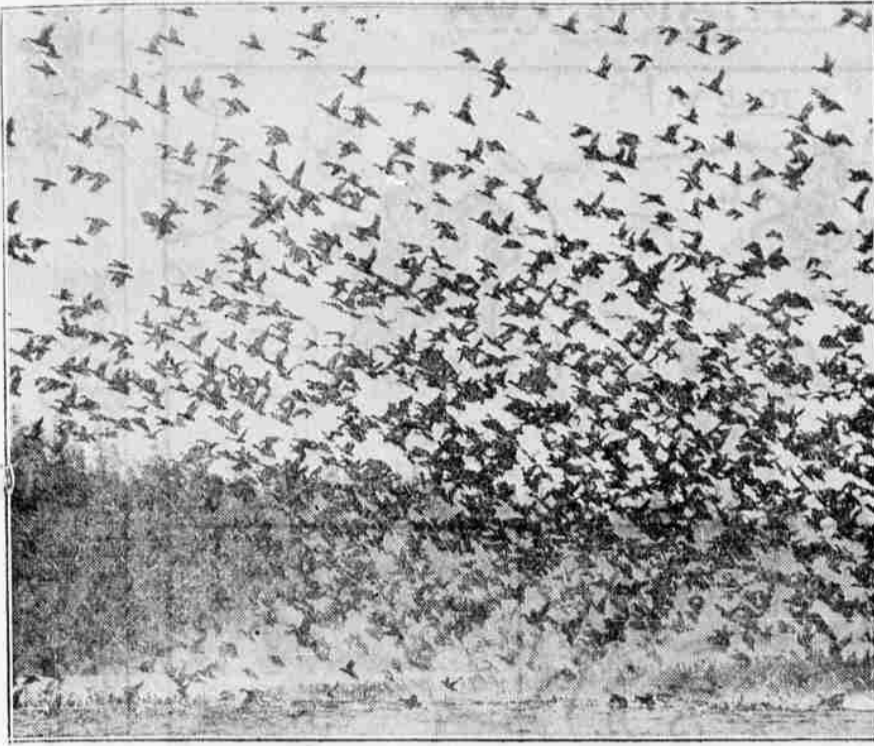
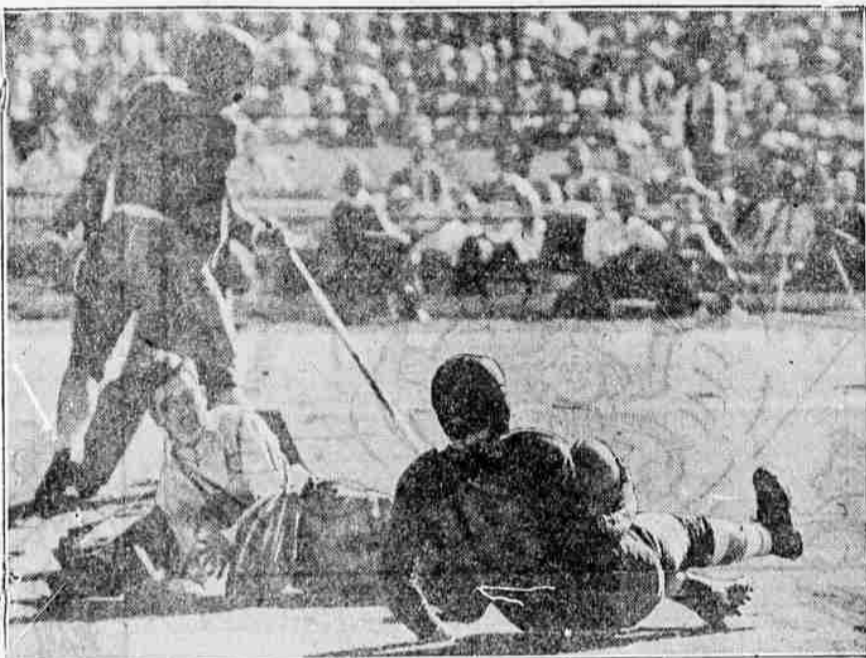


