Division of Texas Easy Legally, But Seen Far Distant

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Division of Texas, biggest state in the Union, again is under lively discussion. Vice President John N. Garner, original advocate of dividing Texas, is silent now, but the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has presented arguments for and against, in its official publication.

Legally the division is possible and may be accomplished with simplicity. Practically no one expects it within a quarter of a century at the least.

New States Provided When the giant state, four times bigger than all New England, was admitted to the Union, there was a provision that new states not exceeding four may with the consent of Texas be fashioned out of the territory and be entitled to admission.

Present agitation is merely for creation of one new state to be known as "West Texas."

As Vice President Garner explains the situation, this can be done merely by act of the legislature. The difficulty will be to get a majority of the legislature favorable to the division.

Dividing Line Any dividing line separating the state into East and West portions naturally have the 100th Meridian as its northern starting point. That is the meridian that separates the Texas panhandle from Oklahoma.

Extended through the state the meridian strikes the Rio Grande west of Laredo. Used as a dividing line it would place only about a third of the area of Texas in "West Texas."

The western territory would have only about 15 members of the Texas house of representatives and three senators or one-tenth, instead of one-half, of the vote.

CALIFORNIA HATCHES NEW THEORY TO CURE WORLD ECONOMIC ILLS

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—California, birthplace of a wide assortment of social and economic "cure alls," has introduced a new theory recently while the courts at the request of the Better Business bureau, investigated the International Institute research administration.

The purpose of the organization, it was revealed, is to buy up the world's resources with funds derived from the nickel-a-day contributions of members.

Meetings and other affairs were mysterious; officials were secretive, and the bureau wondered where the money was going. They asked a grand jury investigation.

When Arthur L. Bell, the institute's mysterious "Mr. X" refused to answer questions at the grand jury inquisition, he was cited for contempt.

Testimony of Bell, who assertedly addressed institute meetings, was introduced during the contempt hearing. The testimony, as presented to the grand jury, disclosed Bell received from a "man on a Pullman car" instructions for achieving the institute's aims of ending war, preventing communism and picking everyone in jobs with minimum salaries of \$3,000 a year for a four-hour day. Bell said he did not know the man's name.

Judge Walter Perry Johnson said he would rule on the contempt charge late this month.

BRITISH TO BAN OLD RADIO GAGS

LONDON.—(UP)—Timeswarn gags and other stale "cheatnuts" are going to be banished from the ether in Great Britain.

The British Broadcasting corporation has begun compiling a joke library in which every wisecrack, gag and humorous story ever told into microphone will find its last resting place. It looks as if life would become distinctly harder for tired-out comedians, who will have to turn out an entirely new set of gags.

In the future, once a joke has been told over the ether, it will be copyrighted, filed and considered dead. There certainly will be a bulging file of wisecracks under such headings as "Aberdonians," "mothers-in-law," "kippers," "big bad wolf" and probably "B. B. C." itself.

There will be some consolation, however, for radio comedians in the scheme. The library also will contain a collection of jokes which are ripe for broadcasting. The B. B. C. joke slotters already are preparing to snoop around in all likely quarters where wisecracks might be cracked to add to their collection of hitherto unbroadcasted jokes. These also will be filed for reference and trotted out on appropriate occasions.

Canada's Voters Increase OTTAWA, Ont. (UP)—Almost 1,000,000 more people will have the right to vote in Canada's next general election, expected to be held next fall, than in the last elections, election officials here report. In the last election, 5,850,000 qualified voters were listed. In the next, approximately 6,800,000 will be listed. The increase means that six out of every ten Canadians will have a vote.
