

COUNTY TEACHERS DISCUSS WORK AT ANNUAL INSTITUTE

Jackson county teachers met this morning at the senior high school for the annual institute, which is being conducted under direction of County Superintendent C. R. Bowman, for the discussion of problems occurring in the various grade and high schools.

Assistant State Superintendent Robert J. Maaske was principal speaker at the general assembly held this morning, addressing the group on the policies of the state department. Dr. Walter Redford of the Southern Oregon Normal addressed the high school teachers group this afternoon, and Miss Charlotte Linfoot spoke on the Junior Red Cross work as carried on in the schools.

Other speakers are Miss Grace Forrester of Portland, Miss Ida O'Brien of the Southern Oregon Normal school, and Mrs. Esther Church Leske, Medford music supervisor.

Group meetings, among which the subjects of reading and arithmetic received the greatest attention, were held during the day. Supt. Milton E. Coe, of Jacksonville, president, and Chas. Weaver, of Ashland, secretary of the county O. S. T. A., talked on the plans and policies of the state association.

Music was presented in both the morning and afternoon sessions, with Mrs. Maurine Duncan of this city offering vocal selections, and the Jackson County Teachers' choir singing several numbers.

Cream of Mushroom Soup
Cheese Squares

Cream of Mushroom Soup
4 tablespoons butter.
1 teaspoon finely chopped onion.
1 teaspoon chopped celery.
1 tablespoon chopped pimiento.
1 1/2 cups sliced mushrooms.
1/2 cup water.
2 tablespoons flour.
3 cups milk.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.

Melt butter in frying pan, add and brown onion, celery, pimiento and mushrooms. Add water, cover and simmer 10 minutes. Stir frequently. Mix melted butter, add flour and when blended add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Add seasonings and mushroom mixture. Cook 2 minutes. Serve in hot bowls.

Cheese Squares
12 2-inch square bread.
4 tablespoons butter.
1-3 cup grated cheese.
1/2 cup milk.
Mix butter, cheese and salt. Spread on bread. Arrange on shallow pan and brown in moderate oven. Serve warm.

Banana Cake With Walnuts
1/2 cup fat.
1 1/2 cups sugar.
2 eggs.
1 cup mashed bananas.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon lemon extract.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 cup sour milk.
2 cups flour.
1 teaspoon soda.
1 teaspoon baking powder.
1/2 cup sliced walnuts.
Cream fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and mix well. Pour into shallow pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Cool and serve topped with whipped cream or custard sauce.

This is a rich dessert so only small portions should be served.

Left-over meat, fish or fowl, mixed with a thick, highly seasoned sauce, makes an excellent filling for peppers or tomatoes to be baked.

Carefully clean and wash duck. Stuff, arrange in pan and sprinkle with flour and seasonings. Place in hot oven 15 minutes, add water and lid, lower fire and roast 1 1/2 hours. Baste frequently.

1/2 cup wild rice.
4 cups water.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons chopped onions.
2 tablespoons chopped parsley.
2 tablespoons chopped celery.
1 egg.

PARK SUPPLIES GOING ON SALE

Supplies and equipment used by the Crater Lake national park service during the 1934 season will be placed on sale to the public on October 20, it was announced today. It will be received at the water headquarters of the park service located in the federal building.

The supplies and equipment may be seen and inspected at the park headquarters at Crater Lake, and will go in any quantity or number to the highest bidder. Included are kitchen supplies, electrical materials and equipment, trucks and tractors, machinery, harness and carpentry tools.

The park service has moved into its winter quarters during the past week, where they will remain during the winter. Acting Superintendent David H. Canfield is now located at the postoffice building. W. E. Robertson, associate engineer, is in charge of the crew which has remained temporarily at the lake, and F. G. Whitworth is in charge of the ECW work, which will also soon be removed from the park.

Cider Fruit Punch
Doughnut
Apple
Cider Fruit Punch
8 cups sugar.
4 cups orange juice.
2 cups lemon juice.
2 cups pineapple juice.
24 cups cold water.
2 quarts sweet cider.
Boil sugar and water 5 minutes. Cool. Add rest of ingredients. Serve in large bowl in which ice is placed.

Doughnuts (6 dozen)
2 cups sugar.
2 cups milk.
2 teaspoons vanilla.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon nutmeg.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1 1/2 cups flour.
8 teaspoons baking powder.
3 tablespoons butter, melted.
Mix sugar, milk and eggs. Let stand 10 minutes. Add rest of ingredients, mixing lightly. Toes soft dough onto floured board and roll out until 1/4 inch thick. Cut out doughnuts and fry in deep hot fat. Drain on soft paper. When time to serve sprinkle with confectioner's or granulated sugar.

When spreading crackers with cheese, mix a little butter with the cheese, creaming with a fork. The mixture will spread more easily on the crackers and have a better flavor.

When "buttered" crumbs are called for the best way is to melt butter, add crumbs and mix well and then sprinkle over top of food. If butter
