

# TURKEY DEMAND INCREASES WITH FEAST DAY NEAR

PORTLAND, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Turkey demand is increasing but the supply available at country points is rapidly reaching the high mark for the season. Reports received by local distributors indicated a huge killing campaign for Thanksgiving when local shipments are due to break the records for many years past.

California was taking carload lots of turkeys daily from this territory, creating an unusually heavy demand which was being taken care of by the larger supplies available.

Prices however were firm to higher. In the country bids for No. 1 dressed turkeys and hens has been generally advanced 1c to 20c lb. while 20c was being freely offered in Portland with some small lots taking a premium of 1c. Today's prices showed 17-22c for dressed and 14-16c alive.

Generally firmer to higher trade conditions and prices were reflected in turkeys throughout the country, according to a late department of agriculture report.

appealed, no immediate steps could be taken until the high waters of the treacherous Rogue have receded, it being unsafe to work in the river except during the months from June to October. Once favorable conditions obtain, however, work will be pushed forward.

Asked about the interest held by the city of Gold Hill in the transaction, Muirhead said that there is at the present time a 400-kilowatt power plant at the site, which is one mile upstream from the Gold Hill highway bridge. This plant has been standing since 1913, and is owned by the city of Gold Hill, but has been

under contract to the cement company since 1926. The plant has been standing idle, however, pending a decision in the case, since sufficient water has not been available for operation.

Contract With City. Muirhead's company holds a purchase contract with the city, under which the cement organization is to carry on development of the property, which involves the establishment of a clear title to the water and constructing the plant. Completion of the contract entails service to the town whereby the company will furnish them with both water and lights for municipal use.

There has been a dam at the site, according to Muirhead, either complete or partial, since late in the 1870's, when the first power dam on the Rogue went in at that location to furnish power for a flour mill.

Portions of the old dam are still there, lying mostly under water, but much of it has been washed away. Photographs of the old dam were presented by the cement company in their long legal fight.

Cement Prospects Bright. The Beaver company holds large contracts for Bonneville dam and the new Cosas highway bridge, and expects to operate more steadily than at any time since 1931. Establishment of the new hydro-electric plant would result in a substantial saving to the company, Muirhead stated.

Cops officials declined to make a statement today as to whether they will carry the case into a higher court.
