

Slugfest Climaxes Santa Clara's 20-0 Victory Over California

BEARS OUTPLAYED BOW TO BRONCOS, THEN WILD BRAWL

Battle For Goal Posts Thrills — Fake Passes Puzzle — Sobrero's Punting Effective — California Threatens Twice.

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Striking with raptorial thrusts for three great touchdowns, Santa Clara's Bears outplayed the California Bronco team in a slugfest which climaxed by a huge free-for-all fight between the rival students.

Fifteen minutes after the Bears had been routed with the most one-sided beating since Southern California set them back 27 to 7 two years ago, the Bears were toasting punches at each other on the field. Half a dozen brawls were going on at times as California supporters sought to defend the goal posts from being hauled down by Santa Clara.

The slugfest provided extra thrills for the balance of a crowd of 35,000 fans left in the bowl after the victorious Bronco had romped off the turf with their greatest feat in many seasons.

Three times fleet-footed Santa Clara backs dodged through gaping holes to cross the goal line standing up. The Bronco was so superior in every department there was no comparison between the two eleven. Bear tacklers were minus quantity and the secondary defense was caught flat-footed time and again.

A scoreless first period saw all the advantage on Santa Clara's side with Sobrero's accurate punting out of bounds keeping the Bears in the hole most of the time. Arleigh Williams, California's premier left half, however, won the plaudits of the crowd in the opening quarter with the longest punt seen here in many a game. The ball traveled 78 yards, 63 in the air.

Taking the ball on their own 41-yard line at the start of the second period, the Bronco galloped to touchdown ground in four plays. De Rosa, sub left half, running the last 33 yards in an off tackle slash. Flastick place kicked the extra point.

The rout of the great Golden Bear of past seasons got under way in full force in the third quarter. Sixty-five yards down the field Coach Clipper Smith's perfectly schooled platoon pounced, crushing the Bear defense with line smashes until Frank Sobrero, left half, faked a pass and then ran 13 yards to score. It was the second time Sobrero crossed up the Californians with a faked maneuver. Just preceding his touchdown run, he pretended to kick and landed a 22-yard punt.

Sobrero tried a place kick for the extra point but the ball sailed low. As they moved into the fourth period, Sobrero's clots carved another touchdown message in scoring ground. The ball was on California's 47-yard line. Sobrero faked a pass, dodged through tackle, and ran the yards unimpeded. Kallak, sub right half, place kicked the extra point.

Except for the two belated scoring bids, California was helpless before the strongest Santa Clara team since Smith took over the coaching reins five years ago.

After the third Bronco touchdown, the Bears took the ball 49 yards from goal and advanced to the 13-yard line, where Bertoli, sub left half, fumbled. The Bronco punted to California's 45-yard line and the Bears came back down the field to the 13-yard line, where Bertoli passed over the goal on fourth down to end the second and final threat.

Statistics tell a vivid story of Santa Clara's superiority. The Bronco made 412 yards from scrimmage to 96 for the Bears.

JUNIORS TO PLAY ASHLAND MONDAY

Medford Junior high school's Bulldogs will clash with the Ashland Juniors on the Lithia City gridiron Monday afternoon at 3:30, in an attempt to revenge a defeat suffered earlier in the season. The game was postponed from Friday afternoon because of the SONS-Monmouth game.

Ray Henderson's squad will again meet the strongest Ashland team that has been assembled in 11 years, according to the local mentor, but it is determined to stage a battle. Although Medford Juniors have lost only four games to Earl Rogers' Lithians out of 21, the 1934 edition of the Ashland Juniors is proving a tough one.

Rettinger, triple-threat Medford halfback, is back in the lineup, which will be otherwise weakened by injuries to Wall, first string right end, and to Santa, regular tackle. Wall, however, may see action Monday, but Santa's loss is a heavy one to the local defense post.

TIGERS OVERPOWER ASHLAND 35 TO 0, GHELARDI STARS

Brown's Trusty Foot Gains Extra Points—First Quarter Fumbles Costly—Penalties Hit Medford.

Before a large crowd of football fans, the Medford high Tigers romped 35 to 0 over Ashland high Grizzlies Saturday afternoon on Van Scoyoc field. The Medford boys outplayed the Ashland boys for the first three quarters of the game but were outplayed in the last quarter.

