MONMOUTH NOSES OUT SONS, 7 TO 6

Both teams scoring on flukes of the game, the SONS of Ashland went down to defeat Friday afternoon before the strong Oregon Normal school football team from Monmouth 7 to 6 before a good sized crowd.

On the opening kickoff to SONS, Monmouth on the first play received a break that looked like a sure scoring opportunity when Mahoney, SONS center, made a bad pass from center causing the ball to roll to the SONS' six-yard line where Monmouth recovered. Monmouth drew two penalties and threw a series of line bucks and end runs reached the SONS' one yard line. There SONS came forth with a stone wall. Little Mahoney, SONS center, took the snap, and SONS tackle, and Ward Howell, another SONS player, repeatedly threw D. Mahn and B. Mahn, Monmouth backs, for losses and helped their team stay off the touchdown drive.

However, after an exchange of punts the Monmouth griders were back pounding on the SONS' door hounding for a touchdown. It was on a blocked punt that the Wolfe gang made the touchdown. Yetad, Monmouth right end, turned on the speed and rushed Bradcock, SONS' fullback and punter, blocked it, then ran half way across the field and caught it, then lit out down the field like a scared jack-rabbit for the touchdown. It was about a thirty yard run. D. Mahn kicked the extra point from placement.

The SONS were not to be denied, however, for within the next three minutes Bradcock intercepted a fumble that was knocked in the air when a Monmouth back was tackled by a SON and ran 50 yards for a touchdown. Bradcock's placekick was blocked by a Monmouth lineman.

At the kickoff of the second half, Hobson's men pulled a trick from the bag that just missed going for a touchdown by about 15 yards. The play started from the kickoff formation. The ball was kicked to center and on the SONS' 10 yard line or thereabouts and a SON took it and started for the center of the field with the linemen fading back to form a wedge. The ball was not seen until Hasmussen was a full 10 yards down the field. Hasmussen proceeded to the 10 yard line where he was tackled by the Monmouth safety who proved himself to possess a little more speed. Had Hasmussen possessed a little more speed he would have gone for a touchdown. Cliff McLean, proved an asset to the SONS by his long gains and return of punts.

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STATE CHIEF OF LEGION TELLS OF BONUS AND HUEY

Speaking before a group of approximately 50 Legionnaires and auxiliary members from Grants Pass, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Kerby, in a meeting held at the court house auditorium last night, W. J. Chamberlin, of Corvallis, department commander of the American Legion, gave an interesting review of the work accomplished and the objective set forth at the national convention recently held in Miami, Fla. Mr. Chamberlin was enroute home from the convalescence, and left Medford Saturday morning.

Although the convention did not unanimously demand the bonus payment, Mr. Chamberlin said, delegations from 17 states brought with them the demands which made the vote nine to one in favor of immediate payment. "If the government is going to continue to pass out money right and left," the state commander told local Legionnaires, "with the intention of creating purchasing power, the Legion believes now is the time to retire the debt at the least expense."

"The debt paid now will do more good than had it been paid at any time within the past 15 years, or than if it is paid at any time within the next 15," he continued. "The Legion believes there is no better way to create purchasing power than immediate payment, which will not increase the national debt, and which will remove a burden from local communities."

Besides payment of the compensation, Mr. Chamberlin discussed the two other main issues brought before the convention—the universal draft and national defense, explaining each and showing their connection.

"The Legion's main objectives for the coming year," he said, "are an endeavor to get through a universal draft bill, and to make a strong right against communism and its forms. The Legion stands for a rigid control of aliens within the United States."

Mr. Chamberlin said Oregon was well considered at the convalescence, despite its quota of only 15 votes. The west was fortunate, he said, in having Frank Belgrano, of San Francisco, elected national commander, and Oregon was equally fortunate in having Harold Warner, of Pendleton, chosen national vice-commander, with Dewey Powell, of Klamath Falls, chosen national vice-commander of the "40 and 8."

The state commander also told the group that the "key speech" of the convalescence was given by Fred Steiner, United States senator from Oregon. Mr. Chamberlin served on the legislative committee of the convention, which was comprised of representatives from Italy, France, Alaska, Hawaii, Cuba, as well as from all 48 states.

Mr. Chamberlin included in his talk an interesting description of the conditions he found in Louisiana under Huey Long's influence, where he said Long controls 70 per cent of the state's non-property owners.

