

LONERGAN FEARS FOR CONSTITUTION

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Issuing the challenge, "whether we are still going to look to the constitution of the United States and our state as organic law, or whether we are going to abandon it and run wild," Frank J. Lonergan spoke before 350 members of the Republican party gathered here for the Marion county fall campaign banquet last night.

Lonergan urged Republicans to "stand for a party that will bring not a new deal, but a square deal for this country."

Joe E. Dunne, Republican candidate for governor and Earl Snell, party nominee for secretary of state, spoke briefly, as did Congressman James E. Mott, C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, and C. H. Gram, labor commissioner, all candidates for re-election.

IRRIGATION LOAN CONTRACT SIGNED

Word was received this morning from Washington, D. C., that the contract between the Reconstruction Finance corporation and the Medford Irrigation district for a \$400,000 loan for the retirement of bonded indebtedness had been signed by government aides and had been forwarded.

Olin Arnsperger, general manager of the Medford and Talent irrigation districts, said this meant "the negotiations have been a success."

Arnsperger said the "franchise" of the transaction would take from 30 to 40 days. This includes invalidation of the bonds and other local details.

Approximately \$1,407,000 in bonded indebtedness will be retired by the loan.

WOMEN HELD ON ASSAULT CHARGES

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—(Sp.)—Mrs. Ethel Voris, 23, and Ivy Cochran, 21, were both bound over to the grand jury yesterday following preliminary hearing in justice court on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Mrs. Voris was alleged to have shot Marian Bones, 19, Turner youth, in the head, when he and three companions were hunting on the Voris farm near Turner. Bones testified that one of his group shot and killed a pheasant, and that when they sent a dog after it Mrs. Voris shot at the animal. When the dog was called off Bones claimed the woman fired several shots, one of which struck him in the head.

Mrs. Cochran, an inmate of the girls' school, was held into court following an alleged attack on an attendant while attempting to escape from the school.

MARY DAHACK RITES AT 10 A. M. SATURDAY

Mary Ellen Dahack passed away at their home, 547 Marie street, at 11 p. m., Wednesday, following an illness which confined her to her bed for the last two years. She had been in poor health for the past six years.

Mrs. Dahack was one of the oldest pioneers of this locality, being born at Eagle Point nearly 81 years ago.

She leaves besides her husband, three daughters, Viola Handell of Malheur, Wash., Bell Daley of Trillick, Columbia, and Daisy Standley of Iowa; also two brothers and one sister, Green and Grant Matthews of Eagle Point and America Fitzgerald of Los Angeles.

Funeral services will be held at the Conger chapel at 10 a. m. Saturday, with interment in the Central Point cemetery.

Fear Girl Nudists Might Set Fire to National Forests

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Nudist colonies have no place in the Sawtooth national forest of Central Idaho—because of the forest fire hazard.

N. S. Benedict, supervisor of the forest, in a message received here today, said nine Salt Lake City girls had inquired where there was a lake where "modern but refined" young women might vacation without clothes.

"Sawtooth days and nights are cold, and the girls would have to build fires," said Mr. Benedict. "The forest fire hazard would be too great."

He did not name the girls.

DUCKS PEPPERED ON OREGON LAKES

PORTLAND, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Hundreds of shotguns blazed across marshes and lakes today as clocks chimed the formal opening of the duck season in Oregon.

It has been many years since such an abundance of waterfowl had been seen on Oregon lowlands. Naturalists said the annihilation by the mid-west drought of many nesting and feeding places resulted in a general migration toward the west.

Firing must cease at 3 p. m. each day. Hunting is permitted only on Fridays, Saturday and Sundays, and the season closes at 3 p. m., Sunday, December 23.

The bag limit for ducks is 12 birds in any one day, and 12 birds in possession at any one time.

DISCHARGED FARMHAND KILLS EMPLOYER, WIFE

MANTONA, Cal., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Furious because they had discharged him from their ranch, a laborer identified only as "Frank" shot and killed Mr. and Mrs. George Alexakis, both about 35, 1.5 miles west of here on the Durham Ferry road, then committed suicide.

AMERICANS TAKE LEAD IN BRIDGE

LONDON, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The American and British teams battling for the Schwab bridge trophy squared off today for the fifth and final round, with the invaders in the lead for the first time.

Ely Culbertson and his teammates held an advantage of 990 points, with a total of 74,950 to England's 73,060.

A rally late last night gave the Americans their belated credit balance—sixty boards remained to be played.

Although Culbertson said "that lead is not enough," English confidence appeared shaken. The American captain praised the performance of his British opponents, saying "with one more year of practice and a slight rearrangement of the team, I can predict that the days of American bridge supremacy are approaching an end."
