

CANVASS BOARD CONCLUDES TALLY OF COUNTY VOTE

The canvassing board yesterday completed the official count of the vote of Jackson county for the general election held November 6.

Certified copies of the count have been forwarded to the secretary of state at Salem.

Certificates of election to the winners of state and county positions will be issued early in December, and they will assume office Wednesday, January 2.

At that time oaths of office will be administered to Syd I. Brown, elected sheriff, Otto Caster, county commissioner, and County Judge Earl B. Day, re-elected.

State Senator George W. Dunn of Ashland, re-elected, and Moore Hamilton and Glenn O. Taylor, elected representatives from this district, will receive their oaths at the opening of the next session of the legislature.

Analysts of the election claim this was due to many voters marking their ballots for but one candidate, instead of two.

\$6,548 Paid Farmers of County in AAA Benefits

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Rental and benefit payments to Washington and Oregon farmers by the AAA in the wheat and corn-hog programs since the act became effective amounted to \$6,548.791 on September 30.

This was revealed in a monthly report of the AAA. The total for Washington state was given as \$4,388,819, of which \$4,089,734 went to farmers under the wheat reduction program and \$299,084 for the corn-hog activities.

In Oregon the amount was given by the AAA report as \$1,898,972, divided between the programs as follows: Wheat, \$1,882,977, and corn-hog, \$15,995.

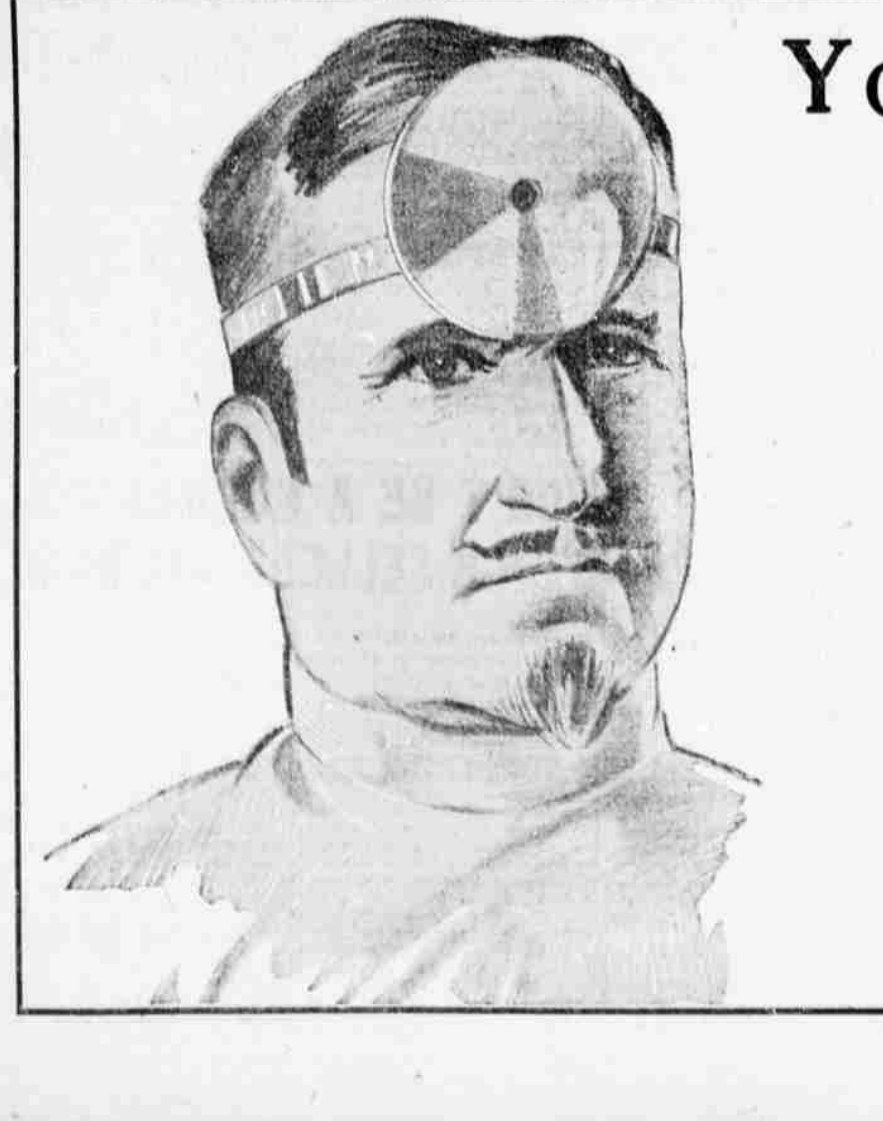

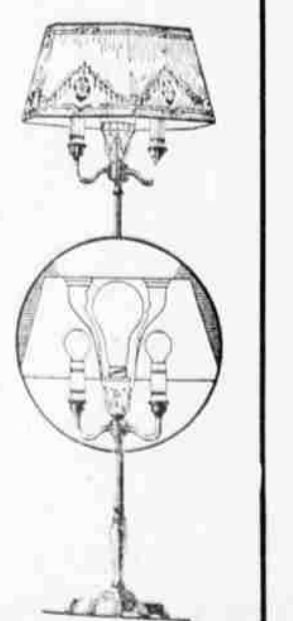
