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

### Another "Whopper" by Air-Flow Joe

MANY and startling are the promises which are thrown out by candidates for public office, but truly amazing is the "whopper" which the amiable Joe Dunne has developed in suggesting tax relief through diverting to the federal government proceeds of Bonneville power. Under what candidate Joe calls the "Boulder Dam" plan of operation, 37.5 per cent of the gross receipts for power, the rest going to the federal government to pay operating expenses and retire the investment which has started at \$32,500,000. This is merely a variation of the plan already agreed upon for Bonneville and supported by General Martin as a matter of sense, but to get attention a "new front" has been devised by the re-sounding Republican.

Says big-hearted Joe:  
"Oregon and Washington would each receive 18.75 per cent of the net proceeds, which, with full development of Bonneville, would probably amount to \$15,000,000 annually to each state. I favor the IMMEDIATE RECEIPT of this tremendous sum of money, amounting to about \$12,000,000 a year thus assuring for the future the safety and continuance of our schools, and with the rest of the state taxes amounting to about \$3,800,000, it would mean that the state would be free from either state or school taxes which with the retention of the bonded indebtedness would give the lowest tax rate of any state in the Union."  
Dear old taxpayers! You could tell me anything if it weren't for the fact that even taxpayers have an elementary knowledge of figures.

Mr. Dunne, you get by the most optimistic engineering calculations 1,728,168,000 kilowatt hours of prime energy and 891,288,200 kilowatt hours of secondary energy.  
If you assume it will be possible to charge as much as 3 mills per KWH for prime energy and 1 mill for secondary, the gross annual revenue will be \$4,847,618, of which the state's share under the Dunne program would be only \$876,332, a year—a very nice sum but not \$15,000,000 by a long jump. What is more than likely is that Bonneville power will have to be sold at 1 mill for primary and half a mill for secondary for many years to lure industry and increase domestic consumers. In that case the total revenue drops to \$2,178,809 a year and Oregon's share to \$380,416—still a nice sum but not \$15,000,000.


