

OFFICERS OF CCC DISTRICT RECEIVE NEW ASSIGNMENTS

Special orders issued today at the CCC district headquarters name Major Robert F. Darr as district executive officer of the Medford headquarters and First Lieutenant Howard A. Malin, who has served as assistant district officer, as district quartermaster.

Captain M. Milton Potter, who has been district executive officer, is now district welfare officer and will also be district inspector.

The orders also included a number of changes in the district with numerous officers being transferred. First Lieutenant George W. Everman, Inf.-Res., who has been at Camp Wimer, is going to Camp Selad in northern California, the new listing shows. First Lieutenant Andrew J. Hemstreet, Jr., Inf.-Res., who has been with Company 1746 at Camp Kerby, will go to Camp Wimer.

Effective December 4, another group of officers is to be transferred. Captain Eben S. Longfellow, Engr.-Res., of Camp Wimer, will go to Camp Humboldt Mountain, while Captain Herman L. Harms of Camp Oak Knoll will report for duty with Company 1849 at Camp McKinley.

Captain Guy E. Saunders, Inf.-Res., of Camp Humboldt Mountain, will go to Camp Wimer, the orders state. Second Lieutenant Paul R. Lafferty, Inf.-Res., of Camp Carberry Creek, is scheduled to transfer to Camp Indian Creek in northern California, and Second Lieutenant Edwin L. RAIN QUENCHES 3 FOREST FIRES

Last night brought an end to what forest service officials say is almost an annual result on the part of late-season deer hunters. Three forest fires, one of 75 acres, one of eight and one of five acres in extent, all in the Big Apple country, were fully extinguished by the rain after CCC men from Camp Applegate had been called out to fight the two largest soon after they began to show up early in the week.

Forest officials believe that hunters lost all caution with the first damp weather, and probably set pitch-trees ablaze for campfires. Although continued soggy weather evidently kept the fires barely smoldering for several weeks following deer season, the recent good weather is believed to have allowed the blazes to spread.

Slight damage was suffered this year, but in past years fires set in similar manner have caused heavy loss, according to the forest service.

COOTER ASSURED OF SPEAKERSHIP

EUGENE, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Earl Hill, Cushman merchant, today threw his support behind the candidacy of John E. Cooter, democratic aspirant for the speakership of the lower house in the 1935 legislature, thus virtually assuring the democrat of election to that important post in state affairs.

Representative Hill, listed as the strongest contestant for the speakership before the democratic avalanche on Nov. 8, in making his decision public through the Eugene Register-Guard today, declared that in the interest of "political harmony and good legislation," he had decided to support Representative Cooter for the speakership, throwing aside his own aspirations and urging his supporters to follow his example.

STATE MUST PAY JUDGES SALARIES

SALEM, Nov. 15.—(AP)—It is the mandatory duty of the state emergency board to provide moneys to pay the back salaries of Oregon supreme court justices and circuit court judges, it was held in an opinion delivered to Secretary of State P. J. Stadlerman by Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle.

Back salaries for the months of October and November will total \$29,000 and the emergency board has only \$32,000 remaining which it may appropriate. It was stated therefore that the 1935 legislature would have to provide for the December salaries.

The opinion, which was written by Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general, held that the courts could compel the emergency board to pay these back salaries through an appropriation, through a mandamus suit begun either by a justice of the supreme court or by a circuit judge.
