

# AMERICAN LEGION OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR MEMBERSHIPS

Membership work of Medford American Legion post will be carried on this year under able leadership of Cole Holmes, first vice commander, and his committee chairmen. Dues can be paid any time and card will be issued immediately. There will be no better way to show your faith in the new officers than to pay your dues now.

Do you know that one of the major activities of the American Legion is the welfare of the war veteran? Every American will agree that the care and cure of America's disabled veterans is right and necessary. The Legion, reaching 11,000 posts and 6,500 auxiliary units into the very home of the disabled man and his family, is an agency which is actually able to make government relief effective; an agency daily converting government machinery, law and red tape into a vital, human instrument for care and cure.

It has been the American Legion, through its national rehabilitation service, which has insisted that government relief be directed toward permanent care of veterans, through modern hospitals and modern methods. The Legion's few dollars have wisely supplanted the government's millions.

As a red-blooded American, you approve of our work, we are sure. But, in your opinion, does such approval relieve you of responsibility to your disabled comrades? This work is yours, and it is ours. Your disabled buddies want you on their side.

There is another responsibility assumed by the Legion which goes almost hand in hand with rehabilitation, and that is child welfare. The term, "child welfare," covers a wide range of activity. It includes better schools, better books and better playgrounds. It also includes pure food for children, physical and mental education, dental clinics and summer outings. It included, too, mothers' pension laws, child labor protection, creation of juvenile courts and adoption laws.

There are all these, in addition to actual care, maintenance, education and supervision. In its broadest sense, it means everything and anything affecting the life of the child. The deepest obligation of every service man, in or out of the Legion, is the promotion of better citizenship. We learned this lesson in our war service, and it is being made clearer to us in our everyday life. Members of the American Legion are trying to fulfill this obligation by devotion to the sense of Americanism. Through the Americanism commission of the Legion, the work of 11,000 posts is co-ordinated in teaching love of country, respect for flag and better citizenship.

In some instances, where schools were closed due to lack of funds necessary to carry on, the Legion has raised the money to continue them for duration of the term. The Legion inaugurated, in 1923, a move which resulted in the first universal flag code ever adopted in America. It has interested itself in physical education, in night schools and in every phase of better government.

You have an opportunity to share in this great work and help advance the Legion's program. We cannot believe that there is any phase of the Legion's program, either national or local, with which you are not in sympathy. Should there be, then that is one more reason why you should become a member. Let's remember that we did not help win the war by staying on the outside. After you have done your part, you will be looking as matters from the other side. We believe you will be just as enthusiastic about this Legion of ours as any of us.

We are constantly striving to make the Legion bigger and better and we want your help. Thus, your dues and mine actually help to accomplish the unselfish program of the Legion—first in the post, then in the department, and finally in the national organization.

Members gain experience by serving on committees and as officers of the post. They learn how to do things. There are men who rate high in the community who belong to the post. Legionnaires help one another. Then again, how about the good times that go with membership? The opportunity of rubbing elbows with your comrades with every one on an equal footing? The keeping in touch with those things which are of particular interest to service men? How about your Legion monthly? If the time comes when you need advice on problems connected with your service, where are you going to turn? As a member of the Legion, your interests are protected and you get a great deal more for your membership than you realize. Can you find a

## ASHLAND TO FACE G. PASS SATURDAY

ASHLAND, Oct. 26.—(Special)—Coach Don Faber's Ashland high school Grizzlies will take on their sixth opponent of the current season at Ashland Saturday afternoon when they tangle with the Grants Pass Cavemen in the resumption of a football war which started at Grants Pass two weeks ago with Ashland winning a southern Oregon conference game, 8-0.

The game Saturday will not be a conference affair as each league member plays the others but once with the result counting toward the title. With the lightest team in the circuit, Ashland has been forced to resort to a brilliant passing attack in order to gain ground and most of their touchdowns so far have been counted either directly by the aerial path or by passes which worked the ball into scoring position.

Ashland's record so far shows a victory over the SONS Reserves, 14-0, one against Grants Pass, 8-0, a scoreless tie with Dunsmuir and defeats at the hands of Klamath Falls and Eureka by identical scores of 19-0.

## GIRL GOLFERS TO WORRY OLDSTERS WITHIN FEW YEARS

That much, at least, the 38th women's national golf championship proved in addition to the fact that Virginia Van Wie is the best mashie swinger of her sex in the nation. Dorothy Traung, the 20-year-old San Francisco golf prodigy, who forced Miss Van Wie to put on a championship finish to retain her title for the second successive year, right now is at the head of the list of juniors who in a few years should be well armed to take up the cause.

Save for a strong facial resemblance to Helen Hicks, Miss Traung, standing on a tee, looks anything but a golfer. The minute she takes a club in hand and swings it through, there is an astonishing transformation of a chubby, cheerful girl into a serious and rhythmic golfer.

She came from her home on the Pacific coast to the championship on a lark. In the newspapers she read that the qualifying limit had been increased to 64. Maybe she'd qualify! Doughty Dorothy did qualify, and she caused some eyebrow lifting in the second round when she eliminated Diana Paiswick, former British champion and the most feared foreign threat.

And a few days later she took the measure of Mrs. Hill in the semifinals and when Miss Van Wie came through over Mrs. Vares in the other semi-final some experts rated the girl from the golden west an even chance against Virginia.

It may be climbing out on the limb for sports' sake, but it's beginning to look like there's no hope of Maureen Orcutt ever winning the national championship. The flaxen-haired New Jersey star has won just about every other major title on the continent, but he's never succeeded in the national.

Miss Orcutt went out in the third round of this year's championship, beaten by Mrs. Carl H. Danner, another New Jersey player, who until this year was practically unknown in the golf world.

## GOVERNOR RACE MAIN INTEREST COUNTY VOTERS

Jackson county enters the final week of the political campaign with citizens manifesting less interest, and making fewer bets on the results, than at any time in the memory of the oldest inhabitants.

The little interest abroad is centered chiefly in the race for governor and the 30 per cent tax limitation amendment. The only hot bed is that Upton Sinclair, California gubernatorial candidate, will receive at least 150 write-in votes in Jackson county.

War horses of both the Democratic and Republican parties have been skirmishing around the county the past ten days and report they find considerable sentiment for Zimmerman for governor in the rural areas. In Ashland, main talk is about the local option election, and the prediction is freely made that the Lithia City will definitely be in the dry

column when the votes are counted. Wilbur Ashpole reports that he has been all over the county and finds "very little interest in county races, and least of all in the candidates for the legislature." Democratic candidates for county offices—judge, sheriff and commissioner—have been making house-to-house campaigns. It is expected that the campaign will warm up in the final week and that the air will be full of oratory, canards, and what-have-you. The election will be held a week from next Tuesday with polling places the same as at the May primary. The polls will open at 8 in the morning and close at 8 in the evening.
