

HUNTERS LEAVE HAUNTS OF DEER AS SEASON ENDS

With the close of the deer hunting season last night it was revealed, besides the fact that many Medford hunters have taken successful advantage of the season, that the closing days have been free from law breaking. State police of the game division warn successful hunters that hides of their prize must be tagged. Quoting from the Oregon game code, state police stated today: "It shall be unlawful at any time more than 10 days after the close of the hunting season to have in one's possession any hide or hides of deer or elk which said hides have not been tagged with the tag or seal of the game commission as herein provided." Many duck hunters are still unaware of the fact that shooting migratory waterfowl is limited to Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays only, and that the season is closed on intervening days, according to officers. Duck hunters are also warned that shooting is prohibited without possession of the federal bird hunting stamp obtainable at the postoffice for \$1.

Although many hunters have not yet returned from their final forays of the season, the list of those who have shot their bucks during the last few days showed a big increase over the number who made kills during the stormy middle period of the season.

Successful hunters include: Dr. D. W. Stone, who turned a business call into a last-minute deer-bagging trip yesterday afternoon, when he went to a Lake Creek farm to treat a sick horse, took his gun along and returned to Medford the proud possessor of a four-point buck. Lawrence E. Cuffel of 1510 West Main street was another fortunate last-minute hunter, returning yesterday from the Big Butte country with two blacktail deer, one weighing 101½ and the other 119½ pounds. Cuffel shot both animals during the last afternoon of the season.

Other hunters include: Irwin Daley, who shot a four-point animal in Orizaba canyon, returning yesterday with Fred Coffey, L. Charley, who shot a 156-pound buck near Lake Creek on a two-day trip; Jack Denison and John Winterhalter, who returned from Dog Lake with one buck; Wm. Coy and Frank Dorden, who hunted unsuccessfully near Brown mountain; Al Booth, who has little luck on an eastern Oregon trip; S. N. Hawk and H. L. Vandermark, who also had no luck; Hugo Lange, who shot a 22½-pound mule deer; Scott Darby, who shot one buck; Pete Toscan, who got a four-point mule deer near Lakeview.

"Would you stop feeling the hungry? Would you stop helping the unemployed?" she asked.

Mrs. Roosevelt went on to say she appreciated "the value of meetings such as these because they give us a chance to hear various points of view no matter how much we may not agree with them."

Some members of the audience broke into applause.
