

Staters Come From Behind to Tie Trojans, 6 to 6 in Final Minute

JORVALLIS SQUAD DRIVES OFTEN TO SCORING TERRAIN

Troy Battles Hard—Stiner's Men Score in Last Minutes—Pangle And Doneri Star.

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Oregon State came from behind in the last minute of play today to tie the Southern California at 6 to 6 before a crowd of approximately 40,000 astonished spectators.

Southern California scored in the first seven minutes of play and for 50 minutes protected its slim lead against an alert and fighting team from the great northwest. The Trojans seemed about to eke out a victory, and take a short step forward on the come-back trail when the game exploded in their faces.

Fighting desperately to score, Oregon State fired a long pass deep in Southern California territory. A Trojan back dashed over and knocked the ball down, but it fell into the arms of Milton Campbell, Beaver end, coming fast and he sprinted across the goal line unopposed.

The Trojans, smarting from the sting of two successive defeats, played their best brand of football of the season.

Oregon State threatened to score several times before the counter was negotiated. They drove deep into the territory of Southern California from time to time, using some highly deceptive maneuvers along the way, but when in the vicinity of the Trojan 20-yard line they bogged down and ran more losing than gaining plays.

Irvine Warburton, Southern California's all-American quarterback, played only one minute, not entering the game until the Beavers tied the score.

Oregon State did not have the push to drive over touchdowns from scoring position but its defense was alert after the game was on in earnest and its offense between the 20-yard lines sparkled. The Beavers used quick kicks and lateral passes as constant offensive weapons. Both failed them at times, two quick kicks being blocked and some losses resulting from laterals but they kept trying and put on a great show.

The first score came early in the first period. David Davis ran an Oregon punt back to the Beavers' 35-yard line and Cliff Propst went into action with a bang. With the big back carrying the ball most of the time the Trojans advanced to Oregon State's nine-yard line and then Davis shot a straight forward pass to Cal Clemens, the back being chased out of bounds on the five-yard line. Propst then ran around right end for the touchdown. Clemens' try for the extra point with a kick from placement failed, the ball sailing under the crossbar.

After several Oregon State drives had been halted, Hal Pangle, for Oregon State, recovered Wotky's fumble on Southern California's 40-yard line shortly before the end of the game.

Doneri threw a long pass intended for Campbell. Kuhn rushed in and batted it down but it went straight to Campbell, who did the rest, running 26 yards to a touchdown. Pangle's try for the extra point was a failure, the ball going wide as the crowd sat tense to see if the game was to be won and lost or only tied in the last minute.

UCLANS LOSE 3-0 TO GOLDEN BEARS IN ROUGH BATTLE

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 20.—(AP)—In the final period of a fiercely fought football battle as this huge bowl has rocked in many a season, versatile Arleigh Williams, California left halfback, place kicked an 18 yard field goal today to bring the Bears a 3 to 0 victory over their scholastic brothers from the south, the California Bruins of Los Angeles.

It was a thrilling climax to a hard to hand struggle the like of which has not been witnessed here this year, and as the leather sailed through the uprights from a difficult angle hopes of Bear supporters for a successful conference season were reviewed.

The Berkeley Bears opening game conference triumph took place before 30,000 shouting fans, held tense from opening kick off until the final gun barked.

For three periods they locked gridiron grips on even terms. Boxing gloves would have been appropriate in the first quarter with the officials separating rival players many times. Last year's initial meeting between the eleven of the two state universities ended in a scoreless tie.

The 1934 struggle, except for the deciding place kick was equally close. For the first half, the visiting Bruins held an offensive edge with the ball mainly in Bear territory. As the period came to an end the Bruins reached the Bears' 20 yard mark in a drive that started 14 yards back.

In the second period the battling Bruins continued with a drive that ended when Livesey's attempted place kick was blocked by right end, Gill Frush 6.

BRADDOCK SCORES LONE TOUCHDOWN IN SONS VICTORY

EGGUNE, Ore., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Bob Braddock scored on a 14-yard run and bucked for the extra point as Southern Oregon Normal school defeated the University of Oregon frosh football team 7 to 0 here today.

It was the first game of the season for the Ducklings.

"Chief" McLean, flashy Normal back, returned a punt 25 yards to pave the way for Braddock's touchdown during the first quarter.

Laelle's fine kicking and long punt returns time and again pulled the frosh from bed holes. Laelle also led the Ducklings' running attack.

In the second half Irvin Schultz, freshman coach, sent in lighter and faster men who battled the more experienced SONS on even terms. Tony Anako, Fern Moore and Chuck Shimomura stood out on the frosh line.

