## SISKIYOU HIGHWAY GRADING CONTRACT IS AWARDED BERKE

Four-Tenths Mile Job to Cost \$93,990—Little Butte Grading Goes to Edward F. Webber On \$9544 Bid

PORTLAND, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The largest road jobs let by the state highway commission here late yesterday were awarded to Berke Bros. of Portland, following checking of bids and corrections of totals announced during the opening of estimates earlier in the day. The firm was awarded the two jobs in Jackson and Deschutes counties, totaling \$153,272.

Theodore Arenz, Portland contractor, whose total on two other jobs was found to be lower than the estimates of Earl L. McNutt of Eugene when the bids were checked, was given the next largest slice of the commission's half million dollar letting. He was awarded, subject to final approval of the public works administration, the two jobs in Polk county amounting to \$111,927.

Siskiyou Job to Berke. The awards to Berke brothers included the four-tenths mile grading job on the Pacific highway in the Siskiyou mountains, in Jackson county, for \$93,990, and the six and a half mile grading to finish the work on the Redmond-Bend section of the Dalles-California route in Deschutes county for \$59,282.

The Polk county jobs tentatively granted to Arenz included the four miles grading and eight miles oil mat surfacing of the Dalles-Coast secondary highway at \$81,994, and the two miles grading and three miles surfacing of the Independence secondary highway at \$29,933.

One Out-of-State Winner. The only successful out-of-state bidder was the Colonial Construction company, Spokane, which was awarded for \$92,516 the job of grading 5.96 miles and constructing two reinforced concrete bridges on the Hayden Gulch-West Forest boundary section of Little Sheep Creek secondary highway in Walla Walla county.

Other awards were: Benton county—Grading 2.31 miles of South Fork-Dummer creek section of the Abies-Dawood secondary highway, to D. L. Ashton, Lebanon \$23,243.

Douglas county—Furnishing crushed gravel in stock piles on Mystic

to A. B. Wallace, Roseburg, \$9000. Webber, Succesful.

Jackson county—Grading .97 mile of McAllister section of Little Butte secondary highway, to Edward F. Webber, Medford, \$9544.50. Webber was the second lowest bidder, but Ashton, who was low, had agreed to take only one job.

Malheur county—Grading 5.86 miles of the Blue Mountain Pass section of the Idaho-Oregon-Nevada highway, to O. N. Pierce, Portland, \$35,342.

Morrow county—Grading 3.1 miles and surfacing 6.2 miles of Hardman-Chapin Creek section of the Repper-Spray secondary highway, to Fischer Bros., Oregon City, \$32,886.

Awards were held up pending the settlement of rights of way on these projects.

Curry county—Grading and surfacing 42 mile of church section of Cape Blanco secondary highway, F. C. Dillard, Medford, \$9471.

Klamath county—Furnishing crushed rock in stock piles on the Klamath rock production project on the Dalles-California and Green Springs highways, Newport Construction company, Newport, \$20,700 for 9000 cubic yards of rock near Beaver Marsh; R. I. Stuart & Son, Medford, \$9250 for 5000 cubic yards of rock near Modoc Point and \$9750 for 8000 cubic yards near Keno.

The Wilsonville ferry award went to the Maryhill Ferry company, Wilsonville, which for \$15,940 will run a 15-car boat across the river for two years, starting December 1.

## INDIANS ACCEPT REORGANIZATION BY REFERENDUM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The Indian reorganization act, heralded by opponents as a "bill of rights" for the red men, was reported today in final returns to the Indian bureau to have been accepted by 31 of 32 reservations which voted on it October 27.

The Apaches of Fort Apache, Ariz., were the only Indians to oppose the measure.

The balloting covered nearly a fourth of the country's Indian population outside of Oklahoma. In that state Indians were excluded from the voting by provisions of the legislation.

John Collier, commissioner of Indian affairs, said today that the act provided the Indians "their only chance to save themselves from economic extinction and they are for it, as this referendum shows."

The act authorizes Indian tribes to organize and incorporate under federal charter, authorizes appro-

prisons of \$2,000,000 annually for land to restore to the red men part of their once large holdings, does away with allocation of tribal lands to individual Indians and provides \$250,000 yearly for educational loans.

Collier said 85 per cent of eligible voters cast ballots.

Approximately 30,000 Indians were estimated to have voted.
