



HOOD RIVER TEAM ROCKY OUTFIT IS REPORT OF SCOUT

**Digger They Are, Harder
They Fall Say Boys From
Apple Center — Second
Team for Defensive Only**

Hood River fans and football team are broadcasting to the world that Saturday's game here is in the well known "bag" for them. The two schools will meet on Van Scoyoc field to decide a contender for the Oregon state mythical state championship, the winner going to Portland for the annual Turkey day tilt which will in all probability decide the state football champ.

Although the Applepickers are a comparative light team, they have for their slogan: "The bigger they are the harder they fall" and the peculiar part of it is that this slogan has held true throughout their season.

The Medford scout who reviewed the Hood River-Goldendale game stated that the Hood Riverians were incomparable when it comes to cockiness. He talked to some of the players who said they would bowl over this big Medford squad "just like they did the Swedes from Astoria." They boasted of knocking out five in that game and forcing them to substitute seven.

Tough Time Expected
"If Medford wallops this bunch of bonecrushers, they will have been through a real football game," the scout declared.

The Hood River record for the season is as follows: Hood River 14, Chemawa 0; Hood River 26, Oregon City 0; Hood River 7, Astoria 0; Hood River (Reserves) 27, Maupin 0; Hood River 9, The Dalles 0; Hood River 27, Goldendale 0; Hood River 13, University high of Eugene 0. In all of these games, the first team has not played a full game, usually playing only about three-quarters of a half.

The first team consists of light and speedy boys who dish it out and then as soon as they roll up a touch-down or two the coach sends in his defense team which is supposed to be the second string. That is the system used all season, the second team playing more than the first team, it is reported.

Used Psychology
When asked why they had not rolled up higher scores, the Hood River boys stated "that's the psychology of it, don't you get it? If we beat those teams by a large score other teams would think we were good and therefore we wouldn't have the chance we have now. But we try to make them think that we're not so good and then when we play against them we beat the pants off 'em."

It was reported that a large group of Hood River fans are to arrive in Medford along with the Hood River team to watch their boys in action.

VISITOR BOASTS DEAN SOUVENIRS

Fred Reynolds, of Wichita, Kas., who is visiting here with his brother, O. R. Reynolds, of route 4, has in his possession two baseballs which were used by the famous Dizzy and Duffy Dean in a game Oct. 11 at Wichita, for which Reynolds' son, Buddy, was umpire.

Reynolds picked up the balls, five of which he said were taken in similar manner during the game, after they had been knocked out of the diamond on fouls. The game was for exhibition only, and was played between the Dean Brothers All Stars and the colored Kansas City Monarchs, as a part of the All Stars barnstorming tour of the middle states.

Reynolds said his son Buddy, who possesses two baseballs signed by the two ace pitchers, is coach of the South Kansas girls' team, which was seen in action in Medford two years ago in a game with the Jacksonville Miners on the fairgrounds diamond.

TURKEY KILLING IS ORDER OF DAY

Killing of Rogue River valley turkeys for the Thanksgiving trade starts today on a general scale, according to County Agent Robert G. Fowler. Shipment of the birds is expected to get under full swing by the end of the week.

Present price is between six and seven cents higher than last year. Persons acquainted with turkey market conditions are hopeful of a further rise between now and Thanksgiving.

According to Fowler, most of the valley turkeys are being purchased by independent buyers for storage, or shipment east. He estimates approximately 15,000 pounds have been bought by the "co-operative pool." It is also estimated slightly more than one-third of the valley turkey crop of 500,000 pounds has been sold.

Local turkeys this year are pronounced of the best size and quality in several years.

LOCAL SPANIEL IS PRIZE WINNER

Added to the list of prize-winning products of the valley is the two-year old female Cocker spaniel "Peaches", owned by Mrs. Jack Thrasher of Jacksonville, which was awarded first prize in the novice class at the Pacific International Livestock exposition held last fall at Portland.

One of seven Cocker spaniels being raised by Mrs. Thrasher, "Peaches" also won second prize in the amateur-bred class, and was the reserve winner in the parti-colored female class. The beautifully marked black and white dog was shown at the exposition by Mrs. M. S. Vance of Portland, from whom it was obtained as a pup by Mrs. Thrasher.

All of the dogs owned by Mrs. Thrasher are of registered stock. Next spring she will show a male spaniel, "Kermit", and expects him to do as well or better for the valley's reputation. One or two of the pups may also accompany "Kermit" to the exposition.

MINNESOTA, OHIO GAME PROPOSED

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The dream game of the western football conference season, a clash between Minnesota's mighty array and Ohio State's spectacular Buckeyes, is a possibility.

The game, if plans of Ohio enthusiasts, encouraged by Governor Dew White, are successful, would be played for charity, probably in the huge horseshoe stadium at Columbus on December 1.

Governor White has attempted to reach Governor Floyd Olson of Minnesota, who is in Washington, to make an official proposal for the game.

YALE IRON MEN OPEN NEW GRID ERA FOR BLUES

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(AP)—If, as now appears likely, Yale scales the championship heights of the old big three by beating Harvard this Saturday at New Haven, it can be said with finality the current "iron men" of old Eli have started a brand new era in football for the blues.

The eleven conquerors of Princeton typify an elemental surge Yale hasn't known in years. Yale has had some great teams and great players in fairly recent years, but not since little Albie Booth flashed across the gridirons in 1929 has anything revived the Blue's sagging football spirits as much as Captain Clare Curtin's "sixty minute men."

Old Blues who journeyed down to Princeton last Saturday, mainly out of habit, with many misgivings, came away hoarse and puffed with excitement. Yet it was only a couple of years ago that old grads were shocked by a Yale captain's statement to the general effect that "winning wasn't everything" and it was barely six months ago that these same old grads were yelling for a complete house cleaning at New Haven.

They wanted the graduate coaching system scrapped and a young man with modern ideas, like Harry G. Kipke of Michigan, installed in the head man's chair. Instead they got Raymond W. (Ducky) Pond of the class of 1925 as head coach, with a corps of "outsiders" as assistants, headed by Earle (Greasy) Neale—and they're beginning to like it immensely.

Although it was announced from Hood River that a sports reporter would come to Medford to give a running account of the Medford-Hood River game next Saturday over a leased telegraph wire, arrangements have been made in Medford today for Dick Applegate, of this city, to do the announcing.

Applegate will give a play-by-play account of the game to an operator in a "press box" now being installed at Van Scoyoc field, for immediate transmission to Hood River. It will be the first time that interest in a game at Medford has warranted telegraph service north.

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ROAD WORK PLANS NEW RING SCORING MADE FOR WINTER SYSTEM SOUGHT

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—(AP)—The New York State Athletic commission, having failed to agree on a system of judging fights which would eliminate so many questionable decisions, has invited suggestions.

Brig. Gen. John J. Phelan, although desiring to fight a way out of the mud, favors the present combined system of point scoring and round awards. Bill Brown, his militant associate and former referee, would scrap the complicated code and give the referee sole power over the proceedings in the ring. The suggestions will be considered Friday.

Plans and specifications for winter road work in Jackson county are being made by the resident engineer of the state highway commission. They include two projects: Widening of the Pacific Highway through Gold Hill, and straightening and widening of the curves at the north end of the Rogue river bridge, in that city.

The other project is the grading, surfacing and oiling of the Applegate road, from Murphy to Gray's creek. Bids are scheduled to be let on the two projects, December 8.

Funds for the two jobs are provided by the federal road aid fund, in co-operation with the state. Work is now in progress on the Lake Creek road. The contract calling for grading is held by Ed F. Webber.
