

Rejuvenated Trojans Overwhelm Oregon Eleven in Rain, 33 to 0

CALLISON'S SQUAD UNABLE TO KEEP UP EARLY DRIVE

Warburton-Wotkyn Combination Puzzles — Teams Even On First Downs — Long Runs Feature Game

MEMORIAL COLLEGIUM, LOS ANGELES, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Time was when it was news when Southern California lost a football game. Today it was news when it won one. The long football drought ended for the Trojans when Howard Jones' team defeated the University of Oregon 33 to 0.

A crowd of 30,000 spectators sat in a drizzling rain, to see the Southern Californians win their first game since September 29, when College of Pacific was stopped 9 to 0.

Tuesday's victory marked the first successful conquest of the season for Southern California in the Pacific Coast Conference and for a few minutes early in the game, the damp crowd thought the Trojans' appearance in the win column might be postponed indefinitely. Oregon scored six first downs before Southern California made its first.

Oregon started with a rush and drove to Southern California's 11-yard line early in the first quarter when the Trojans made a great stand and took the ball on downs. In a few minutes the Webfooters were back in Trojan territory again, firing passes from the 26-yard line. Here, Clemens placed Southern California in a position to score by grabbing an Oregon pass on his own 10-yard line and racing to the visitors' 27-yard line.

The home team uncovered some unexpected strategy immediately by looking at Irvine Warburton, but giving the ball to Haskell Wotkyn. While the Oregonians were keeping Warburton covered, Wotkyn ran wild, finally winding up with the first touchdown on the one-yard line Clemens kicked the goal and the Jones crew was out in front for the first time since mid-October.

Warburton paved the way for the second touchdown, driving the parade yard line with a punt, twice reversing his field along the line of march. With Wotkyn and Warburton doing the ball-carrying, the Trojans moved to Oregon's 17-yard line and then Warburton passed to Browning over the goal line for the second touchdown and again Clemens kicked the goal.

With two touchdowns in the second period, the Trojans rested temporarily on their laurels although Warburton constituted another dazzling dash, nullified, however, by a penalty. The little quarterback caught an Oregon punt and ran it back 37 yards. But Southern California was caught holding on the play.

The winners cut loose in the second half and the tiring visitors could not hold them.

Warburton dashed 29 yards returning a punt early in the third period and then passed to the future Heisman winner 13 yards. Wotkyn sprinted 30 yards to Oregon's 25-yard line and from this point the trip goalward was made by easy stages. Wotkyn finally going over for the touchdown.

On the next kick-off, Warburton ran 52 yards and then passed to Clemens on the 24-yard line. The Webfooters braced and stopped this drive but Davis came in for Warburton and starting on his own 23-yard line, found a hole at back and ran 77 yards for another touchdown. The fifth touchdown was scored when Maurice Van Vleet, fading deep in his own territory to pass, was rushed and let a hurried loss go. The ball bounded into the arms of Goughlin on the ten-yard line and it was no chore for him to trot over the goal line. Southern California was penalized for holding on the try for point and had to try it again without success.

Southern California, threatening throughout a dismal season to come into its own as an offensive power, displayed a smart drive today. The Trojans threw four and completed three passes today.

Although the team from Eugene made as many first downs as the winners — 11 all — Southern California stopped the advance when Oregon seemed about to score on the Trojans for the first time in four years.

It was the first time Southern California had played a home game in the rain in ten years.

WILLAMETTE ACE SCORER NETS 7-0 WIN OVER IRISH

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Johnny Orave, highest scoring football player on the coast, led Willamette university in a 7 to 0 victory over Columbia university on a cloudy, muddy field here today.

The win gave Willamette claim to the state independent football championship.

The fighting Irish line outcharged Willamette in the first half, which was scoreless. Columbia played a line defensive game but was able to make only one first down from scrimmage against the sturdy Bearcat defense. Willamette smothered Columbia's trick plays and passes.

In the third quarter Willamette, playing its second game of the week, passed and punted 42 yards for a touchdown. Orave tossed a 21-yard pass to Versteeg to place the ball on Columbia's five yard line. On the third down Orave skirted left end for a touchdown which ran his season's scoring to 78 points.

CALDWELL, Idaho, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Playing in a souping rain that began early in the game, the College of Idaho football team defeated Lincoln college of McMinnville, Ore., 13 to 0, in a home-coming game here today.

GONZAGA HELD TO TIE BY WICHITA

WICHITA, Kan., Nov. 17.—(AP)—An intercepted pass in the waning minutes of the game stopped a Gonzaga drive within five yards of a touchdown and the Wichita University Wildcats gained a 0 to 0 tie over their higher rated opponents from Spokane, Wash., here this afternoon.

The game was played in a drizzling rain which at times broke out into showers that left puddles of water on an already mushy field. The weather was a distinct handicap to the speedy Gonzaga backs, relying on fast moving trick and spinner plays.

