## WRITTEN DEMANDS FOR PUGH RELEASE SERVED ON COURT

The district attorney's office, and the judge of the circuit court have received letters the past week from members of the "Farmers and Workers' Union," throughout this state and Washington, "demanding" the release of Kyle Pugh, held in the county jail and indicted by the last grand jury, on a charge of "criminal syndicalism." The letters were postmarked from Yakima and Sedro-Woolley, Wash., and from Douglas, Marion and Josephine counties in this state.

Circuit Judge Norton also the past week received two notes, written on the stationery of the Hotel Eugene at Eugene and the Hotel Marion at Salem.

The Eugene note contained only the Biblical quotation: "Thou Shalt Not Steal," and the one from Salem, "Thou Shalt Not Kill." Both were written in the same handwriting and were unsigned.

No action has been taken on the missives, but they are filed for future reference.

A delegation called last week on the court and "demanded" the release of Pugh, which was denied by the court. Pugh is held under \$1000 bonds. His trial is set for next month.

Pugh was arrested last September by state police, on the Pacific highway near Central Point. He claims to be a resident of Josephine county. He was traveling in a donkey-drawn cart with a sign urging a "revolution." Communist literature urging overthrow of the American form of government was found in his possession.

James E. Stockman of this city, charged with the same offense, entered a plea of guilty three weeks ago, and was granted a suspended sentence of six months by the court.

## GLEEMEN JOIN IN NORMAL CONCERT BY LUCIE LANDEN

**ASHLAND, Nov. 16—(Spl.)**—Adding another delightful concert for the enjoyment of the music lovers of Ashland, Miss Lucie Landen, the new violin instructor and orchestra director at the Southern Oregon Normal school, was presented in concert Wednesday night at the Normal auditorium, under the leadership of James Stevens.

The program was interestingly arranged and most enthusiastically received by a large audience. Miss Landen's lovely tone work was an outstanding feature of her playing; and the glamour and gracefulness of the old south seemed to drift through the music as this woman from Mississippi interpreted her selections.

The accompaniment to this nocturne was especially beautiful and was given great charm by Miss Landen's accompanist, Miss Alice Holmback of Medford. Miss Holmback is a gifted pianist who has recently come to Medford from Seattle, where she has been active in music work, and will be welcomed in music circles of southern Oregon.

The group of men singers who also so joyfully and wholeheartedly, and who list themselves as the Gleemen, gave a wide selection of songs in their three groups. Beloved old numbers of yesteryear, such as The Stein Song and The Road to Mandalay, were given with the same virile spirit and gusto that have always made these pieces favorites as group songs. The Russian Cossack song and The Trumpeter were particularly well suited to a program for men's voices.
