GRANTS PASS, Nov. 12.—(Sp.)—A ruling that Dr. Edward N. Bywater is not eligible on qualification of land ownership to hold the office of director of the Grants Pass irrigation district was received here Saturday from Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle.

Bywater had filed two petitions to have his name put on the ballot. The second was made after he learned that one must own land here to qualify and as he had shortly before had all his land transferred to his wife's name he went about transferring one acre back to his own name. Van Winkle, however, ruled that the law held a man must own land for a period of six months prior to his election.
