MANILA, P. I., Nov. 15.—Four fishermen were reported drowned off Cebu today on the island of Samar. In the first accounts of loss of life in yesterday's devastating typhoon. Estimates placed the homeless at 20,000 in the town of Naga, a provincial capital on Luzon island, alone.

OREGON CITY, Nov. 15.—In expert handling of a revolver cost the life yesterday of Ralph Russell, 28, at his home two miles south of Molalla. Russell was examining a revolver owned by his brother. The weapon discharged and the bullet entered his abdomen. He died about an hour later.

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Numerous suggestions for furthering the work of the Grange, among them the extension of cooperatives to agricultural lands, were offered today by agricultural leaders at a lecturers' conference held in connection with the National Grange convention. Ervin C. King, master of the Washington State Grange, urged before the lecturers' conference that greater use be made of the cooperative plan. He pointed out that in his state, 7,000,000 gallons of gasoline were sold last year through 42 cooperative stations and that the Grange is operating a powder manufacturing company. King laid down 12 "commandments" for the successful operation of cooperatives, among them: Sell at competitive prices only. Do not cut prices. Stock only staple goods required by members. Select competent managers. Pay managers reasonable salary. Give the business your hearty cooperation. Cooperate with other recognized cooperative organizations. Louie J. Taber, national master, outlined various activities through which officers of the Grange might further its work and said: "Above all, keep the Grange ideals high."
