

CRATER LAKE C. E. OPEN CONVENTION AT GRANTS PASS

Starting tonight at 8 o'clock with a pot-luck supper, Christian endeavor societies of Crater Lake union will meet at Grants Pass for an annual three day convention.

The program will continue over Saturday and Sunday, with a complete schedule of worship services, addresses and social functions. The three state officers present will be Dr. Walter L. Myers, state counselor and field secretary, of Eugene; Grace Adamson, state superintendent of the "C. E. World," of Portland; Thelma Parish, regional vice president of the state union, of Klamath Falls.

The theme of the convention will be "This is The Message." Rev. H. H. Hilton, pastor of the Grants Pass Christian church, will be host, and Opal Bush, of Ashland, president of Crater Lake union, will preside. In this evening's session, Rev. Hilton will give an address of welcome, and "We Received the Message," will be the subject of an address by Rev. W. R. Baird of the Medford Christian church.

On Saturday there will be committee meetings at which officers will deliver their messages, and in the morning Miss Adamson will deliver a pep talk. In the evening, Gerald Latham will be toastmaster at the banquet, and there will be a song service and business sessions. Sunday will be devoted to church services and in the afternoon Dr. Myers will address the delegates on "This is The Message. He Called to You." In the evening awards will be presented, and Dr. Myers will deliver the closing talk.

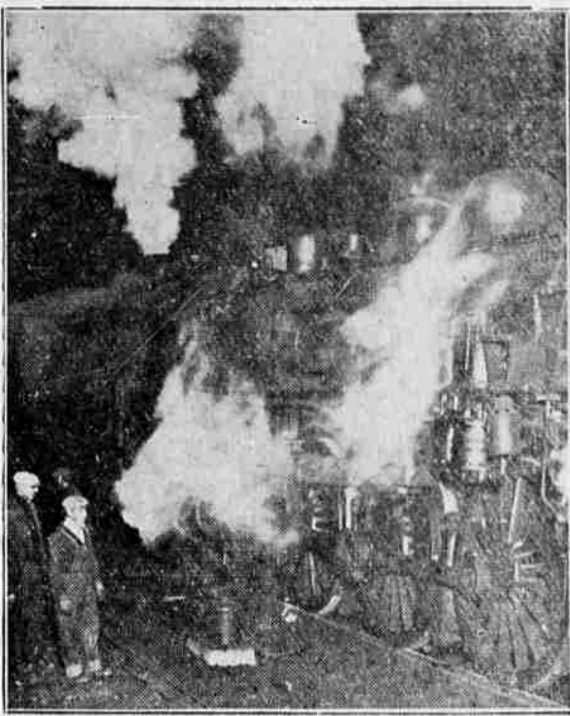
RATES ON BONNEVILLE POWER READY SOON

KLAMATH AIR SERVICE MAKES DAILY FLIGHTS WITH BIG BOEING SHIPS

In answer to many inquiries about the new air service to Klamath Falls and Lakeview, Tom Culbertson, superintendent at the Medford municipal airport and local representative of the firm, stated today that it is not necessary to hold a merchant's contract, which allows each holder of such a contract the right to one run trip a month and a stipulated amount of express, to obtain passage on the line.

One-way passage for the trip, which takes 35 minutes, can be had for \$4.25 to Klamath Falls and \$9.50 to Lakeview. The roundtrip fare to Klamath is \$7.65. Scheduled flights leave Medford at 3:45 p. m. and reservations may be had at the Hotel Medford or the municipal airport.

GRID TILT HERE NOV. 24 DECIDES PORTLAND'S FOE

PORTLAND, Nov. 16.—(P)—Elite Medford high or Hood River football eleven may figure in the selection of an outside team to play a Thanksgiving day game here against Washington high for the unofficial state championship. Through arrangements made yesterday by long distance telephone, Medford and Hood River agreed to meet in a game at Medford, Saturday, November 24, in a contest that is expected to aid in the selection of an opponent for Washington Thanksgiving day.

Both Medford and Hood River, along with Washington, hold undefeated records. Salem and Pendleton also hold undefeated records, but could not be considered, owing to previously scheduled contests. The Medford Peepstickers have one game left on their schedule, with Grants Pass next Saturday.

TWO PILOTS KILLED IN AIRLINE SMASH

AMAZONIA, Mo., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Two airplane pilots were killed early today when a tri-motored Rapid Airline plane crashed and burned near here. The victims were H. C. Bradford, a private pilot and manager of the St. Joseph, Mo., airport, and Ben F. Billings, Kansas City, who was at the controls.

Flying from Omaha to Kansas City the plane was reported by a party of hunters to have circled several times before it crashed and burst into flames.

AMORTIZATION ACT COMING UP AGAIN

SALEM, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Re-introduction of the bill calling for amortization of the state land board loans will be made in the state senate at its next session by James T. Chinnock of Josephine county, the senator informed Rufus C. Holman by letter today.

The bill was introduced at the second special 1934 session by Chinnock and passed the senate, but was among those remaining to be acted upon in the house when the session was adjourned.

Chinnock stated he considered the bill very important legislation, considering that form of amortization the best method of reducing the outstanding loans, declaring mortgages are in favor of the plan.

FIVE COUNTY VOTES HOLDING UP CANVASS

SALEM, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Official records of votes from five counties must be received before the canvass of the general election ballots can be made by the secretary of state. Thirty-one counties have already sent in the official votes, it was announced today.

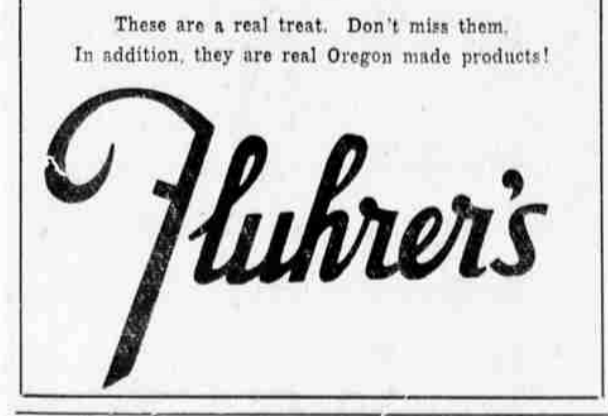
