## FINAL RESPECTS PAID WILL STEEL IN SIMPLE RITES

Last respects of scores of sorrowing friends were paid to Judge William Gladstone Steel, "Father of Crater Lake," at funeral services yesterday afternoon at the First Funeral Home, following his death last Sunday as a result of a lingering illness. The services were simple in keeping with the simplicity with which he had lived.

Verbal tribute was voiced by Father William Black to Judge Steel, 49 years of whose life was so closely connected with the establishment and development of Crater Lake national park into one of the outstanding units of the national park service. Sixteen park officials and rangers were in attendance at the services as active and honorary pallbearers.

The death of Judge Steel, who had served as park commissioner since 1917, brings to a close a life fraught with endeavor, energy and accomplishment; the results of which will continue through years to come to perpetuate his memory. Next to his family, Crater Lake claimed his greatest devotion and caused his greatest sacrifices to make this scenic spot available to the people.

When other years found him more blessed with health, no summer passed by without seeing him in the region of the lake of blue mysteries which he first beheld as a young man in 1885, beginning his ceaseless efforts in its behalf. He became known as one of the outstanding figures of the national park service and was always a friend of the great and the humble with a loyalty undimmed by passing years.

Short services were held at the graveside in Siskiyou Memorial cemetery with Father Black and members of the Elks lodge officiating.

## ONE-SIXTH OF CATTLE IN DROUGHT SECTIONS BOUGHT BY UNCLE SAM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (AP)—The government has bought almost one-sixth of all the cattle in the 24 drought states.

AAA sources disclosed the result of the cattle-purchasing campaign today. More than 7,000,000 have been bought, out of a total of 45,598,050 in the 24 states. The government has paid \$20,379,153 out of \$101,217,500 appropriated for the purpose. The average price was about \$13.

Of the purchases about 1,100,000 were destroyed on the farm as unfit for food. Huge inroads on the cattle herd of several states were noted in the official tabulation.

Texas leads in cattle purchased. There the government has bought 1,388,702 of the estimated 6,602,702 in the state, paying an average of \$12.06 per head or a total outlay of \$16,744,969.

Other total purchases by states, the amounts paid and balances remaining as of October 15 included: Oregon 10,373 for \$152,201, \$26,790; California, 18,676 for \$288,731, \$19,299; Idaho, 29,797 for \$368,202, \$20,798; Montana, 518,033 for \$4,667,770, \$228,290.