Frequent penalties and the slipper sawdust field slowed play.

GHELARDI LEADS MEDFORD TO BEAT MARSHFIELD 7-0

Midget Back Scores Touchdown In Third Period—Mud Handicaps Both Teams—Penalties Costly.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 20.—(AP)—Little Ghelardi, 135-pound half-back, tore through a fighting Marshfield high football team to score a touchdown in the third period and lead Medford high to a 7-to-0 victory over Marshfield.

The game was widely heralded as a determining factor in the battle for the unofficial state high school championship. The big undefeated Medford team has defeated Roseburg and Marshfield, tied the Southern Oregon Normal school reserves, and defeated Eureka, Cal.

The game was played on a mucky field which gave neither team a chance to successfully negotiate its trick plays. The Medford team gave the impression it would be a good dry field team.

Coach Darkin K. Burgher of Medford said he believed his team surmounted one of its biggest obstacles in defeating Marshfield.

The Medford Tigers have not been defeated since their game with Jefferson high in 1932. Last year Medford laid claim to the mythical state title.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 20.—(Sp.)—The Medford high school football team defeated Marshfield here today, 7 to 0, on a field that was ankle deep with mud.

Penalties at critical stages deprived the southern Oregon team of two touchdowns.

Ghelardi scored the lone touchdown after he had run for long gains on the rain-soaked field. Fullback Bates plunged across for the extra point.

OREGON HUMBLER IDAHO 13-6 ON WET MUDDY FIELD

Vandals Gain Touchdown On Parke's Blocked Punt—Webfeet March Length Of Field To Score.

MACLEAN FIELD, MOSCOO, Ida., Oct. 20.—(P)—The University of Oregon Webfeet found a rain-soaked, lake-dotted field to their liking here today and defeated a hard driving pack of Idaho Vandals, 13 to 6, in a conference football game.

Despite the mud and muck and the water-soaked ball, both teams frequently opened up with wild passing sorties, and one of Oregon's two touchdowns, coming in the last two minutes of the first half, started in the air.

A homesoming crowd of some 7,000 persons saw Oregon pook-pook the Vandals cry "end Oregon's trail" that had become a by-word to the desperate Idahoans during the last week or so. Idaho threatened three or four times, twice in the last period, but was unable to get within decent scoring distance of the goal line except in the third period.

It was right after Oregon's Michek and Van Vliet, aided by a hard-hitting line, had marched 80 yards for a touchdown that Idaho's only score came. Idaho kicked off after the touchdown, and Van Vliet returned to his own 32-yard line. Oregon lost four yards on the first play, and on the next Parke dropped back to punt.

Russ Hanson, tackle, and Barney Anderson, sub end, broke through to block the punt. The ball rolled to the 26-yard line, and Anderson scooped it up. He dashed, untouched, to the goal line. Bob Moser's attempted placekick for conversion failed.

The first period went scoreless, with much of the quarter taken up by a punting duel between Earl Smith, Idaho fullback, and Van Vliet, Oregon half. Oregon seemed to be able to streak at will through the Idaho line for long gains but lacked the punch to carry the ball over.

Oregon's field-long drive in the third period was beautiful. Supported by a hard driving line, Van Vliet and Michek tore time after time through the bewildered Idaho forwards for long gains, only one pass was attempted, and it was smeared by Russ Hanson, Idaho halfback. Van Vliet took the ball on the two-yard line and slanted off right guard to score.

Oregon's most successful passing barrage ended in a touchdown with only 90 seconds of the first half to play. Much of the quarter had seen Michek bucking and punting while Van Vliet took to the air. Parke snagged his fourth consecutive pass on the one-yard line and stepped over the goal for a touchdown. Vincent Walker, guard, place-kicked the conversion.

EX-OREGON BACK LEADS MINNESOTA TO PITT VICTORY

PITT STADIUM, PITTSBURGH, Oct. 20.—(P)—A slumbering golden giant—Minnesota's mighty offense—awoke with a start late today and in fifteen brief, thrill-soaked minutes crushed Pittsburgh 13 to 7, knocked the Panthers out of the national title hunt for the second straight year, and trundled off toward new triumphs with 64,850 staring and gasping in the wake.

Like the ten thousand Swedes who jumped out of the weeds at the battle of Copenhagen, the burly Norsemen rose as if from ambush in that final quarter, and in two tremendous blasts, scored two touchdowns, turned a rout into a victory, and paraded off unbeaten in the title race, as dangerous as eleven as roams the countryside.
