

Medford-Klamath Tilt Saturday Holds Title Key

SQUADS ANXIOUS MAINTAIN RECORD FREE OF DEFEAT

Heavy And Experienced Pelicans Boast Dangerous Pair of Players—Intense Rivalry Rules Teams.

Two football combinations, Medford and Klamath Falls, who in the past have been barometers of district football fortune, will contest on Van Scoyoc field tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The Klamath Falls Pelicans possess this year one of the heaviest and most experienced teams in the history of the school. The Klamath fullback, a big beefy boy by the name of Haren, and Rogers, a deceptive halfback, will prove bad medicine to any Tigers who try to stop them. These two boys have been the main ground gainers for the Pelicans. It was Rogers who crossed the Ashland goal line three times to provide a win for the Klamath Falls squad over Ashland a week ago.

Leslie May Play
The Pelicans, under the inspirational leadership of Les Avritt, have come thus far in the Southern Oregon football season without a defeat. The games played have been without the services of Bob Leslie, star halfback and co-holder of the state 100-yard dash title, who may be in the lineup Saturday.

A win over Medford by the Pelicans would result in a Klamath Falls celebration comparable to a Monoclonian New Year's celebration.
The Klamathites so far claim the leadership in the Southern Oregon league by their undefeated record.
The powerful Medford high school Tigers, coached by Lerwin K. Burgher, who last year directed his charges to a mythical state title, has successfully avoided any thorn in the path of his Tigers for another state title. The deception and power displayed by the Tigers are something to be proud of, and, as Charlie Erb, Burgher's former coach, said recently: "Parents should be proud to have their sons under the tutelage of such a man."

Tigers Have Support
Again this year, the Medford high school team is backed by student body and citizenry who are anxious to see the Tigers bring in the meat. "Leaping Leo" Ghelardi, who thus far has lived up to the expectations placed upon him by pre-game odds, will more than likely give the Klamathites a merry chase.

Along the broken field prancing of Ghelardi is Bill Bates, stellar line plunger, who has added the needed yardage more than once when the going was tough. These two backs, working with the powerful line, should be places. If the interference clicks in the game tomorrow the Tigers will take care of their end of the score easily.

It has not been reported as to the strength of the Klamath reserves, but in the last two games Coach Burgher proved that he has plenty of power available. Many of the first stringers have been on the injured list, forcing him to count on his reserve strength.

Klamath Fans Rabid
When a football game comparable to a tilt between Medford and Klamath Falls is played in Klamath Falls, business men of Klamath put up signs on their doors which read: "Closed; gone to the game." It was reported that some of the business men of Klamath are going to close Saturday and are planning on coming to the game here. Some of the Klamath Falls fans are said to be planning to come to Medford for the game.

However, there is one thing certain—whichever wins that game tomorrow afternoon will certainly have to play four quarters of real football.

WOUNDED LETHERS PROVES EASY FOR AUSTRALIAN MUIR

Entering the main event at the armory last night with a bullet wound in his thigh, received recently from an accidental pistol discharge, Earl Sam Lethers, slim Texan grappler, started off the inevitable for 22 minutes of brilliant, clean wrestling, then lost the match in a deciding fall of 30 seconds to big Bonny Muir, Australian champion, when the islander applied a stretch to Earl Sam's already useless leg. The wound was reopened when Muir fell backward in a rolling scissors, and used a press to win the first fall.

The Texan's rubber legs functioned well during the first period despite the wound, in the best exhibition of scientific wrestling offered at the armory arena for many months. Frequent applause showed the audience's appreciation of the spectacular performance put on by the two men.

Although Lethers favored his hurt leg from the first gong, he kept the upper hand during most of the contest, proving the cleverest of the two grapplers. Using a variety of holds, he kept Muir on the defensive, successfully avoiding the Australian's occasional sonnenbergs, but at times falling victim to the islander's crumpling head locks and powerful firing mares.

Muir, 205, proved an excellent opponent for Lethers, 211. The bout saw only one flurry of fist-swinging, which was settled with a handshake. Lethers finally trusted his lame leg to one of his ordinarily devastating rolling scissors, but was severely crippled when the huge Australian hurled backward in the maneuver that decided the match.

The bullet wound was received three weeks ago near Portland, while the Texan was riding in an automobile. An automatic revolver laying on

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CRONIN SUCCEEDS BUCKY HARRIS AS RED SOX MANAGER

Boston Team Pays High Price For 28-Year Old Senator Shortstop—Ruth Rumored As Successor.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Joe Cronin, young manager of the Washington American league baseball team, was sold today to the Boston Red Sox and reports here said he was given a five-year contract as player-manager. In one of the biggest major league deals of recent years, Boston bought the 28-year-old shortstop for a price reported to be the highest ever paid for a player, considerably more than the \$125,000 the Yankees paid for Babe Ruth in 1919. The Red Sox also sent Shortstop Lyndon Lary to the Senators.

Cronin will succeed Stanley (Bucky) Harris as the Red Sox manager, it was understood here. Harris, who lives here, was on a hunting trip today and Mrs. Harris said the deal was "news" to her. The sudden sale of Cronin brought speculation here as to whom President Clark Griffith would select as manager for the Senators next season. It is known Griffith highly regards Harris, and it also has been rumored that Griffith would like to have George Herman (Babe) Ruth at the local helm.

S. S. EMPRESS OF JAPAN, enroute to Tokyo, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Reports Babe Ruth would succeed Connie Mack as manager of the Philadelphia Athletics next season met a blunt reception from the "A's" manager today. "My ambition," commented the 71-year-old baseball veteran, "is to continue as manager of the Athletics until I have passed my 80th birthday."

Mack is leading a barnstorming tour of the Orient, with Ruth as field manager.

SONS WILL PLAY LINFIELD TONIGHT
