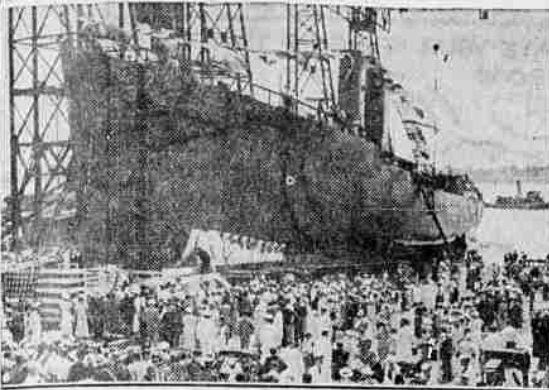


**Navy's Newest And Fastest Destroyer
Is Christened By Farley's Daughter**

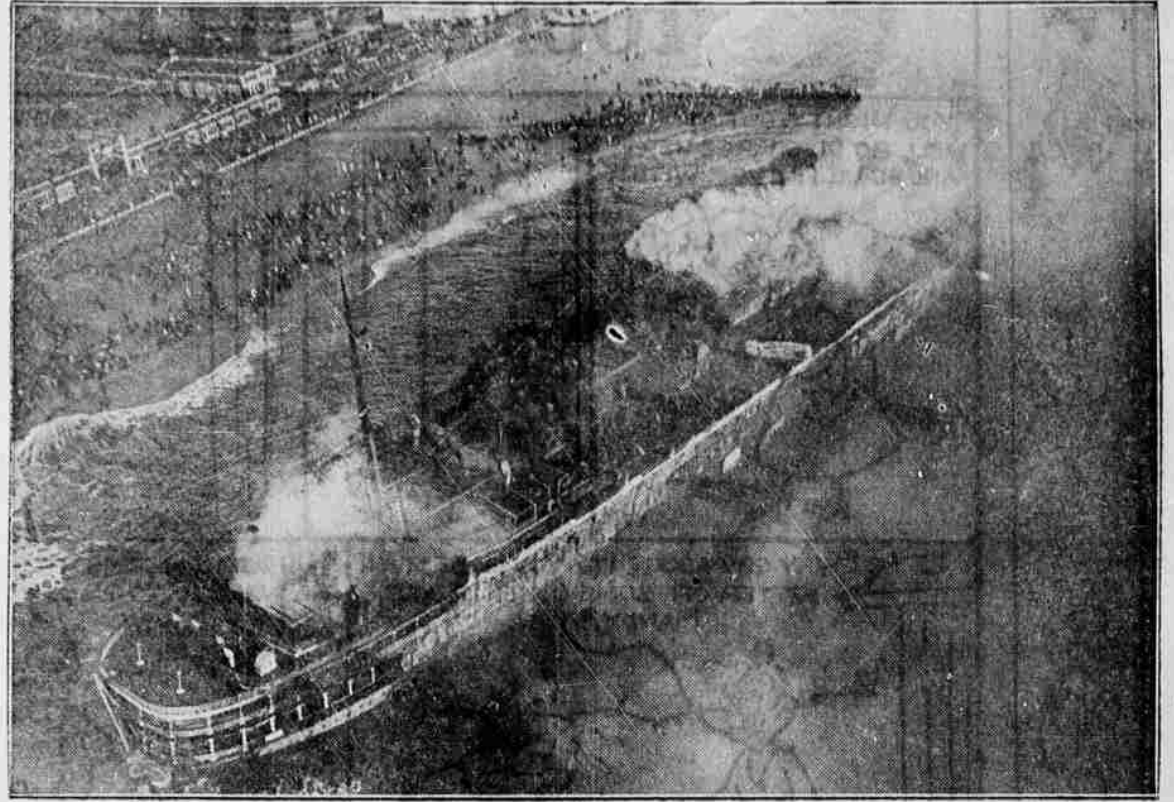

PERRY RETAINS AMERICAN TITLE

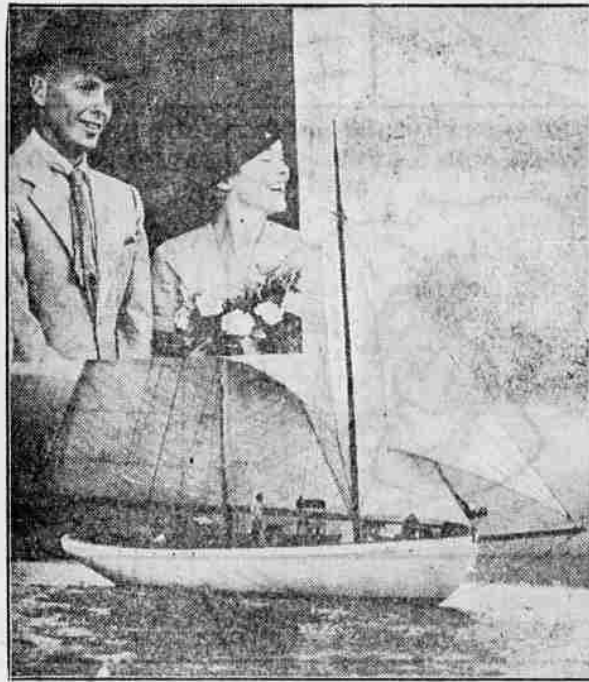

