



LEATHERS RETURNS TO GRAPPLE DEVIL ON TONIGHT'S CARD

Hooded Bone Crusher Will Have Tough Evening, Is Belief—Karasiok Faces German in Opening Bout

Whether or not Red Devil, wrestling's man of mystery, will be able to hold forth for one hour or two out of three falls against Sad Sam Leithers, popular Texan, will be decided tonight at the armory in the main event of a two-ply card.

Some of the Medford fans who follow Lumber Sam's ring conquests believe that the man with the educated legs will hand out more pure wrestling than the mysterious meaning can take. Others think Sad Sam is in for an evening of punishment when he clatters into the arena against the hooded demon.

Red Devil, anonymous even to his promoters, weighs about 235 pounds, but is surprisingly nimble for his size. Sad Sam, termed the game's lumberjack, weighs 200 and will stand a head taller than his opponent tonight.

In the first half of the program "Art Al" Karasiok, of Russia, will tangle with Hans Schultz, experienced German. This combination promises a grunt and grimace show performed by two old-timers who know the ropes from both ends.

Real Peril for Al. The Russian Lion has appeared here many times, but on very few occasions has he been forced to use his wisdom of the game or his wiry strength to keep the upper hand. Despite being one of the dwarfs of the ring Karasiok ranks as a big time wrestler.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Nov. 22 (Sp.)—Jim Carr's Hood River high football squad, undefeated in this season's play, entrained early today for Medford, where the team is to meet Darwin Bunker's Pearepickers Saturday.

Carr's starting eleven announced today will average slightly more than 158 pounds to the man as it steps on Van Schooye field in the game that is expected to decide the team that plays Washington high of Portland Thanksgiving day.

Two Fresh in Lineup. The largest man in the Applemen's starting lineup is Tom Sneeldrake, regular left tackle, who tips the scales at 190 pounds. The smallest performer among the regulars is Clifton Wolstorff, fullback.

NEW ORLEANS, (UP)—A date seed carefully tossed to the ground by P. A. Chopin, president of the New Orleans Horticultural society, has produced a miracle.

From that seed has sprung a mighty date palm tree, which bears 800 pounds of luscious seedless dates each year. This is the only known seedless date palm in the world, Chopin says.

Experiments conducted by Chopin has convinced him that it is impossible to graft or propagate this date in any way save through "suckers" that grow from the roots.