HERE'S PARADISE—FOR DUCKS, NOT FOR HUNTERS

GRIDDERS SPILL THE CAMERAMAN IN THIS GAME



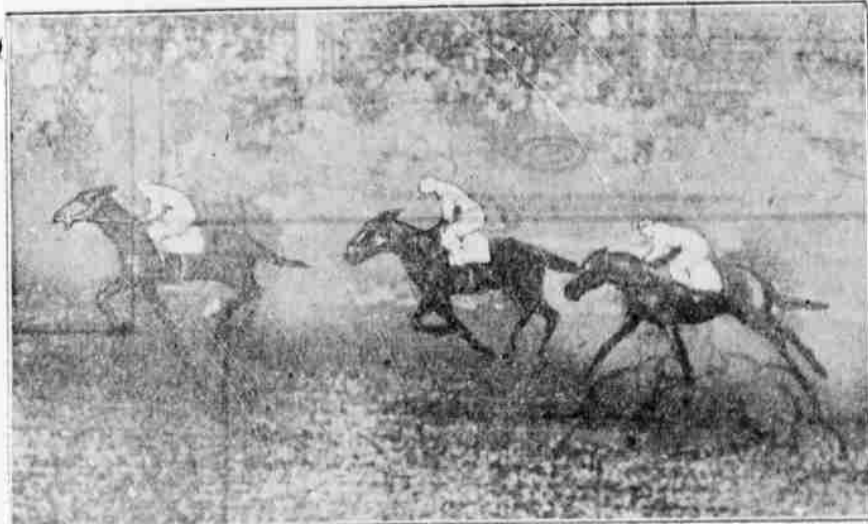

WYCHWOOD ABBOT WINS CAMBRIDGESHIRE HANDICAP

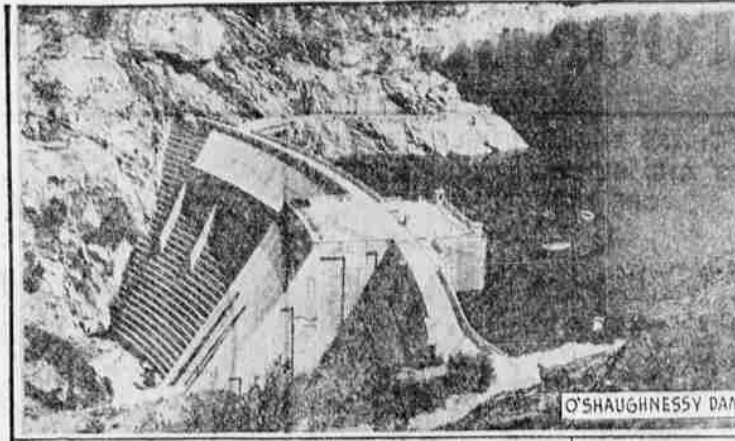

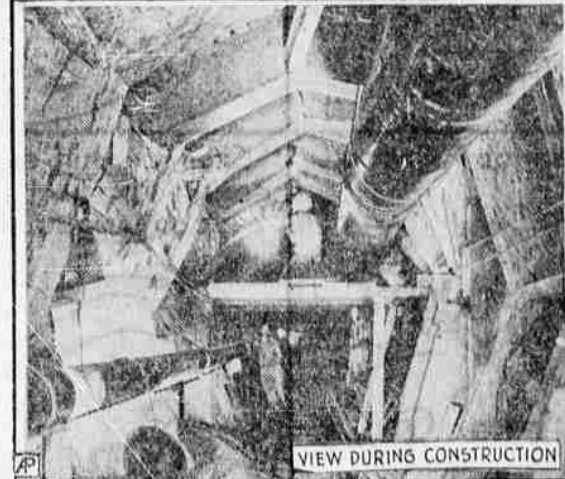

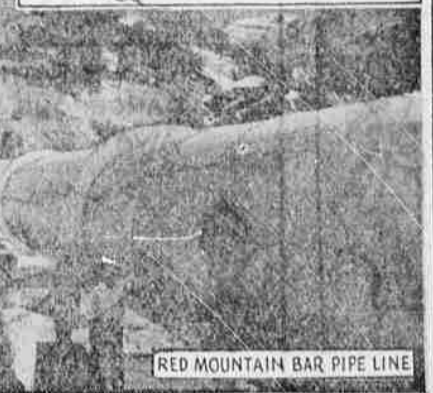

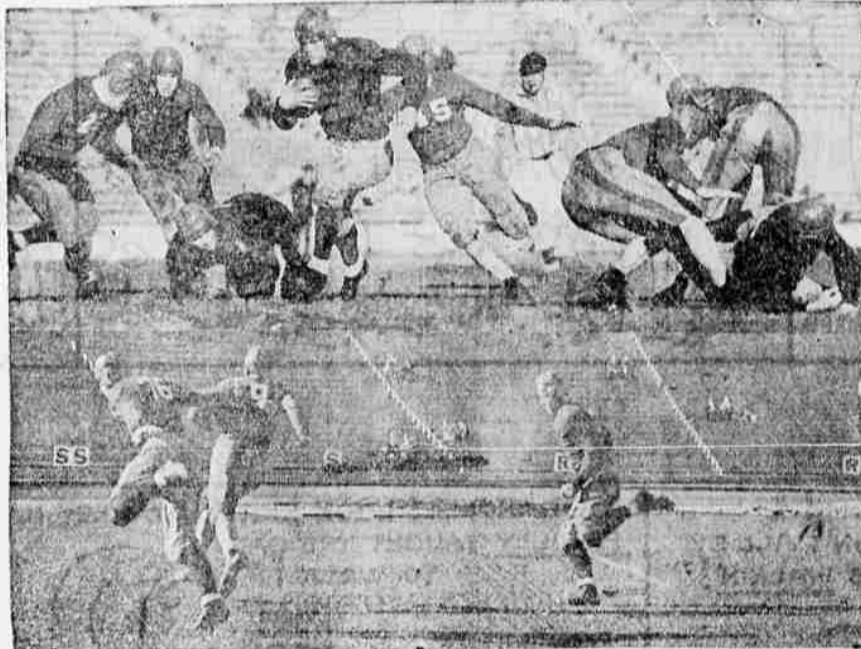
VIEW DURING CONSTRUCTION



RED MOUNTAIN BAR PIPE LINE

After nearly a quarter of a century of work and the expenditure of \$100,000,000, the City by the Golden Gate has completed more than 120 miles of main aqueducts from lakes and the Tuolumne river