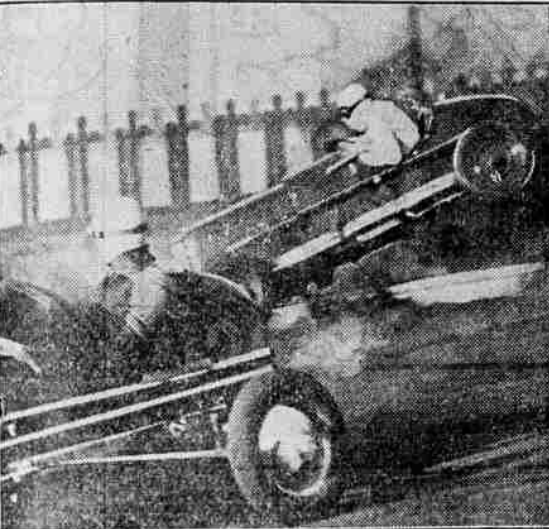

HOLD 'ER, EVERETT, SHE'S BUCKING

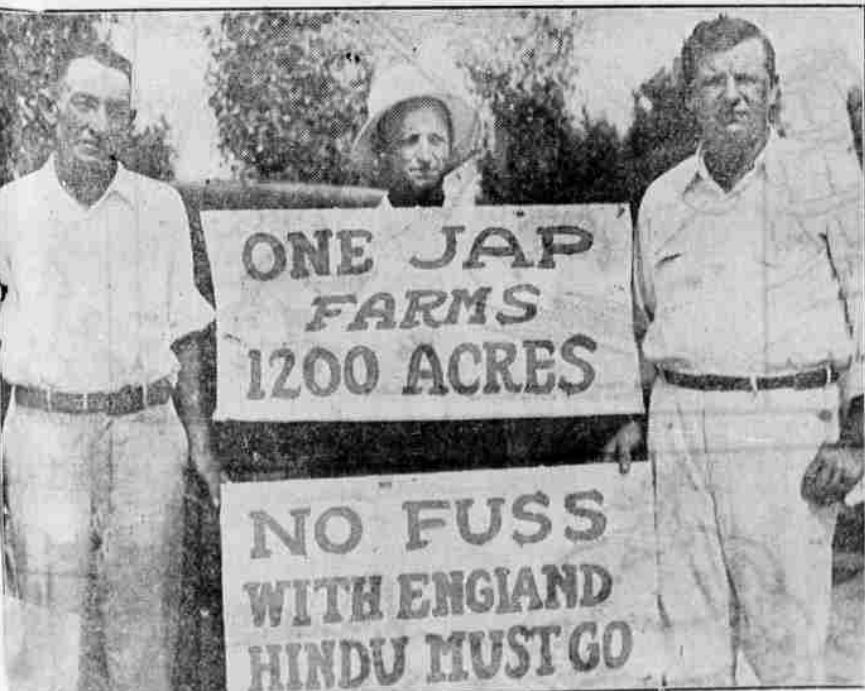

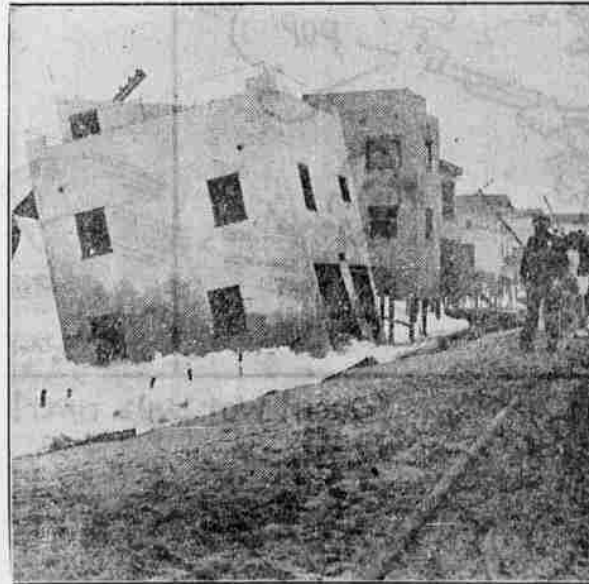


ARIZONA FARMERS CRUSADE FOR ALIEN OUSTER



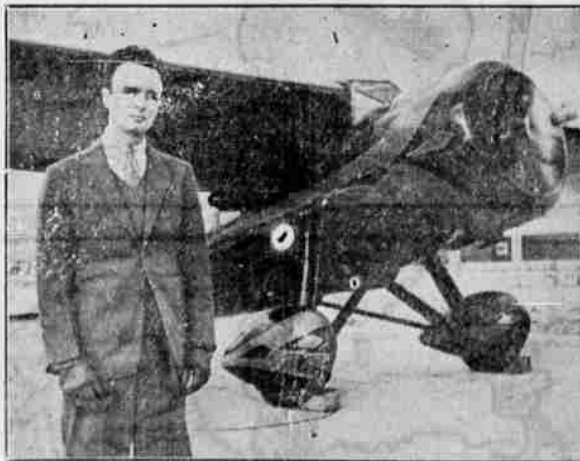
