COURT DISMISSES PARR, FEHL SUIT

SALISBURY, Nov. 20.—(AP)—The fight for the democratic nomination for district attorney of Jefferson county won in the courts by Bernard H. Ramsey over V. S. Howard, the latter charged with violation of the corrupt practices act, came to naught, it was revealed when the state supreme court handed down its opinions here today.
