

STUDENT STRIKES FOR FREE SPEECH LOOM CALIFORNIA

State University May Make Protest—Campus Orators Ready To Agitate—'Vigilantes' Organized To Halt Walkout.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Maneuvers intended to bring about a protest strike at the University of California and possibly in other universities of the state allegedly as a gesture against "fascism and reaction" were pressed today despite peace offers on one campus.

Leaders of the movement at Berkeley said they would convey their strike appeal to the 25,000 students in all units of the institution not only as a move against alleged fascism and reaction but also as a move against the suspension of fire students at the University of California at Los Angeles on charges of communist activity.

Orators recruited from a Berkeley campus mass meeting last week were assigned to make class-to-class appearances there Monday morning to exhort the other students to lay down their books and walk out.

Unrest on the California campuses paralleled a summer of statewide turmoil in which radical issues figured in strikes and finally in the titanic struggle over the governorship race in the approaching election.

Fears that there might be trouble over the student strike movement were expressed by Richard Criley, its leader at Berkeley. He said an organization of "student vigilantes" was being formed to oppose the walkout.

12C EVERY SERA DOLLAR GOES FOR HANDLING COSTS

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The state emergency relief administration announced today that the cost of handling SERA relief work in Oregon costs less than 12 cents on each relief dollar.

For the past four months the total expended of state and local contributions amounted to \$3,861,289, and the administrative expense of handling this huge sum was \$434,765, or 11.26 cents on every dollar expended.

The administrative cost included handling the slaughtering and processing of 500 head of sheep and cattle a day in the packing plants of Portland; selection of CCC camp men, social service throughout the state, and handling of more than \$100,000 a month of surplus food commodities such as meat, fish and cheese.

In Multnomah county where the largest relief load was handled, the administrative cost was ten cents on the dollar during September, with 17,000 families on relief.

HOOD RIVER GETS FRUIT DISTILLER

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Announcement was made here today of plans for establishment in this city of a \$50,000 distillery for the manufacture of quality liquors. Cherries and apricots will be made into brandy, and the company expects to use 5,000 tons of apples a year in making applejack.

The distillery will be operated by a group including E. L. McClain, Jr., Los Angeles capitalist who owns considerable fruit land here; A. W. Peters, president of the Northwest Cannery association; R. P. Pooley, former Philadelphia manufacturer, and his son, E. R. Pooley, Hood River manager for American Fruit growers.

The company expects to start production on next year's cherry crop. Apricots will be taken from The Dallas area, but cherries and apples will be bought in Hood River.

LABOR DISORDERS SPREAD IN PENN

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Spread of disorders in the hard coal region was threatened tonight after another battle between rival union miners, the third in four days, at the Susquehanna collieries plant in Nanticoke.

United Anthracite Miners of Pennsylvania, seeking to close the colliery because of alleged discrimination against their members, have appealed to employees of the big Glen Alden collieries for a "general strike."

Mass meetings tonight and tomorrow will determine the next move in the controversy that has continued for more than a year. Pistols flashed as more than 1,000 men affiliated with the United Mine Workers of America fought with pickets over the streets of the mining town today.

**BUCKMASTER FREED
ON LARCENY CHARGE**

James C. Buckmaster, of Trail, arraigned in justice court Thursday on charges of grand larceny, was found not guilty and his case was dismissed. Buckmaster was arrested Oct. 26 through the sheriff's office, on a complaint filed by W. G. Trill, local attorney.

Buckmaster was arrested on the allegation that he had unlawfully taken \$250 worth of hardware and lumber belonging to W. M. Green.

WHEAT DROP DUE RAINS, POLITICS

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Best general rains witnessed in weeks over dry districts of domestic crop territory southwest turned wheat prices downward late today, more than offsetting earlier gains.

Contributing to late setbacks of the wheat market was a disposition many traders showed to refrain from new business pending results of election day next week. Reactions from advances began when the price of Chicago December delivery of wheat mounted to within 1/2 cent of the dollar-a-bushel mark.

Wheat closed unsteady at the day's bottom figures, 3/4-3/8 under yesterday's finish, May 96 1/4-1/8, corn 1 1/4-1/8 down, May, 77 1/2, oats 3/4-1/8 off, and provisions showing 7 to 37 cents gain.

ROOSEVELT LABOR PEACE PLAN WINS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The most threatening breach in President Roosevelt's projected industrial truce was plugged today by the national labor relations board as it engineered a settlement of the Cleveland A. and P. store labor dispute.

Both the great Atlantic and Pacific Tea company and the unions involved notified the board they had accepted its proposal for reopening the stores and submission of future disputes, if any, to arbitration.

Today's settlement removed one of the most serious breaks thus far in the president's month-old proposal of a six months' cessation of labor-capital strife.

ANTI-JEW RIOTS SWEEP SALONIKA

SALONIKA, Nov. 3.—(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)—Anti-Semitic disturbances which broke out today in the Jewish suburbs of Ayasofia, Ayasparakert and Neapolis resulted in injury to several persons and the arrest of some of the rioters.

In Neapolis a Jewish druggist named Mose was severely injured in the general panic which arose when the rioters rushed through the streets, attacking Jewish pedestrians and shouting, "Slay the dirty Jew."

Stones were thrown by the rioting mob which smashed the windows of the Jewish school.

The crowd fled when the Jews engaged in counter attacks.

HUNGER GROUP ON MARCH AGAIN

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Seven trucks carrying 400 "hunger marchers" left town today, some of them occupants still wearing bandages in consequence of their encounter when denied admission to the city last Tuesday night.

Five truckloads started for New York city to join a labor demonstration tomorrow night. Two truckloads started back to Syracuse, Rochester, Buffalo and Jamestown.

Spokesmen for the party told Jas. T. Mahoney, assistant secretary to Governor Lehman, yesterday they would come again because they did not expect the state to meet the relief demands that were made on the governor.