The first score came early in the second quarter with Smith taking the ball from Bates on a fake reverse lateral and leading his way 15 yards to a touchdown. In the middle of the second quarter, Ghelardi was sent in for Smith who was given a great hand for his brilliant playing. Medford marched down the field from mid-field to the Ashland 15 yard line where they received a 15 yard penalty for holding. On the next play Ghelardi took the ball and on an off-tackle play, squirmed and side-stepped his way down the field to a touchdown.

Ghelardi scored two touchdowns in the third and Bates scored one in the fourth. During the third quarter Ghelardi evaded Grizzlies right and left. Late in the quarter he broke through the line and dashed desperately toward the goal line which was 40 yards away and made it. Again after an exchange of punts, he broke through the line and dashed madly 20 yards to another touchdown. Early in the fourth quarter Bill Bates broke through tackle and stiff-armed his way 30 yards to a touchdown. Russell Brown, California's premier left half, brought his big right foot into an active part in the game by booting all five of the extra points.

Over anxiety cost Medford high two touchdowns. When on the Ashland 10 yard line in the first quarter, Medford fumbled and Ashland recovered. Ashland punted out of dangerous territory and Medford again came pounding at the Ashland goal line only to be disappointed by a fumble. Kindred, Medford tackle, appeared hereafter in his punting than did Kennato, Ashland halfback, and blocking of both the punter's teammates provided an asset more than once. Although a Medford lineman did break through and block one of the Ashland punts, Medford exceeded the Grizzlies 6 to 1 in yardage gained. The total yards gained being 339 for Medford and 56 for Ashland. Medford received a total of eight penalties amounting to 60 yards. Medford made nine first downs to Ashland's three. All of which were made on running plays, not passes, although Ashland completed two passes that helped them make the necessary yards. Medford lost two yards from scrimmage while Ashland lost 21. Ashland attempted seven passes and Medford attempted two. Ashland completed two, intercepted one and had one intercepted. Bates, intercepted it and made a gain of 25 yards. Medford made a total of five fumbles, recovering four; Ashland fumbled three times and recovered three. Medford punted six times while Ashland was forced to punt 10 times.

The Medford line-up didn't appear as strong as it did last week against Klamath Falls due to the absence of Blondie Lewis, stocky little blocking half. The Medford line-up was shifted considerably in order that the team could be as strong as possible for the Ashlanders. Lewis' hard and vicious tackling along with his interference ability was missed in the game yesterday. Ronald Baker, who has been playing running guard, was moved to Lewis' place and Keith Bates, regular standing guard, was shifted to the running guard post.

VAN VLIET'S RUNS ENABLE WEBFEET DOWN MONTANA

Bulldogs Hold Oregon In First Half With Reserves In Line-up—Halted Once On Six-Inch Line.

EUGEN, Ore., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Maurice "Flex" Van Vliet, a 155-pound halfback, made two long touchdown runs in leading the University of Oregon football team to a 13 to 0 win over the Montana Grizzlies in a coast conference game here today.

On a muddy field rimmed with a homecoming crowd, Van Vliet broke loose for runs of 41 yards and 20 yards in the last two periods after the Grizzlies held "Mighty Oregon" scoreless the first half.

Coach Prink Callison had five reserves in the starting lineup, saving his convalescing regulars for the game against Oregon State college next Saturday.

In the final period the battered Grizzlies, who still wouldn't admit defeat, marched 65 yards and were going strong when the game ended. Previously they had gained only 20 yards from scrimmage, whereas Oregon rolled up 357 yards and 12 first downs, but had no scoring punch from within the Montana 20-yard line.

In the first half the Grizzlies were pushed back repeatedly, but stiffened each time as Oregon neared scoring territory and threw the Webfoot backer for losses. Emery, Montana kicker, forced to do most of his punting from behind his own goal line.

In the second period Oregon scored a touchdown, but was halted on the Montana six-inch line where the Grizzlies took the ball on downs. Only once in the first half did Montana have the ball in Oregon territory. It was near the end of the second quarter when Miché's fumble was recovered on the Oregon 48-yard line.

Oregon received a punt in mid-field in the third quarter and two plays netted four yards to the Montana 41. Then Van Vliet, on a deceptive play, slanted through tackle and broke into the open. Blastic was in his path, but Van Vliet cut sharply and eluded him, coasting for the touchdown standing up. Riordan converted.

