FOREST OFFICIALS SEE VALUE OF CCC FOR FIRE CONTROL

More Than 125,000 Man Days Contributed—Raw Recruits Now Able to Render Foresters Valuable Aid

PORTLAND—(Sp.)—This season's forest fire report, coupled with last year's exceptionally favorable record for national forest lands, is convincing forest officials of the outstanding importance of the CCC camps in the fire control program of the north-west. "The benefits of the Civilian Conservation camps to the states of Oregon and Washington have been many, but outstanding in importance is the contribution they have made to the fire control program," says C. J. Buck, regional forester, Portland, Ore.

Final report for the season shows that the CCC has contributed more than 125,000 man-days to actual fire fighting and fire suppression. Buck states that the lasting accomplishments of these two years in bettering the fire control situation of the forests represent improvements which would have required at least ten years of work under the ordinary procedure for federal and state owned forest land.

Recruits Trained.

"The importance of a regular fire fighting force with central organization is being proved beyond a doubt," states Buck. "These CCC enrollees are mostly 'just green boys' when they arrive at the CCC camps, but even from these raw recruits competent fire fighting units are developed because of the possibility afforded for organization and training. They are put through regular fire drill to improve speed in reaching a fire and they receive careful instruction also in fire fighting methods and the handling of modern fire fighting equipment. All of this organization work is of course impossible with the ordinary 'pick up crew.' Probably part of the comparatively favorable fire record of the past two years on national forest land may be attributed to the organization of the CCC."

Fight Tree Diseases.

Further discussing the CCC, Mr. Buck said, "We are demonstrating here in the northwest the value of a permanent force in conserving our forests. Probably no work in forest conservation is more practical or necessary than fire protection. However, the various other needed forest improvements, such as combating tree diseases and insect infestation, betterment of watershed protection which assures perpetual water supply and water power, also the development of the recreational advantages of the forest, point to the employment possibilities on our forest land. "The crying demand in the nation for more jobs naturally suggests the important social niche which our forests may be made to fill as they do under the European system. Relating the employment need to the forest land may hold permanent possibilities for bettering both the social and economic condition of the country."

MENNONITES MAY UNITE ON COAST

REEDLEY, Cal., Nov. 9. — (AP) — A possible union of the Mennonite Brethren churches of British Columbia with the west coast conference of the denomination is under consideration today, it became known following the adjournment of the annual four-day session of the conference here yesterday.

The conference now comprises the churches of California and Oregon. At the final business meeting, Rev. J. H. Richert of Reedley was elected conference president; Rev. G. B. Hubert of Reedley, vice-president; O. J. Ewert of Reedley, secretary, with A. A. Schroeder and D. L. Schellenberg, both of Reedley as assistants.

The next conference will be held at The Dalles, Ore.
