



NEW BASKETBALL DISTRICTS MADE BY STATE GROUP

Jackson in District Nine—Change Result of Protest Too Many Schools in Some Divisions

SALEM, Nov. 16.—(AP)—The state high school basketball district setup was shown to be considerably changed today following an announcement by John L. Gary, secretary of the state high school athletic association, that a new restructuring had been effected at the meeting of the association in Portland.

The change was said to be the result of protests that the recent revision establishing 12 A districts and four B districts, had placed far too many A schools in some divisions.

Under the new setup Marion and Polk counties, which had been placed with Lincoln, Benton, Linn and Lane counties in District 9, will now be in number 6 with Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties. Formerly Tillamook was included with Clatsop and Columbia counties, which form district 5.

Jackson in Nine.

District 9, under the previous plan, was also split up into two districts. Number 9 will now include Josephine and Jackson counties, while Douglas, Coos and Curry will form district 8. Former districts 2 and 4 have been consolidated into district 2, which will include Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Wheeler, Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties. Although covering a lot of territory this district will contain only four A schools.

The only change in the B school districts was the shifting of Polk and Marion counties from district 16 to district 15.

The new districting follows:

District 1—Wallowa, Union, Baker and Malheur counties. Six A schools.

District 2—Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Wheeler, Sherman, Wasco and Hood River counties. Four A schools.

District 3—Jefferson, Deschutes, Crook, Lake, Klamath counties. Five A schools.

District 4—Clackamas and Multnomah (outside of Portland) counties. Twelve A schools.

District 5—Clatsop and Columbia counties. Seven A schools.

District 6—Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Marion counties. Twelve A schools.

District 7—Lincoln, Benton, Lane, Linn counties. Seven A schools.

District 8—Douglas, Coos, Curry counties. Five A schools.

District 9—Josephine and Jackson counties. Three A schools.

District 10—City of Salem. Salem high school.

Districts 11 and 12—City of Portland. Eight A schools.

The four B districts are:

District 13—Wallowa, Union, Baker, Malheur, Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Wheeler, Grant, Harney, Sherman, Wasco, Sherman counties. Sixty-seven B schools.

District 14—Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Lake, Klamath, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine, Jackson counties. Seventy-three B schools.

District 15—Clackamas, Multnomah, Columbia, Clatsop, Washington, Tillamook, Yamhill, Polk, Marion counties. Forty-one B schools.

District 16—Lincoln, Benton, Lane, Linn counties. Forty-eight B schools.

MUIR PINS SINGH BY SONNENBERGS; RED DEMON WINS

Jagat Singh, agile Hindu grappler, lost two out of three falls in the main event to big Honny Muir, Australian champion.

After demonstrating the mat methods used in Punjab, India, for 27 minutes of colorful wrestling, Singh, who weighs 231 pounds yet is nimble, was put away for the first fall with a body press after losing a series of arguments with Muir's stubborn shoulder. But the Indian made quick work of the husky Australian in the second tangle, winning it with his favorite hold, the Indian deadlock, in six minutes.

Applied from a standing position, this spectacular hold was the highlight of the well-attended match. The Hindu sprang into the air, wrapped a foot about Muir's leg, tripped the big Australian and leaped back with Muir's legs in a lock from which very few wrestlers have escaped. The most unusual bone breaker of the most unbridled bone breaker yet to appear on any of Promoter Mack Lillard's wrestling mats.

The Hindu was a sanda and a turban, both of which he removed, and his white teeth glistened from behind a white mustache as he trotted around the ring or closed with the islander in the peculiar style known to grapplers of his race.