Statistics of the game show neither team excelled notably in any one department of play. The most serious threat to the Wichita goal followed Handels' fumble of a Gonzaga punt on his own 15 yard line. Gonzaga recovered and in three smashes carried the ball to the Wichita 8-yard line.

OLIN VICTOR IN ROSENBLUM BOUT

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Meet the new champion of the light heavyweight, Bob Olin, product of Brooklyn preliminaries, more recently of the Golden Gloves tournaments and now first citizen of the 175-pound division.

Olin, known in flaic circles as "The Plunder," stumbled through 15 drab, dreary and at times, sad rounds with Maxie Sikesey Rosenblum at Madison Square Garden Friday night and by dint of his willingness to do most of what little fighting the evening produced emerged with the decision, the title and whatever cash and glory that goes with it.

It was one of those "moral victories" which, in the past have been confined almost strictly to football.

STATERS BATTLE MONTANA TO TIE, FUMBLES COSTLY

BELL FIELD, CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 17.—(AP)—The Grizzlies of University of Montana closed their conference season here today by holding the faltering Oregon State college football team to a 7-7 tie before a small home-coming crowd of about 3500 persons.

The game was played on a sloppy, muddy field, yet both teams resorted to the air to score, each getting over a touchdown in the first period within a few minutes of the other.

Oregon State fumbled the slippery ball repeatedly, and Montana, recovered three of these bobbles while holding tight themselves, except for a fumbled punt which they recovered.

The game was nearly as even as the score, although the Staters made seven first downs to three for the visitors, and 122 yards total to 112 yards by Montana. Neither side gained consistently from scrimmage, the Staters making only 90 yards, and Montana 62 yards.

The Beavers scored midway in the first period after an exchange of punts gave them the ball on the Montana 41 yard line. A flat pass, Norman (Red) Franklin to Pangle, netted 30 yards to the Montana 11. Three downs gained only four yards. Then Franklin faked back and shot a pass over the line to Cassey, right end. The ball was tipped by a Montana back and was juggled by Cassey but he held on to it for the counter, Swanson converted.

Montana took the kickoff and immediately started passing. A long heave, Emery to Heller, gained 19 yards and put the ball on the State 13. Two line plays failed to gain and again Emery shot a pass to Heller, standing on the goal line. He jumped high in the air to get it and fell over the line as he was tackled. Emery made the extra point.

Neither team threatened seriously in the first half, nor was either able to penetrate far in the other's territory in the third period. Once Montana had the ball on the Beaver's 33-yard line, but was forced to punt, kicking out on the Oregon State 18-yard line.

With the most spectacular plays of the game Oregon State turned in three first downs in succession. Franklin passed to Schultz who lateraled to Pangle for a 12-yard gain. Another pass to Pangle gained 14 yards and then Scott, on an end around play, went 10 yards, to the Montana 29.

The march stopped when Sayatovich intercepted Franklin's pass and Montana punted out of danger. Neither side threatened thereafter.

Blasie for Montana carried the ball most consistently while Emery's passing and kicking were effective. Pangle again played brilliantly for the Staters.

Oregon State completed 8 of 18 forward passes for 90 yards while Montana completed only three of 14. This was the first time Montana ever played a tie game in the Coast Conference. Previously the Grizzlies have won two conference games.

CALIFORNIA 'HOT,' IDAHO SWAMPED

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Berkeley, Calif., Nov. 17.—(AP)—California's apparently rejuvenated Bears clinched fifteen thousand fans today they had left the ranks of football's forgotten teams by rolling up a 45 to 13 victory over the University of Idaho's Vandals, in a game filled with thrills despite the one-sided ending.

Behind seven to nothing at the end of the first quarter, a collection of Bear regulars and reserves rose up in championship fashion to not only wipe out the lead but carry on with touchdown marches that ended in two touchdowns in the second period and put Coach Bill Ingram's stalwarts ahead in the scoring column. Three more followed in the third quarter and the final gun had sounded as the second of two more touchdowns was being completed in the last period.

STANFORD STADIUM, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Tiny Thornhill's Stanford Indians remained undefeated here today as they turned a first half football game with the San Francisco Olympic club into a second half rout that ended in a 40 to 0 victory for the Redmen.

Chicago got 84 yards and four first downs by rushing.

YALE VICTORIOUS OVER PRINCETON IN HECTIC UPSET

PALMER STADIUM, Princeton, N. J., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Yale, playing throughout the game without a single substitution, sprang the most spectacular upset of the eastern gridiron campaign today by toppling Princeton from the unbeaten ranks, 7 to 0, before a capacity crowd of 52,000 astounded spectators.

The Yale tallied in the first period on a 41-yard pass, Roscoe to Kelly, and fought the fumbling Tigers to a standstill the rest of the way.

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Nov. 17.—(AP)—With one swift thrust late in the first period, covering 45 yards in five plays, Purdue scored the one touchdown necessary to beat Fordham before 35,000 people in the polo grounds today, 7 to 0.