to provide 400,000 gallons of mountain water daily. For the first time in history, a national park, the Yosemite, is used as a water shed. More than 81 miles of tunnels through mountains were driven and from water that otherwise would go to waste 100,000 horsepower of electricity developed. The O'Shaughnessy dam, shown above, is only one of four large dams in the project. In the lower left hand corner is portrayed result of swelling ground in a 25 mile tunnel, huge timbers being cracked by the earth's almost irresistible force.

A Nebraska Queen

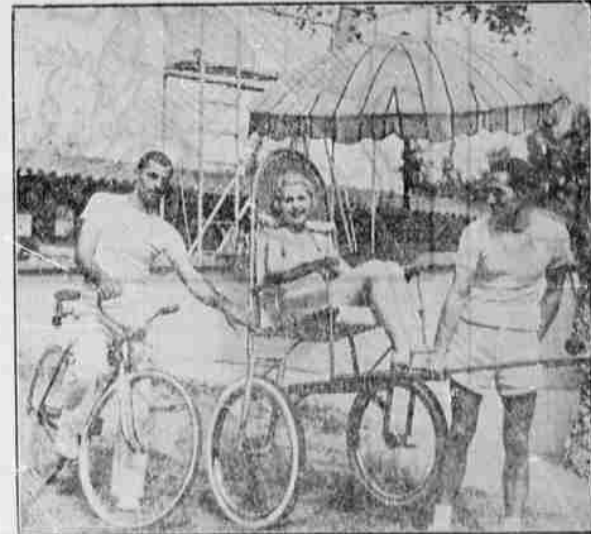
