

PLAN DEVELOPMENT UNION CREEK REGION FOR WINTER SPORTS

Waha of Hood River forest, he was convinced that in southern Oregon a winter playground of considerable extent would justify the expense. He said that the Union Creek area lends itself to such a project, and if the popularity of the ski runs and trails that have already been constructed there is sufficient this winter, extensive developments will be made during the ensuing summer.
