be Clara's daughter, who had come to her child. Walking about the yard yesterday afternoon, while investigators were in small groups talking, was Al Feldman, son of Clara. A roof pro from Portland, he had been in the front yard practicing in the forenoon, and when asked if he had managed a hole in one during his practice, said: "It looks to me as if the police are making a lot of them around here, but it doesn't worry me." He was referring to the numerous holes about the field and yard that the police had dug in search for more money.

Officers in South. C. C. Spears, federal department of justice agent from Portland, was today reported in California with Lee M. Brown, captain of the southern Oregon district of the Oregon state police.

This forenoon, one federal investigator, a deputy sheriff, police and Leo McLain, deputy United States marshal, continued to dig about in the yard. No further arrests have been made in the case. Federal officers said that Clara Feldman was known to have been in Medford last Friday, but her whereabouts since that time are not known, they stated.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Heavily armed federal agents guarded a critically injured Urochel kidnaper suspect here today while other agents sought to amass more evidence against him.

Alvin H. Scott, in a hospital here with a fractured skull received in an automobile crash a week ago, was too ill to comprehend fully the kidnapping charges against him.

Similar charges of conspiracy in concealing ransom paid for the release of Charles F. Urochel, Oklahoma oil man, have been placed against Margaret Hurlenne, his housekeeper here.

At Medford, Ore., slightly more than 100 miles south of here, officers continued digging and searching at Scott's home which they said yielded \$4000 in bank notes and more than \$1000 in \$10 and \$20 bills and some gold, allegedly part of the ransom.

Search Yields Loot. The search at Scott's squatted house in the outskirts of Medford was fruitless several hours until a state police officer noticed a scrap of paper on

a rafter in a woodshed. They dug directly beneath the paper and found the bank notes and ransom money in fruit jars. The notes were made payable to "Mrs. George L. Davis," corresponding to the alias used by Albert L. Bates, serving a life sentence for kidnaping Urochel. Officers today sought for questioning a carpenter who was working at the house when the officers approached with the search warrant. A windmill tower behind the house had been remodeled with an apparatus floor room, over which there was what might be used as a bedroom and above that a well-ventilated electrically wired room. The walls were being sound-proofed.

At Medford a bank official estimated \$25,000 Urochel ransom money had been spent in southern Oregon the last six months. It was Urochel bills, showing up in bank deposits, which first led to the placing of Scott under surveillance, federal agents said.

Rex Applegate, of Roseburg, also a trapshooter, will be another guest of the Daniels' who will take part. Special prizes will be offered for the regular trap and skeet events, which will begin at 10 a. m.

Honor Cleveland Postmaster. CLEVELAND, (UP)—Postmaster Michael P. O'Donnell of Cleveland is new president of the National Association of Postmasters for the coming year. He was elected to the position when the association held its convention recently in French Lick Springs, Ind. He was formerly vice-president of the group.

Butterflies Wing Southward. CLEVELAND, (UP)—A large swarm of monarch butterflies, unusual in northern Ohio, passed over the downtown area recently, headed south. Harold Madison, director of the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, said they probably would fly until they got south of the Gulf stream.

OLDEST BIBLE IS FOUND IN EGYPT

VIENNA, Austria, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Discovery of the "world's oldest Bible," said to have been written in the second century, was announced today by the Austrian national library. Hans Gertlinger, chief of the library's manuscript section, said the pile of dusty manuscripts was found in a Cairo book shop by Herman Junker, director of the German archaeological institute there. They were brought here for study and their importance confirmed.
