Complex Comedy in "The Gay Divorcee"

For sheer novelty, sensational spectacles and peals of laughter, "The Gay Divorcee," which opened yesterday at the Craterian theater, rates the gratitude of all movie goers.

The story is one of those complex embroglios that gives all disappointed lovers an opportunity to laugh at film lovers whose plight is far, far worse than their own.

Miss Rogers, after falling in love with Astaire, a victim of his inimitable dancing, his songs and whimsicalities, decides to get rid of a surly boy friend so that she can accept Astaire's impetuous wooing. She arranges to hire a "professional flirt."

Astaire comes wandering in under such circumstances that Miss Rogers believes that HE is the flirt. In this complication they ride high, wide and handsome to a hilarious, miraculous climax.
