

### KERR SEES PERIL IN LIMITING TAX

CORVALLIS, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Opposition to the proposed 20-mill tax limitation amendment so far as its application to Oregon is concerned, was voiced by Dr. W. J. Kerr, chancellor of higher education.

At a convocation meeting of students, faculty members and residents of Corvallis, Dr. Kerr analyzed the proposed amendment that said that while it may be laudable in purpose it is entirely unsuited to conditions in Oregon and is bound to be destructive and unjust in effect.

The entire tax it would be possible to collect in Oregon for school purposes should the measure pass, Dr. Kerr said, would fall more than one million dollars short of the total used in 1933 for elementary schools alone, and if all high schools are closed, there would not be enough left to operate the elementary schools.

### Inauguration of U.S.-China Airline Seen Next Year With Giant Planes

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Business men bound for the orient and pleasure voyagers off to far eastern travel mecca soon may be boarding giant flying boats for swift transport over the world's largest ocean.

In view of the post office department's announcement that plans are being made for establishment "at an early date" of an American-controlled airline to China, the inauguration of a trans-Pacific flying service within a year is considered a likely prospect.

Pan-American Airways, which operates an international network of 30,000 miles serving principally South America and Central America, is reported ready to undertake the project. Government announcement of the enterprise is taken to indicate that the post office department will award mail contracts to help finance the service should it prove as feasible as now believed.

Via American Possessions

The most likely route would be from some California airport via the American possessions in the Pacific such as Hawaii, Guam, the Philippines, and Canton, and connecting with airlines now operated in China by Pan-American in conjunction with the Chinese government. Pan-American officials have said a test flight will be made within a few weeks.

Preparing for trans-oceanic service, the company some time ago ordered six huge flying boats, one of which, the Brazilian Clipper, already has been in operation between Miami and South America.

The Brazilian Clipper, a four-engine craft 78 feet long, has been rated capable of a non-stop flight of 2,500 miles with crew and a mail load of 1,000 pounds. With full passenger load of 32 persons, mail and express cargo, the cruising range has been set at 1,200 miles.

The longest hop on the Pacific run would be from California to Honolulu, some 2,500 miles, which would indicate that a larger ship than the Clipper might be needed for that trip if a maximum pay-load were carried.

Ekener Here For Talks

It has been estimated that the Honolulu run could be made in 15 to 17 hours and the remainder of the trip to China in 37 to 40 hours flying time. Stops would be made for fuel pickups at American-controlled islands.

Coincidental with renewed talk of the Pacific service, Dr. Hugo Eckener of Graf Zeppelin fame was reported ready to discuss plans for placing his newest dirigible, the giant LZ-120, into service on a trans-atlantic route serving the United States.

Sees Trans-Ocean Service

Much interest is evident in aviation circles as a result of the performances of two American-built transport planes in the London-Melbourne air derby. Second place in the race went to K. D. Parmentier and J. J. Moll, Dutch fliers, whose ship was a Douglas twin-motored monoplane and carried three passengers besides a crew of six to within 200 miles of the finish. Another American plane, a Boeing transport, was piloted by Colonel Roscoe Turner and Clyde E. Pangborn, who came in third.

Fog has been a detriment to inauguration of a North Atlantic service, while the establishment of a southern route to Europe by way of Bermuda, the Azores and Spain has been impeded by international complications.

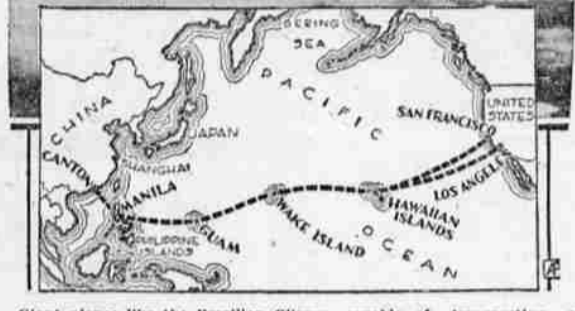
Colonel Lindbergh told the federal aviation commission, however, that the United States will be able to establish trans-oceanic mail service within a few months.

### SIP WHILE SEATED WASHINGTON RULE

OLYMPIA, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The Washington liquor control board moved today to eliminate the old prohibition custom of drinking at bars.

The board adopted a new regulation prohibiting the drinking of beer and wine while standing at a bar. The regulation will not become effective until January 1, 1935, however.

The board's action was taken in an attempt to remove all aspects of the old saloon from retail beer and wine dispensaries, Chairman Luther E. Gregory explained.

Under the new regulation consumers of beer and wine must sit at a table or counter to sip their beverages.

The board, in a statement, however, pointed out that its new regulation should be regarded at first as an experiment.
