



SHOW-DOWN WITH HOOD RIVER GIVES MEDFORD CHANCE

State Supremacy Claims Will Be Put to Test—Apple Knockers Have Impressive Season Record

With the thought in mind that the breaks often play as important a part in the selection of an eastern representative as the Rose Bowl as do good ball teams, the coach of Vanderbilt university at Nashville, Tenn., once emitted this classical little gem on the subject: "Little Vanderbilt—undefeated, untied, unscared upon, and—uninvited."

The same situation has often prevailed in regard to Medford in its endeavors to remove a small bit of the "myth" from the "mythical state championship," with most of the other contenders exhibiting the trickiest footwork of the season in evading a showdown with the Black Tornado.

This year, however, Hood River decided to hurry Medford if it could, instead of awaiting in a loud voice that it could have, had a game been played. Yes, they stuck their helmeted heads right into the fray. Some think that they also stuck their foot in it, but this remains to be seen.

Means Portland Game

With the Hood River-Medford game on the books for Saturday, it seems logical that one of the two teams play Washington high school of Portland for the final decision on Thanksgiving.

Medford has a real record, with eight games having been played. They are undefeated and have been scored on in only two games, once by the Ashland Normal fresh and twice by the powerful Eureka, Cal., squad. The first game ended in a 6-6 tie and Medford won the second, 18-14.

In those eight games the Black Tornado has amassed the astounding total of 213 points to their opponents' 21. And none of their games were "setups," picked at the start of the season for obvious weakness.

Hood River boasts a record of 129 points to their opponents' none, in the last seven games played. Excuse me for being obvious, but that means that their goal line has been uncrossed, an impressive record. But Medford fans, in viewing that record, can't seem to let this hang too heavily upon them, in view of the fact that the Hood River goal line has never had Ghelardi, Bates, Smith, Kunzman, Hinman or Severson knocking to get in.

Estes Can Plunge

And, speaking of knocking to get in, reminds us that Estes the Tornado's man killer, can do a bit of knocking on his own account, if the situation seems to demand it of him.

In Saturday's game with Grants Pass, the big guard was called upon to buck over a try-for-point. Using no deception whatever, Estes lined up behind the line in the fullback position while Young took his position in the line. The ball was snapped and Estes exploded. At least that's what it looked like from the two-bit seats where this individual was engaged. He dynamited into the Grants Pass line, which broke like glass, and had some difficulty in hauling up short enough to avoid inflicting serious injury to the goal posts, several parked cars and the kids parked on the back fence.

Coach Burgher may decide to harness this irresistible force for the Hood River game and, if that happens, it will probably be safest to isolate the entire zone of encumbrances for safety's sake.

An interesting sidelight on the game is the letter reproduced in the Oregonian last week, written by Jas. A. Carr, coach of the apple knockers. Besides developing good teams, this gentleman also seems to have a flair for sarcasm, inasmuch as he states that one of Hood River's main attributes is the fact that they have been unprotected all year. He also states that—, but wait! I let you read what he says himself.

"I understand that this is the open season for undefeated high schools to start pestering the Portland sport writers about the Rose Bowl—I mean the Multnomah civic stadium game Thanksgiving. How would you like a nice, big, juicy, highly polished red Hood River apple? They are much better than those old sour Medford pears of Salem cherries." "A. C."

HOOD RIVER ARRANGES TELEGRAPH WIRE FOR GAME HERE SATURDAY

Interest at Hood River in the Medford-Hood River high school football game next Saturday is shown by information just received, that the Hood Riverites have arranged with the Western Union Telegraph company to furnish a play by play report of the game by telegraph.

According to Manager Frank Gray of the local Western Union, a wire will be run directly into Van Schoyck field, terminating at Hood River.

A private "press box" is being arranged in the grandstand, to be occupied by telegraph operator and reporters. A special sports reporter will be sent from Portland by the Western Union.

A play by play report of the game will be transmitted from Van Schoyck field directly into Hood River.

This is the first time the "Tigers" have created so much public interest as to warrant report of a game by private wire.
