NEOPHYTE SOLONS WILL HOLD POWER NEXT LEGISLATURE

Voters of Oregon Name Democratic Majority in House and Send Flock of Strangers to Next Session

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Legislative neophytes will rule the 1935 assembly.

Not content with upsetting previous custom by naming a Democratic majority in the house for the first time in 56 years, the electorate last Tuesday placed control of legislation in the hands of strangers to the state capitol, headed by a new chief executive.

In the house alone 44 members, both Democrats and Republicans, of the 60 have never served in the legislature. The senate, usually a veteran body, will see nine new legislators in addition to three who were promoted from the lower house.

With this array of new talent most anything can be expected in the way of proposals and changes in organization. With but 16 veterans in the house, the old-timers will have less chance of ignoring the new members as usually is the case.

Veterans Seek Speakership

The race for speakership at this time appears to be between two veterans, J. E. Cooter, Democrat of Lincoln county, and Earl Hill, Republican of Lane county. It was also indicated an effort would be made to name a new member from Multnomah, Howard LaTourrette, or William L. Graham, a veteran, both Democrats.

However, legislators will be influenced by two situations. One is that seldom is a new member named leader of an organization over a veteran. The other is the custom of naming

an upstate speaker when the president of the senate is apparently assured a Portlander—Harry L. Corbett. This would put the race between Cooter and Hill, and with 37 Democrats elected, Cooter's chances appear almost on a par with the campaign already made by Hill prior to the election. The Republicans named new members, several of them young attorneys who have been practicing but a short time. Walter Norblad, son of the former governor, will succeed E. C. Judd of Clatsop county, and W. W. Knight will succeed B. F. Nichols of Douglas county.

Other new members named by Republicans include J. W. Hughes, who succeeded E. J. McAlear of Washington county; W. R. Osborne, to succeed Arthur McPhillips, Democrat; Lyle D. Thomas of Polk county to succeed Dean Walker, who was promoted to the senate; A. Rennie of Benton, to succeed H. C. Herron.

In Marion county two new Republicans were named to the house, Ronald Jones and Walter P. Pahrer, who succeeded Carl Abrams and Otto Paulus; Howard S. Merriam was named from Lane county to succeed E. A. McCornish, who was promoted to the senate; Glenn N. Riddle was added from Douglas county to succeed A. G. Clarke, W. A. Johnson was elected from Josephine county to succeed W. T. Miller.

E. R. Fatland will succeed Earl Shell to the legislature from the 22nd district, while Carl Engdahl will take

the place of Dr. James A. Best from Umatilla county. Best was promoted to the senate. C. T. Hockett, Republican, will succeed W. F. Allen from Willamette county.

Veteran Republicans remaining in the house include Homer D. Angell of Portland, a former member; H. H. Childgren, also a former member from Clackamas county, to succeed Donald J. Ryan; Homer Gouley and Hannah Martin of Marion county; Earl H. Hill of Lane county; A. E. Brockway of Jackson county; James H. E. Scott of Umatilla county; Warner B. Snider of the 29th district and V. F. Staples of Malheur county.
