

ARMISTICE PARADE AND FOOTBALL ARE FEATURES OF DAY

the American Legion auxiliary, and the Gold Star Mothers were next, in several cars.

There was the Spanish American War veterans, with a goodly representation, and the Salvation Army preceded the Jackson County Health association's float.

Music in this section of the parade was played by the high school band, and the high school's Tigers, members of the school football squad, were riding in a large truck. The Tiger insignia was on the side, and the squad members were wearing their red and black sweaters.

Girl Scouts came next, and the Central Point Grange's drill team and juveniles, by their fine marching brought comments from the many observers.

Degree of Honor car was followed by members of the juvenile club, riding bicycles, which were decorated in red and white.

The Medford Garden club entered a float, and the Fraternal Order of Eagles, preceded by members of the Auxiliary and the drill team showed a large organization.

The Medford Lions entered a float, as did the Odd Fellows, who marched in brilliant uniforms. The Rebekahs figured prominently in the parade, followed by the Redmen's lodge, which had a colorful float on which were riding several Indians.

Masonic organizations with a number of Shriner's participated, and the Red Cross float was next. The Civilian Conservation Corps and the Rogue River National forest service co-operated in putting a float in the parade, and a CCG Negro minstrel players closed the line.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon the Medford high school and Chemawa Indian football teams will meet on Van Scoyoc field in the annual Armistice day gridiron contest. The championship-point Tigers, in fine fettle for the game according to Coach Burgher, will be seen in action against the strongest team they have played so far in the 1934 schedule. The Burgherites will be put on a par with the leading up-state teams by a defeat of the colorful Chemawans.

Crisp weather and promises of seeing the most closely-contested game the high school has played this year will take the usual large Armistice day crowd to Van Scoyoc field for the afternoon's feature of the day's celebration. The high school band will put on a stunt during the half, according to Director Wilson Walt.

Differing from past celebrations, there was no free feed at noon today, which is generally given as one of the Legion's activities. Accordingly, the football game will follow the parade, as the next major event, and is arranged to fill out the afternoon without interfering with either a late or early dinner.

Legionnaires and members of the ladies auxiliary to the American Legion will invite their guests to the annual Armistice day banquet this

evening to be held at 6:30 o'clock in the dining hall of the Hotel Holland. Those who have not done so are urged to make reservations and obtain tickets from W. J. Looker, as those in charge of the banquet will in this way be enabled in making preparations. Legion Commander Fox and Past Commander Lee Garlock say that from all indications there will be a large number present. A charge of 50 cents per plate is being made.

Ending the day's celebration, which besides the parade, football game and banquet has been marked by Armistice day displays in store windows, will be the annual American Legion ball this evening at the Oriental Gardens.

The dance, which is being managed by Emerson Merrick, chairman of the dance committee, will begin promptly at 9 o'clock. Excellent music has been obtained and the Legion, which sponsors the ball annually, promises another "big event" of the year.

PET BEARS KILL TWO IN RAMPAGE

SAN ANGELO, Tex., Nov. 12.—(AP)—W. Tom Brown, 67, was clawed and bitten to death yesterday by a three-year-old pet bear. Brown died shortly after being taken to a hospital from his filling station on Live Oak creek, where he was injured.

MANKATO, Minn., Nov. 12.—(AP)—A bear he had raised from a cub, yesterday killed Clarence Staley, 54, superintendent of the Mankato city parks for 22 years.

When Staley attempted to retrieve a woman's purse dropped into the cage, the bear bit through his spinal column.

FIVE BURGLARS USED TRUCK TO HAUL LOOT

SEATTLE, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Arrest of five men here and in Astoria was announced today by detectives who said four of the men confessed looting 40 West Seattle homes and stores of about \$15,000 worth of jewelry, silverware, money, clothing and food in the past five months.

Police said the men told them they used a truck in most of the burglaries and hauled much of the loot to Astoria.

MEDICAL STUDENT SLAIN BY HOLDUPS

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Lawrence Leonard Lyons, graduate of Yale and medical student of the University of Southern California, was shot to death in the Little Harlem of Los Angeles early today when he gave battle to two negroes who held him up.

The fight and killing was graphically described by Dennis Wells, negro, who told police he was an eyewitness from his room directly above the sidewalk where it occurred. Wells identified two suspects, arrested later by the police, as the holdup men.

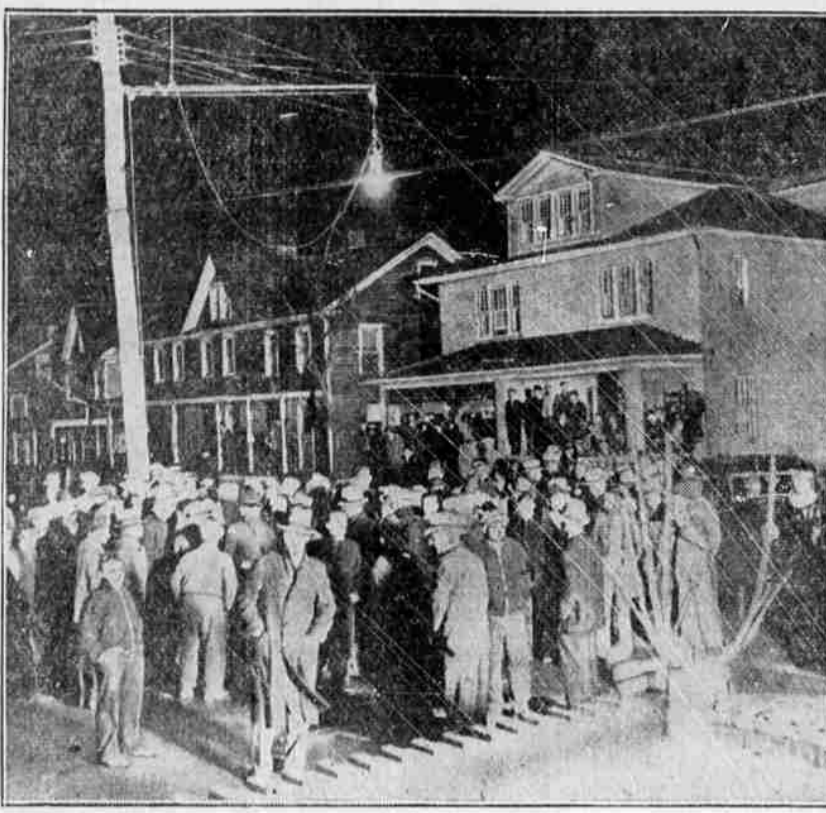
Just the day before a caller at the Mall Tribune wanted to know if the time had been set for the Republican funeral, but no information on the subject has as yet been uncovered.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Armistice day—16 years after—moved President and Mrs. Roosevelt to pay tribute to the soldier dead. It prompted the first lady, too, to say words of the miseries of war.

The president, leading thousands on the pilgrimage to the tomb of the unknown soldier, carried a wreath in remembrance. The first lady added a white chrysanthemum.

In a radio speech last night, Mrs. Roosevelt urged that youth be trained to amity and understanding for other countries.

CUTTING LEAD GROWS IN NEW MEXICO VOTE

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Revised county totals today had given Senator Bronson Cutting, republican independent, a lead of 1410 votes in his senatorial race against Congressman Dennis Chavez, democrat.

Today's count made Cutting's total 74,873, Chavez' 73,463. It was the largest lead the senator has had in his re-election fight.
