SINCLAIR HINTS CONTINUANCE OF EPIC CAMPAIGN

Refuses to Formally Concede Defeat—Charges Votes Stolen—Recall Threat Is Voiced by Ex-Socialist

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Far behind the ballot count of retiring Governor Frank P. Merriam in the race for the governorship, Upton Sinclair, Socialist turned Democrat, today threatened to launch a new campaign to "end poverty in California."

Refusing to concede defeat formally, Sinclair congratulated his opponents for their "brief victory" and declared "this election has just been a skirmish and our people have enlisted for the war."

Merriam's running mate, George J. Hatfield, who apparently won the lieutenant governorship over Sheridan Downey, Democrat, declared "radicalism has been defeated," while Sinclair retorted "tens of thousands of workers all over the state" would watch keenly to see "whether Merriam kept his promise about the old age pension and the 30-hour week."

Hints at F. R. Conner Sinclair gave the first hint of his recent discussion with President Roosevelt by declaring the chief executive had promised to broadcast to the nation "on the principle of production for use," a major tenet of the "Epic" plan, as opposed to production for profit.

The former Socialist also charged that votes had been "stolen" and his campaign managers added they were not satisfied with the reports about the returns. They expressed the belief that large numbers of ballots had not been counted and therefore they would not make any formal admission concerning the election of Merriam.

"Remember that we have the power of recall in this state, and if a Republican reactionary becomes governor of this state we will have that recall power hanging as a sword over his head," Sinclair said.

Governor Merriam, Iowa born farm boy, said his victory was one of "Americanism over radicalism."

Merriam pledges Al Poor He issued a statement pledging himself to relieve economic distress and encourage the processes of economic recovery, declaring his election as governor represented "definite and positive adherence to sound and tested methods in government and in economics."

"We have demonstrated the essential common sense of the people of California," he said.

Only two Republicans led in the congressional race, with the Democratic candidates almost uniformly ahead. Mrs. Florence P. Kahn of the fourth district was conceded victory by her Democratic opponent, Chauncey Trammello, and George Burnham, San Diego Republican incumbent, was ahead of Edward Isaac, Democrat.

Big Vote for Johnson United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson polled a tremendous majority over George Kirkpatrick, his Socialist opponent.

The issuance of \$54,000,000 of new bonds also apparently had been approved by these \$50,000,000 was to enable veterans to purchase houses and farms, and \$24,000,000 was for unemployment relief.

A proposition calling for local option apparently was beaten badly, while voters on the face of returns approved liberalization of the old liquor control act permitting by-the-drink sales of liquor by bona fide cafes and hotels.
