## ANDERSON BOYS KEYPED FOR FIGHT WITH OLD ENEMY

Medford junior high school's football team will meet Glendale high school on Van Scoyoc field Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with expectations for a hard battle on a dry but soft field. Coach Ray Henderson's boys are determined to take the measure of the northerners, since they are intent upon keeping a record of only one defeat at the hands of the Glendale team during the past four years of athletic relations.

Coach Henderson stated that the visitors are considered one of the strongest secondary high school teams in the district, despite the fact that the Medford juniors defeated them twice last season by 10-0 scores. Coach Henderson has been resting up his injured men for the contest, and says that the first-string lineup will be intact except for Ettinger, half, who is out on crutches with an infected leg. His absence will be a heavy loss to the backfield.

The Glendale team is also reported to be in fine shape for the battle presenting a heavy and shifty squad.

PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—(AP)—The University of Oregon football players today were spending toward Salt Lake City, wondering if the high altitude would handicap them in their game against University of Utah Saturday.

The 4300-foot altitude and injuries to four squad members concerned Coach Frank Culison on the Oregon squad passed through here last night after a final workout at Eugene in the afternoon.

Bud Jones, end, and Pat Pury, tackle, were left at Eugene to recuperate from injuries. Quarterback Terjeson and Fullback Michok, both suffering from injuries, accompanied the team with practically no chance Terjeson would play.

Oregon's probable starting backfield will see Bob Parke at quarterback, Van Fleet left half, Hetschman right half and Walter Back at full.

# PURE WRESTLING WILL BE FEATURE TONIGHT'S CARD

## LEATHERS AND MUIR IN MAIN EVENT OF DOUBLE PROGRAM

Pure wrestling with all its scientific features is in store for Medford fans tonight in the main event at the armory when Bud Sam Letthers, limber Texas grappler, tangles with Bonny Muir, burly Australian heavy-weight champion. It is the general opinion that the bout will furnish the closest, fastest and hardest mat-work that Lillard has promoted in some time.

With one wrestler who mixes brains with a pair of long, sinewy legs—Letthers—and one who possesses a thorough knowledge of those crunching holds—Muir—the bout is scheduled to be a clean test between two great artists of the profession. It will be a decided change from the rough-and-tumble, flat-slinging type of grappling which has featured the past several cards.

The Texas' rubber legs are re-awakening much interest among local fight-goers, who witnessed several shows of his clever work during the summer. He is fresh from the invigorating climate of Canada, where he has been the past three months polishing up his devastating rolling scissors and various other ways he knows of twisting an opponent into uncomfortable predicaments with his limber pedal extremities.

Muir is an equally colorful grappler, bringing with him from Australia the British enthusiasm for a fair, hard battle. Standing well over six feet, Bonny has power in every inch of his big frame. He works carefully, keeping on the defensive until he knows that a hold will take effect, then putting it on with surprising speed and skill.

Abe Kaplan, "Jewish Gent" of New York city, is taking the spotlight in the first bout of the double-header. He will be matched with Cliff Thiede, Long Beach life guard, for one hour or two out of three falls. Kaplan, an experienced grappler, who ranks as one of the big-time wrestlers of the country, is experienced in the tricks of the trade, using unorthodox holds with little hesitation.

Thiede, who takes his matwork seriously, is determined to give a good account of himself against the "Jewish Gent." He is experienced and husky but his taste for clean wrestling may be soured in tonight's match. Lillard has made no addition to admission rates this week.
