

NEW YORK DEMS CARRY STATE BY FAT MAJORITIES

Control of Both Branches of Legislature Gained — Tammany Gets Revenge for Beating in New York

 NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Sweep onward before the momentum of a rebuilt Tammany machine in New York city, the Democratic party carried the New York state "off year" elections by tremendous proportions yesterday and captured completely the state government.

The Democratic ticket, headed by Governor Herbert H. Lehman, ran up pluralities of 700,000 and more, won control of both branches of the non-mail Republican state legislature and rendered an overwhelming endorsement of the new deal doctrines of President Roosevelt.

The collapse of the Republican party in New York city was in sharp contrast to Tammany Hall, bolstered by hitting the come-back trail from its disastrous defeat of last November at the hands of the fusion party in the municipal election.

In New York city, Tammany took revenge for its beating of last year by electing Frank J. Taylor city comptroller over Joseph D. McGoldrick, fusion incumbent, by the margin of 12,855 votes.

Taylor's election constituted a severe strain upon Mayor LaGuardia's city administration, and with Tammany now controlling five—and possibly seven—of the 16 votes of the important board of estimate, the fusion working majority faced an uncertain future. Governor Lehman's defeat of Robert Moses, the Republican candidate, was swift and staggering. The majority for the president's close friend and successor at Albany approached the 850,000 mark as final returns filtered in.

The governor's final plurality will far exceed that of 700,000 given Mr. Roosevelt in the 1930 gubernatorial elections, and will closely approximate the governor's lead of 847,439 when he was selected first two years ago.

United States Senator Royal S. Copeland won handily for his third term with a plurality of about 750,000, all from New York city.

WIFE TO TESTIFY IN DOKES BEHALF

WOODLAND, Calif., Nov. 7.—(UP)—Helen Louise Dokes, "White Hibiscus" of the Lamar Hollingshead murder trial, will be called as a prosecution witness against her husband, Judson C. Dokes, it was announced today by District Attorney C. C. McDonald.

McDonald said he had subpoenaed Mrs. Dokes to appear Wednesday when trial of Dokes on charges of shooting and killing the youthful post-lover of his wife will be resumed.

Mrs. Dokes has not been in the courtroom since Dokes was brought to trial. She reportedly had volunteered her services as a witness for the defense, however, saying that she was prepared to stand by her husband.

McDonald's move came as a new surprise in the rapidly ending trial. Monday defense counsel rested its case.

LIBBY ACTS FOR HER CHILD



Christopher Smith Reynolds, posthumous son of Z. Smith Reynolds, and Mrs. Libby Holman Reynolds, former Broadway favorite, has entered the litigation over disposal of his father's tobacco millions. At Winston-Salem, N. DOCKER DECISION FAILS TO PLEASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—(UP)—A decision of the National Longshoremen's board, granting higher wages but denying the request of approximately 500 Pacific coast ship clerks and checkers for shorter hours and hiring hall control, was received without enthusiasm, last night.

J. J. Finnegan, president of an organization of some 250 San Francisco workers, characterized the decision as "very disappointing."

"It does, however, open the way for collective bargaining and we hope to open negotiations with the employers for changes immediately," he said.

SALEM, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Governor Julius L. Meier today sent a telegram to Governor-elect Charles H. Martin containing the following congratulatory statement:

"It is my earnest desire to cooperate with you in all matters affecting the state of Oregon."

MARTINS GOVERN SISTER STATES

SEATTLE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—So the governor of Washington said to the governor of Oregon—"Your name is Martin, too!"

Oregon and Washington, neighboring Pacific northwest states, will both have governors named Martin when Major General Charles H. Martin takes office in Oregon. He was elected governor yesterday and like the Washington governor, elected two years ago, is a democrat.

But the Washington governor was a miller and the Oregon governor-to-be was a soldier.

GERMANY IN PROTEST FRENCH OCCUPATION

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Germany today made diplomatic representations to Paris, London, Rome, and Brussels objecting to the use of French troops in the Saar basin territory "as is believed here to be contemplated."

The German ambassadors to the four capitals named made the representations.
