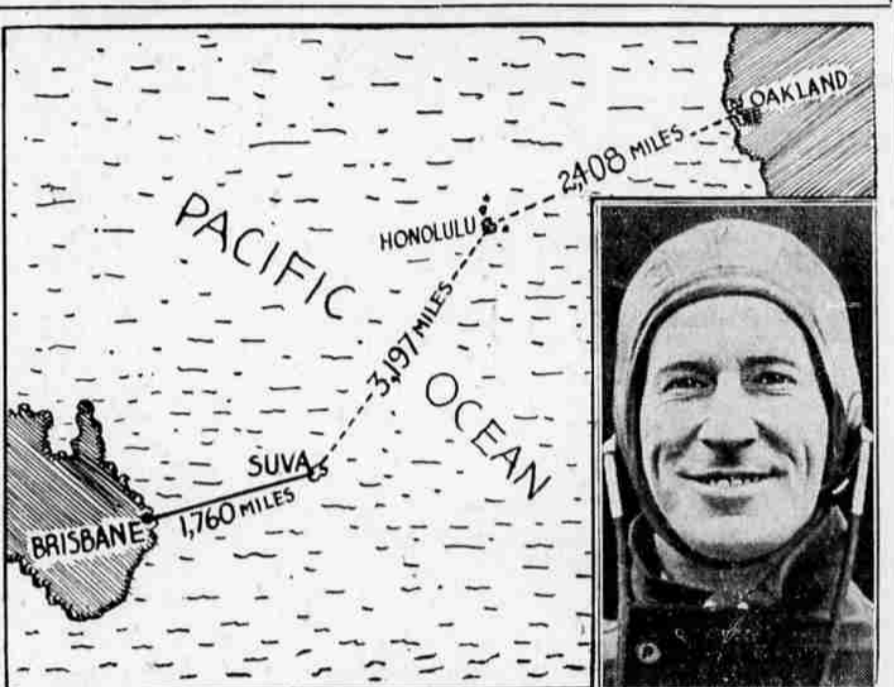

British and American Delegations Term Nipponese Request for Strength Equality Is Unacceptable

LONDON, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The delegations of the three big naval powers—the United States, Great Britain and Japan—reached a crossroads in their pathway toward naval agreement when the British and Americans today termed the Japanese proposal for a new treaty based on the principle of equality unacceptable, and put the next move up to Japan.

Certainly no one will attempt to relate that Mr. Roosevelt made any promises on the side, but there is reason to believe that he, or those competent to speak for him, did give the bankers a better private explanation of the money situation than they had when they came.

The dollar is stabilized now in fact. It has been stabilized on a gold standard at this level since last January. The stabilization is what lawyers would call de facto. The only monetary uncertainty is purely psychological. That is, some people fear this stabilization will be changed some day.

What the conservatives have been wanting is stabilization de jure. That is a complicated way of saying they want irrevocable stabilization by law. The only way that stabilization would differ from the one we have now is that it would close the door to any future monetary action.

Some of Mr. Roosevelt's conservative advisers who really know the inside of the world monetary situation believe that kind of stabilization would not be stabilization at all.