"Huey Long, who owns and lives at the Roosevelt hotel, which he never leaves without a bodyguard, obtained 4000 votes from a Louisiana precinct in which there had been only 1500 registered," Mr. Chamberlin said. "He built and now owns one of the finest airports in the world in New Orleans, and is constructing a vast amount of highways and bridges with his great wealth. Now he is looking over a section of northern Texas with a view to buying or occupying it, where he hopes to reign in a 'monarchy' of his own."

Mr. Chamberlin said in regard to Miami as a convention city, "Miami is a poor convention city. High prices forced two trainloads of delegates to pull out in the first part of the convalescence."

Lester Finley, district commander from Klamath Falls, and Wm. Canton, also of Klamath Falls, formerly of the Medford post, attended the meeting, as did the commanders from Ashland and Grants Pass. Mr. Chamberlin made the last part of his return trip by auto with Mrs. Chamberlin, who motored here Friday.

LIGHT TREMBLERS FELT NORTHWEST WASHINGTON AREA

SEATTLE, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Old Mount St. so-called because it is older than the other mountains about it at the edge of the Cascades, was blamed today for a slight earthquake felt in much of northwestern Washington early today.

The tremor rattled dishes and windows but many persons did not notice it. No damage was reported. Seattle, Mount Vernon, Tacoma, Bremerton, Bellingham, Skykomish, Sedro-Woolley, Concrete and the Baker river country felt it.

The quake was recorded for two minutes by the University of Washington seismograph. It started at 6:52 a. m., Pacific standard time. Mount St. 4,150 feet high, was blamed for tremors felt in Seattle two years ago.

G. E. Goodspeed, associate professor of geology, said a geologic fault runs north and south along the juncture of the Mount St. rock with the newer Cascade mountain rock formation in the Snoqualmie area. A "fault" is a geological term meaning a dislocation of rock strata, usually on an inclined plane, and the earth tremors are usually set up by the friction of one mass of rock sliding down over the face of another.

Ellensburg, on the east side of the Cascades, which has been experiencing minor earthquakes with more or less regularly during the summer and fall, apparently because of a fault in the near-by hills, did not feel today's shock. However, it had 10 distinct shocks Thursday night.

Quake at Tacoma
TACOMA, Nov. 3.—(AP)—A light earthquake was felt here just before 7 o'clock this morning. It awoke sleepers in various parts of the city but no damage was reported.

Beginning this month through December, the units will be instructed on the use of the guide pattern by Alice Martin, acting home demonstration agent. Methods of drafting various designs and effects in the blouse, neckline, sleeves and skirt from the simple but perfectly fitting guide pattern will be given. Each woman will draft a pattern for a simple cotton dress.

The buymanship meetings will consist this month of a study of history, covering the points of the best wearing hose and helpful suggestions on economical hosiery buying for the family.

How Can Anyone Trust Joe Dunne?

Referring to Congressman Martin's reports of allotments of federal money made to Oregon, Joe Dunne, to the amazement of all Oregon, keeps on repeating that "every cent secured will have to be repaid."

Between \$50,000,000 and \$70,000,000, as all citizens know, will not "have to be repaid." Take Bonneville alone: \$31,000,000 there is an outright gift as river and harbor improvement. Yet Mr. Dunne, who cannot but be fully aware of the facts, keeps on telling citizens that "every cent secured will have to be repaid."

And as if this were not enough, Mr. Dunne, to the utter astonishment of all informed citizens, keeps on telling the people that Congressman Martin had nothing to do with securing Bonneville dam. At Hood River, Tuesday night, speaking of General Martin and Bonneville, he told an audience, "He had no more to do with it than you or I." In a radio speech in Portland Thursday night, he made a similar assertion. If Joe Dunne, as a candidate, stands before Oregon people and makes these deliberate misrepresentations of widely known facts, what would he do as governor?

If he, as a candidate, declares before election that "every cent secured will have to be repaid," when all know that more than \$50,000,000 will not "have to be repaid," what will he do after election?

If, before election, he deliberately and repeatedly asserts that Congressman Martin had no part in securing Bonneville dam, when everybody in Oregon knows that the contrary is true, what confidence could the people have in his official assertions if he should be elected governor?

And in what a state of chaos would Oregon public affairs be if the pre-election record of a governor should

be such that no reliance could be placed in his statements as chief executive?—Portland Journal.