Van Vliet returned Holmquist's punt 15 yards and a penalty for roughing Van Vliet after he was run out of bounds brought another 15 yards, placing the ball on the Montana 23.

Tyerjesson, one of the regulars rushed in during the second half, picked up five yards as the third quarter ended and Miché rammed for three.

On almost an exact repetition of the former touchdown play Van Vliet shot through tackle and raced across the goal line 20 yards away. Fullback Miché had faked a line smash to draw the Grizzly defense off balance. Walker's try for point was blocked.

As the game neared an end Blastic faked a punt on the Montana 10-yard line and ran 20 yards. Two completed forward passes took the ball to the 50-yard line and a double lateral gained 15 more, into Oregon territory. Blastic ripped off seven yards, but the game ended before Montana could complete its march.

GRAYSON PROVES TOO GOOD, UCLANS TO CARDS 27 TO 0

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Stanford had too much class for the University of California at Los Angeles today and won handily, 27 to 0, before a crowd of approximately 50,000.

The home team could not stop the elusive, hard-running Bobby Grayson and that was the ball game for the big red team. Grayson and Monk Mascip, who caught passes and kicked goals after touchdowns, carried too many guns for the fighting southerners.

The U. C. L. A. smeared the famous reverses but the visitors had other tricks in their bag.

U. C. L. A. threatened to score only once, getting the ball on a fumble in the third period on Stanford's 49-yard line, but the ball was fumbled right back again on the next play.

The losers fought from start to finish but the winners had too much power for them and Bill Spaulding's boys never could get in the ball game. They closed the first half with a stirring stand, stopping the Indians within inches of a touchdown, when Remington Olmstead tackled Gray short of scoring territory on the final play.

Stanford had almost everything a good football team needed today. The only black mark against the undefeated battlers for the Pacific coast conference might have been scored for placing too much faith in its reserves.

Grayson gained approximately half his team's rushing yardage, picking up 129 yards of a total of 277, averaging nearly five yards a try. Stanford added 45 yards in passes for a total of 323 yards gained during the day. U. C. L. A. gained 142 yards, 77 overhand and 65 on the flat. The losses were almost even, 46 for U. C. L. A. and 45 for Stanford.

PASS NETS GAELS WIN O'ER COUGARS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—(AP)—To the strong arm of Harry ("The Horse") Mattos, the St. Mary's college Gaels owe thanks for a 9-to-6 victory over the football Cougars of Washington State college.

Mattos unlimbered his throwing arm in the final period of the game yesterday, with the Gaels trailing 6 to 3, to hurl two passes that gained 60 yards and a touchdown. The second flip went 30 yards into the Cougars' end zone where it was nabbed by Vic Stubbs, sub end.

The passing display brought victory to a powerful St. Mary's team which had been repeatedly turned back in drives down the field after Washington State gained a lead in the first eight minutes of play, also on a pass. Ed Goddard rifled the ball from the Cougars' 38-yard line to Brett, right end, who raced 20 yards to score.

try for the then important extra point, and he made good.

After a frantic see-saw battle through the third period, Coach Lon Stiner of Oregon State decided to make a bid for victory, not being content to tie Washington in his first tangle with Phelan, and he sent his ace, Red Franklin, into the battle.

The rambling halfback ploughed through right tackle for four yards to reach his 38, and then decided to attempt a pass. He ran back to his 30, whirled and let the pigskin fly, and it fell into the arms of big Chuck Bond who was out in the open.

Both teams attempted field goals while the score was knotted at seven-all.

Washington tried first early in the third quarter when it was unable to march closer than Oregon State's 15-yard line, but Legg's effort on the fourth down was blocked by Dan Mitola, a guard.

Early in the next period two passes, one from Franklin to Scott, and the other from Franklin to Pangle, carried the Beavers from mid-field to Washington's 17-yard line.

After taking a five-yard penalty for an offense, the Huskies finally stiffened, throwing Franklin for a net loss of one yard on three bucks.

Oregon State made a last minute bid for another touchdown after Washington's winning score when Swanson broke away for an yards on the kickoff, but a pass by Franklin was intercepted by Quarterback Hornbeck of the Huskies. Fullback Sullosky nearly matched

WHITMAN BEATEN BY LA GRANDE
