## PACIFIC FLIGHT TO LOS ANGELES SLATED TUESDAY

(Continued from page one) they held strictly to their course until the oblong-shaped island of Molokai loomed through the clouds. Made it in 12 1/2 hours.

On the 1928 flight, the then Captain Kingsford-Smith and three others, including Co-pilot C. T. P. Uim, Navigator Harry W. Lyon and Radio Operator James Warner, flew a tri-motored monoplane to Australia in three principal legs—from Oakland to Wheeler field, from the Barking Sands on Kauai island to Suva, Fiji, and from Naeali Beach to Brisbane.

It was agreed at that time that the Hawai-Fiji section of the flight was the most hazardous, due to utter lack of weather reports. As a matter of fact, the big monoplane was near disaster at one stage of that flight in a tropical storm before Kingsford-Smith, straining each of her three motors to the maximum, pulled above it into the light of a full moon.

Encounter Storm. Again this morning, in the smaller plane, a storm was encountered in the vicinity of the equator, and even at 15,000 feet altitude it gave trouble before it and the plane parted company. From there into Honolulu it was clear sailing.

The plane arrived over Honolulu 24 hours and 50 minutes after leaving Fiji, and landed at Wheeler field a quarter of an hour later. "I'm okeh, but tired," Sir Charles said as he alighted from the plane, adding that the flight was "smooth sailing" most of the way.

## Crawford-Gable Win New Laurels

The new Joan Crawford-Clark Gable co-starring picture, "Chained," which opened yesterday at the Craterian theater, bids fair to become one of the most popular of the four these two screen favorites have made. Telling the love story of one woman—and two men—elaborately produced and colorfully presented, "Chained" has much to recommend it in addition to its perfectly chosen cast. Modernity tined, the locales being New York, shipboard, a ranch in the Argentine, New York again and an Adirondack hunting lodge, it concerns itself with a situation that is peculiarly modern.

In a triangle, which has a fourth angle, Otto Kruger, wealthy and middle-aged, prevails upon his wife for a divorce so that he might marry Joan Crawford. Complications arise when the wife refuses to divorce him and the beautiful Miss Crawford is sent on an ocean voyage to South America. Aboard ship she meets Gable and his buddy, Stuart Erwin, and, after a few comedy situations that add zest to the story, the two fall in love. At his ranch in the Argentine, she tells him about the other man and insists upon returning to New York to tell him of her new love. Kruger, now divorced, sweeps her off her feet and only a curt note tells Gable of their marriage.

A year passes. The now married woman again meets Gable, and although they both try to fight it, the old flame again seizes them. Joan, realizing her folly, insists Kruger take her to his hunting lodge immediately. Gable, no longer willing to deny himself what he feels is rightfully his, follows. And, in a dramatic sequence, the two men meet and the story is brought to a highly satisfactory climax.

Joan Crawford is lovelier in this picture than in anything she has appeared in for some time, and Gable again indulges in some of the comedy that he revealed in "It Happened One Night." Stuart Erwin, as always when in the proper role, is eminently satisfactory as Gable's friend, and Kruger, as the middle-aged and wealthy Richard Field, adds another deft characterization to his rapidly growing list. As his player, in the part of Gable's cook and handyman at his ranch, makes the most of his small opportunity and adds several laughs to the story. The balance of the cast is equally well chosen.
