

SONS, MONMOUTH GAME DEFINITELY SET FOR ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Oct. 30.—(Sp.)—Despite rumors to the contrary, the most colorful game on the football schedule of the Southern Oregon Normal school will be played in Ashland on Friday, November 2, at 2 o'clock.

Monmouth Normal will be the opponent, and plenty of sparks fly when these two teams clash. Monmouth is known as a team with a bag-full of tricks, executed by a brilliant backfield. An excellent aerial attack, interspersed with many a razz-dazzle play, should provide southern Oregon football fans with an interesting grid menu.

Regardless of season records, the two normal school outfits go at it hammer-and-tongue. Monmouth won two years ago in Ashland, but the Sons retaliated last year when the game was played in Portland. The contest made such a hit with Portland fans that the two schools were offered generous financial backing if they would play there again this season. Ashland business men, however, decided they wanted to see the tilt and won the lease by an underwriting agreement.

Further co-operation on the part of local merchants is in the offing with the announcement today that many stores are in favor of closing doors during the hours of the game on Friday. Further announcements will be made in regard to this more later.

MUIR AND WAGNER TO SHOW SCIENCE

Fans are awaiting next Thursday night's wrestling card at the armory with great expectations of seeing an exhibition of the wrestling game as it should be presented, between two experienced, but class, mat artists such as Bonny Muir, Australian champion, and Don Wagner, former Oregon State grid star. Their bout, the main event of another two-day performance, should meet with even more approval than the match last week between Sad Sam Letters and the Australian.

Wagner, because of an injury sustained here last spring in a match with Gus Sonnenberg, has been forced to stay out of the ring until a few weeks ago, when he made his return to Portland. He is an experienced grappler, and has a knowledge of many clever, scientific holds. Australian Muir has become one of the most popular exponents of the trust and grime game yet to appear at the armory.

The semi-final event bids fair to provide another hour or two out of three falls of good entertainment, when Billy Newman, "bad boy" of the ring from Denver, tangles with a newcomer to the Medford arena. Jim Mahoney, of Los Angeles, Newman is an unorthodox grappler, who has demonstrated his "wars" here several times, and is set to carry on his mean matwork against the southerner.

JUNIORS GRIDIRON TILT POSTPONED

Due to the final decision of football officials to hold the Southern Oregon Normal-Monmouth football game at the Ashland high school field Friday afternoon, the game between Medford and Ashland Junior high schools, previously scheduled for the same time and place has been postponed.

Coch Ray Henderson of the Junior high school stated the game may be played early next week.

75 JUNIOR HIGH GOLFERS ENROLL

Seventy-five boys answered Coach Ray Henderson's call for members of Junior high school to enter the boys' golf team now being organized. Henderson stated today. TIGERS PREPARING FOR ANCIENT FOES COMING SATURDAY

With the hardest games of the season now history, the championship-bound Medford Tigers are nursing sore muscles and injuries in preparation for the invasion of the Ashland Grizzlies here Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Ashland high is in a better position this year to question the strength of Medford high than for the past three years. Although they were defeated by Klamath Falls, 15 to 6, Klamath in turn defeated Grants Pass by a narrow margin of 12 to 6. Ashland walloped Grants Pass, 25 to 0, making them appear a stronger team than Klamath Falls to date, although they were defeated by the Pelicans. But Medford turned on the heat and warped Klamath, 20 to 9, giving Medford the advantage in statistics.

According to a report of the game between Ashland and the Pass, Ashland opened with a running attack against the Cavenham which it had failed to uncover so far this season. Rivalry will be at peak next Saturday when these two teams meet. The rivalry between Ashland and Medford surpasses any between Medford and any other team. Coach Don Faber of Ashland high school has not won a football contest from Medford high school and he believes this will be the week that he is going to take the Tigers into camp.

Blondie Lewis, one of Medford's most valuable players, will be out of the lineup for the rest of the season with an injured leg sustained in the Klamath Falls game last Saturday. The doctor put his leg in a cast. Bob Smith, who has been an alternate backfield man, will probably take his place. Coach Burgher declared that the rest of his players were in excellent condition. Ashland came out of the game Saturday with the Grants Pass eleven injured.
