regular visits of the district chaplain and members of his staff.

### ROOSEVELT WARNS VETS BONUS CASH IS NOT AVAILABLE

financial circles with this statement:

**Must Watch Credit**

"In the spending of this money we must have due regard for the good credit of the government of the United States.

"That means that we cannot spend at once or in any given year all that we could usefully spend."

The president asked the veterans to recall that other classes were in a worse state than their own and reiterated the statement in his inaugural address that "we must do first things first; the care of the disabled, the sick, the destitute and the starving is the first thing."

"To this the veterans of American wars," he said, "give their approval in agreement with the overwhelming majority of our other citizens."

**Confident of Patriotism**

The president said he made this statement to the veterans not only because he was confident of their patriotism and their understanding of the nation's needs, but also because the federal and state governments had given to them "many privileges not accorded to other citizens" and for the reason that World War veterans today were in the prime of life and "better off from the point of view of employment and of annual income than the average of any other great group of our citizens."

Mr. Roosevelt said the hospital he was dedicating, the first veterans' institution to be constructed since he took office, served as a "symbolic and bold denial of any careless statement that the United States does not take care of those who have served it in war—and as a symbolic affirmation of our belief in the underlying patriotic willingness of our veterans to put their things first."

**Broad Policy Cited**

The 16 buildings rising in the institutional area between here and Salem, in a larger sense, were described as symbolic of the government's broader policy to give aid not only to veterans, but to "hundreds of thousands of other citizens—men, and women and children, who, handicapped by environment or by circumstance, lack today what reasonable people call the essentials of modern civilization."

"The president said these people are in a sense not 'forgotten' because the country has known of their existence and appreciated their plight for years, but in another sense they were 'forgotten' for it is only in recent years the government 'has undertaken to help them on a national scale.'"

**Care is Huge Task**

Their care is a huge task, the president said, adding the "improvement of their lot is a definite obligation on all of our citizens and I am confident that the veterans of our American wars will be among the first to recognize this fact."

The president said he agreed with those who feel the country is "distinctly better off from a material point of view than it was last year."

"Other people, who fail to think things through," he said, "forget that one cause of the depression which we are beginning to leave behind, was the very existence of hundreds of thousands of men, women and children who have been and continue to be a definite drag against the return of prosperity."

About 7000 gallons of grape juice is fermenting at the Tualatin Valley winery, and the owners say many more tons of grapes could have been used if they were available.



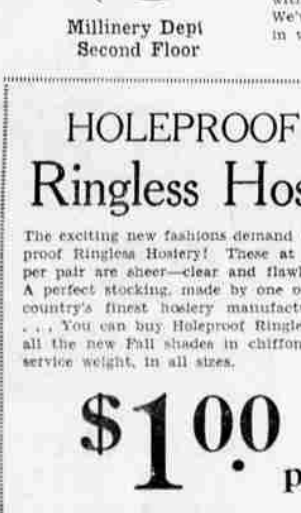

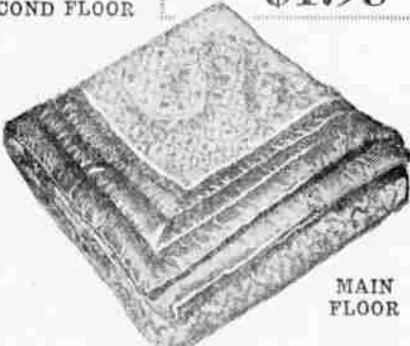
